Thomas Emerson's Will.

I Thomas Emerson, of the County of Washington
do make and ordain this as my last Will and Testament.
In the first place my will and desire is, that my executor
herein after named shall as soon as convenient, pay all my
just debts of every kind and description, all unjust claims
and demands of every kind and description, I desire to be
settled. To enable my executor to pay all my debts I hereby give
him full power and authority to sell my real and personal
estate of every kind and description whatsoever, desiring that
he should first sell all my land and other personal property,
before he sells my two servants, slaves for life, Randal and
Sally, or before the sale of any of my house hold and kitchen
furniture or any of the stock and implements of husbandry, pro-
visions &c about the lot on which I now live, or which may be there
at the time of death. After the payment of my just debts by the
sale of my real and personal property as aforesaid, I give and
bequeath to my beloved wife Catharine, all my household and
kitchen furniture of every kind and description, my two slaves
Randal and Sally, all the stock and implements of husbandry
of every kind about the lot on which I now live, all the grain
provisions, and provisions now or hereafter may be on
hand at the time of my decease, or that may be growing on
any land that I own, all of which described property to be
my said wife Catharine absolutely and entirely at her own
disposal, her heirs and assigns forever. Should any thing remain
after the payment of my debts and the above bequests to my wife
I give and bequeath the same to my son Thomas B Emerson
his heirs and assigns forever. My executors may sell my real and personal
property either at public or private sale as he may think best. And out
of the sale of my property, or from the debts due me, my executor is
authorized if in his judgment he thinks it proper to have repaid
the first twelve months of my Son-in-law Farmer, and then
have a number of the first volume bound, and sold. My ex-
ecutor is also further authorized to continue the publication
of the Farmer to the end of the third year, and to

if he should think proper to do so, and may procure an uninterested
person to superintend its publication. I also authorize my executors
to continue the contract with Jason R Lyon to the end of the year
Should my executors take place before that event and to receive the
payment he is to make me in printing instead of money, as provided
for in said agreement. But all these matters are submitted to
the sound discretion and judgment of my executors. Should my
executor not find it convenient to sell my Printing Press, he is
authorized to lease or rent it upon such terms and for such
price as he may think prudent. If the contract with Lyon
is continued, and my wife boards the practice boys which I
have, she must be paid for their board, clothing and washing
out of my estate. I hereby appoint my esteemed friend John
G. Eason, of Danborough, my sole executor of my said last
Will and Testament, and my will and desire is, that he
should not be required to give security for the performance
of the duties of executor as aforesaid. From any cause what-
ever should my friend Mr. Eason decline, or be pre-
vented from serving as executor, which I most sincerely
hope may not be the case, then and in that case, I
hereby appoint my brother Arthur Emerson of Portsmouth
Virginia, and my son Thomas B Emerson executors
of this my last Will and Testament, with all the rights
and privileges, hereby conferred upon Mr. Eason. And in
witness of this my last Will and Testament I have hereunto
set my hand and seal the 11th day of April 1837 in the

Secondly - I give and bequeath to my sister Jane Roop my negro girl Jane for the space of said Jane's life time and then I give and bequeath said negro girl to Sarah Baxter her lifetime, and then to have her freedom. Thirdly - I give and bequeath to Sarah Baxter my saddle and pellie dog nor and above her part of my estate. Fourthly - I give and bequeath to Sarah Dugan the whole amount of her mother's part of my estate fifthly - I give and bequeath to Thomas Caldwells my Book case and large family Bible nor and above his part of my estate. Sixthly - I give and bequeath to Elizabeth Miller my white Box under the window with shut and one Blant and Beattie and no calico quilt that is not quilted, and the balance of my personal property to be sold and divided with my heirs. Lastly - I do hereby nominate and appoint Jerry White and Caldwells Brown my executors to settle when & I do this my last will set my hand and seal the 28th day of May 1840.

Hen 3rd - As it respects my personal estate that God has blessed me with I will and dispose of them in the following manner. I will that one hundred and two acres of land that I own on the Locust Creek in Washington County on the south side of Little Chucky River joining Locust Creek and the Big Linary shall be and is hereby left to my two sons the ninth and his brother David Smith to have the full benefit of said land equally. Also all the balance of my property after my debts are paid and I have a decent burial shall be equally divided between my two sons the property lots of one still and two and all the clothing, bedding &c that is left in my house when I die. Also my mare saddle and bridle shall be given to them to be equal as the land is the other property also my two guns I will that the have after my death. And now in full reason of mine and memory I hereunto set my hand and affix my seal this sixteenth day of July 1834, and also affix Michael Lee my executor

First I commit my soul to God that gave it and my body to be buried in a christian manner, and as to my property I wish it disposed of as follows: First all my just debts paid, then what may remain I wish my brother Felix to have nine dollars that is in his hands and sister Catharine Miller to have nine dollars, the balance to be divided between my three sisters Mary, Sarah and Elizabeth, excepting my clothes, them to be divided with my brothers as they may think best. I also appoint William, my brother to execute this my last will. At witness my hand this 11th day of Aug 1835
