I do be God for the same do make publish and pronounce this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following (that is to say) I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Hannah Coulson all the plantation on which we now live containing two hundred and one acres be the same more or less together with each and every appurtenance thereto belonging to be her line and certain property for during her natural life. Also I bequeath unto the said Hannah, my wife, all my household and Kitchen furniture utensils, goods and chattels and I do appoint the said Hannah Coulson whole and sole Executrix of this my last Will and Testament hereby revoking & annulling and disallowing all former wills by me made. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 5th day of June 1839

I Henry Boyds of Washington County State of Tennessee not being in possession of any real estate but having notes for cash to the amount of three hundred and thirty dollars for par

which notes when collected will make the sum of three hundred and eighty dollars and eighty five cents including the money on hand, the interest on said notes not computed, which amount after paying funeral expenses are defrayed and all just claims against me are paid I give to my children in the following order to my son Lewis I give eighty dollars, to my daughter Rosannah Watts I give fifteen dollars, to my son Jacob I give twenty dollars, to my daughter Margaret Matchett I give fifteen dollars, Mary, Elizabeth Susan Hannah and Nancy and my sons William and Henry I have given as much as I allowed them heretofore. I do not will any of them any of the above sum - the above legacies to receive their portions as soon after my decease as collections can be made. My bed and bedding I give to my son David wife, my cupboard I give to my grand daughter Retsy Boyds, my table and pot I give to my son David's wife, my wearing apparel I give to my son David's children. Then after my funeral expenses and all just claims are paid and the above legacies have got the above amounts devised them if there still be a residue of money it shall be divided equally among said Legates. I appoint David Dewala and David Boyd my Executors. December 7th 1839

I Mary Gibson of the County of Tennessee being for a long time in bed and weak in body but of sound mind and memory but being to mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men to die do make this instrument of writing my last Will and Testament for the distribution of the estate, the estate it is coming to me from my Father's estate, in the following manner. First I give and bequeath unto my beloved son William Gibson twenty dollars. Secondly - I give and bequeath unto my daughter Lemima twenty dollars. Thirdly - I give and bequeath unto my daughter Sarah ten dollars. Fourthly - I give and bequeath unto my daughter Elizabeth ten dollars and also

ter Rachael ten dollars, and also unto my daughter Mary ten dollars, and the balance of the estate if any, I do will and bequeath unto the rest of my sons to be equally divided among them. Lastly - I nominate and appoint Thomas Fulkerson Executor of this my last will and testament, to carry the same into effect, hereby revoking all others and only acknowledging this to be my last will and testament, and have hereunto set my hand and seal in presence of this 23rd day of August 1860.

I Jacob Robinson of the State of Tennessee Washington County being weak in body but of sound mind and memory, but calling to mind the mortality of my body knowing that it is appointed that all men must die do make this instrument of writing my last will and testament in the following manner:

First - I recommend my spirit to God who gave it and my body to my Executor to be by him buried in a decent and respectful manner.

Second - I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife and bosom friend Elizabeth Robinson my black horse named Ada, my black mare named Ade, also my four horse wagon and harness, gearing in full and two set plough gear, one large patent plough, one small patent plough, two shal ploughs with bull tongues, the wind mill, cutting box and knife, two cleaves, two cows and one steer, all the sheep after Sarah and Elizabeth gets six apiece, the sow and pigs that was bought of John Robinson, one thousand pounds of fat pork next fall, all my wheat, corn, rye and oats that now are in hand, all the pork and beef that is now salted for the use of the family at home my cupboard in the dwelling house with all its furniture, the desk, the clock, all the castings, my trap kettle, potrack water pails, jars, falling box, flax, flax, my large bible and hymn book, one candlestand, six chairs, my best leg chair, four patchwork stools, one meat rack, two hoes, three bias hoes and furniture, my iron and back line, all the flax, one pair tongs and shovels, two pair dog irons, all my stock of bees, one pair of shears, one pair of shears, one doublet with buttons, my iron tooth, the arrow

one small spinning wheel, the black smith tools, one half bushel measure, my two horse buckets, two mowing scythes, one bin or look, four scythes, two whitestones, waggon loaders, with log chains to them, four iron caskets, also the lands and two falling axes.

Thirdly - I give and bequeath unto my daughter Mary Robinson my two horse waggon in place in place of the other horse she was to have.

Fourthly - I give and bequeath unto my daughter Sarah Robinson my black mare named Ade and my sugar horse cell.

Fifthly - I give unto my daughter Elizabeth Robinson my horse named Buck and my sugar filly.

Sixthly - I give and bequeath unto my son Fielding F. B. Robinson my home farm say one hundred and sixty acres more or less, the said Fielding F. B. Robinson is to provide for his mother and keep her during her natural life in comfort, plenty and ease or as much so as the nature of his will admits, also the said Elizabeth is to have then home and support with the said Fielding F. B. Robinson while single also the clothing, the now claims and the red star he purchased of Helen Potter and one sow and pigs, his gun, one scythe and cradle, one bedstead and furniture.

Seventhly - I want all my property not named in my will to be sold and all my just debts paid out of the proceeds and the balance if any to be divided with my children equally.

Eighthly - I want the Daniel farm and the Fulkerson place to be sold at the end of twelve months after my death, and the proceeds to be divided between my children equally.

Lastly - I nominate and appoint my son Saml Robinson my Executor of this my last will and testament for to carry the same into effect, hereby revoking all other wills bequests and legacies herein made and only acknowledging this to be my last will and testament, in testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 7th day of July 1860.
