Likewise give for the same as make publish and pronounce this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following (that is to say) I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Anna Maria Coulson all the plantation on which we now live containing two hundred and one acres be the same more or less together with each and every appertaining thereto belonging to be her sole and certain property for during her natural life. Also I bequeath unto the said Anna Maria my wife all my household and kitchen furniture utensils goods and chattels and likewise appoint the said Anna Maria Coulson whole and sole executrix of this my last Will and Testament hereby revoking disannulling and desaffirming all former wills by me made. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 5th day of June 1839

I Henry Boyd of Washington County State of Tennessee not being in possession of any real estate but having notes for cash to the amount of three hundred and thirty dollars for payment in bonds and fifty dollars and eighty five cents on hand

which notes when collected will make the sum of three hundred and eighty dollars and eighty five cents including the money on hand, the interest on said notes not computed, which amount after paying rural expenses are subsisted and all just claims against me are paid I give to my children in the following order to my son David I give eighty dollars, to my daughter Rosannah Datto I give fifteen dollars, to my son Jacob I give twenty dollars to my daughter Margaret Mitchell I give fifteen dollars, Mary Elizabeth Swan Neumann and Nancy and my sons William and Henry I have given as much as I allowed them heretofore. I do not will away of them any of the above sum - the above legatees to receive their portions as soon after my decease as collections can be made. My bed and bedding I give to my son David's wife, my cupboard I give to my grand daughter Betsy Boyd, my table and pot I give to my son David's wife, my wearing apparel I give to my son David's children. Then after my funeral expenses and all just claims are paid and the above legatees have got the above amounts devised them if there still be a residue of money it shall be divided equally among said legatees. I appoint Daniel Neumann and David Boyd to my executors. December 7th 1837

to Rachael ten dollars, and also unto my daughter Mary ten dollars, and the balance of the estate if any I do will and bequeath unto the rest of my sons to be equally divided among them. Lastly - I nominate and appoint Thomas Falkerson Executor of this my last will and testament, to carry the same into effect, hereby revoking all others and only acknowledge this to be my last will and testament, and have hereunto set my hand and seal in presence of this 23rd day of August 1860.

I Jacob Robinson of the State of New York Washington County being weak in body but of sound mind and memory, but calling to mind the mortality of my body knowing that it is apparent that all men must die do make this instrument of writing my last will and testament in the following manner:

First - I recommend my spirit to God who gave it and my body to my Executor to be by him buried in a decent and respectful manner.

Second - I give and bequeath unto my dear wife and bosom friend Elizabeth Robinson my black horse named Bud, my black mare named Duke, also my four horse wagon and team gearing in full and two sets plough gear one large patent plough, one small patent plough, two shoal ploughs with bill tongues, the wind mill, cutting box and knife, two cleavers, two cows and one heifer, all the sheep after Sarah and Elizabeth gets six apiece, the sow and pigs that was bought of John Robinson, one thousand pounds fatland pork next fall, all my wheat, corn, rye and oats that now on hand, all the pork and beef that is now salted for the use of the family at home my cupboard in the dwelling house with all its furniture, the desk, the clock, all the candlesticks, my trap kettle, pots, kettles water vessels, first, falling leaf kettle, flux kettle, my large Bible and hymn book, no candlesticks, six chairs, my best bog chair, four pitchforks two shovels, one mattock, two hoes, three bias bushels and furniture my iron and cast iron, all the flax, one pair tongs and more, a pair dog irons, all my stock of beef, one pair stockings, mittens, an umbrella with umbrella, my iron tooth Mannson

one small spinning wheel, the blacksmith tools, one half bushel measure, my two horse buckles, two mowing scythes, one bier hook, iron bridge, two whitewash, wagon leaders, with log chains to them, four cigar racks, two the lands and two falling axes.

Thirdly - I give and bequeath unto my daughter Mary Robinson my two horse waggon in place in place of the other horse she uses to have.

Fourthly - I give and bequeath unto my daughter Sarah Robinson my black mare named Doll and my macker horse called Jim.

Fifthly - I give unto my daughter Elizabeth Robinson my come

horse named Duke and my macker filly.

Sixthly - I give and bequeath unto my son Fielding F. B. Robinson my home farm say one hundred and sixty acres more or less, the said Fielding F. B. Robinson is to provide for his mother and keep her during her natural life in comfort, plenty and ease or as much so as the nature of his will admits, also to

keep and Elizabeth is to have their home and support w^t the said Fielding F. B. Robinson while single also the following fully he now claims and the rest he purchased of Helen Ritter and one son and his wife, his gun, one scythe and cradle, one bed bedstead and furniture.

Seventhly - I want all my property not named in my will to be sold and all my just debts paid out of the proceeds and the balance if any to be divided with my children equally.

Eighthly - I want the Daniels farm and the Falkerson place to be sold at the end of twelve months after my death, another proceeds to be divided between my children equally.

Ninthly - I nominate and appoint my son Samuel Robinson my Executor of this my last will and testament for to carry the same into effect, hereby revoking all other wills legacies and bequests previously made and only acknowledge this to be my last will and testament, in testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 17th day of May 1860.
