Second I give and bequeath to my three grand children Julia A. Millhorn Nathan H. Millhorn Joshua H. Millhorn a certain tract or parcel of land lying on the South side of Opeloton River in Dist. No 20 adjoining the lands of John Sanders Wat. Anderson and Buck Henry containing by estimation thirty five Acres more or less

Third I give to my son Henry Sanders my Bureau two chairs and one half bushel in my two horse wagon Fourt I give to my son John Sanders my clock one large iron kettle one spinning wheel and churn one Bible all of the kitchen furniture all the chairs except four

Fifth I give to my grand daughter Effie one small table one Pitcher and Bowl and to my grand daughter Belle one small table one Chest two sets of andirons

Sixth I give to my grand daughter Julia O. Millhorn my fall leaf table my safe one glass Pitcher one set of plates one set of teacups and saucers one dish one bedstead and bedding two chairs one Baker and lid one Pot and lid one tea kettle and Skillet and Pot hooks and all of my clothes
