William Greenway's Will.

I William Greenway (in the name of God Almer) of the County
of Washington in the State of Ohio but of sound mind,
calling to mind the certainty of death and the uncertainty of this mortal
life do highly make Ordaine and constitute this my last will and testa-
ment, hereby revoking all former wills either written or witness of me
at any time made in manner and form following to:

1st - After my funeral expenses are defrayed I wish my debts of any
to be paid out of my estate.

2nd - I give and bequeath to my son William Greenway a piece
of land off what I bought of James Graham running from
what is called the ship log to Richard Greenway's line to about
fifteen acres.

3rd - I give and bequeath to my two sons John H. and George
H. Greenway the remainder of all the land I may be left
with or own at my death by them paying back to the other
heirs eight hundred dollars, that is John H. pay three hundred
and fifty dollars and George H. paying four hundred and fifty
dollars, also by furnishing my daughter Martha Greenway a comfortable
and decent support in my present house and to have as much here
as may be necessary for her comfort during her life, also to let
the said John H. and George H. give and execute a warrant due to
my executors or to whom they may direct two rods square of land in-
cluding the family burying ground by my son John and my wife
It is also my wish if either of them wishes to sell their part of the
land they shall be prohibited from selling to a stranger, but it is
my request that they shall sell to one of their brothers. Also as I
have no personal property but what has been divided, except
 negroes; it is my will, wish and request that my executors sell
them to the highest bidder of my heirs so that said negroes be kept
in the family by Robert L. Greenway, Dennis King Charles &c. Also it is my
will that as John H. Greenway has the waggon and all the horses on the
farm that he pay my daughter Mary Ann McButler a good horse
at such dollars also that he give my grandsons Elmore & John

and named Duke and my saddle and bridle
with it is my will that the eight hundred dollars that I have left
me I give to Greenway pay to the heirs, to equally divide between
my children, namely Anna Long, the heir of Patsy Ann Shultz
Sarah Michael, Richard Greenway, Susan Green, Elizabeth
Pogue, Dennis Green, William Greenway, Patsy Greenway, George
Greenway, Harry Ann McButler, also the proceeds of the sale of
of my negroes to equally divide between the above named heirs
including my other two sons John H. and George H. Greenway.
Lastly I rectify, constitute and appoint my son William Green-
way and George Green executors of this my last will and testa-
ment testimony whereof I have set my hand and affixed my seal
the 18th day of March 1839

to have the third of the benefits a coming of the place as long
as she lives and remains a widow, and if she ^{wishes} to marry to have
a child's part. My wish and desire is that each of my chil-
dren have an equal ^{share} of all my estate except Samuel
and unto him I bequeath ten dollars. My wish and
desire also is that all my just debts shall be paid out of
such property as can be spared, and if the money which
I am owing cant conveniently made out of my personal
property to sell a part of the land to make it in interest
whereof I have signed at this 30th day of October in the year
of our Lord One Thousand eight hundred and thirty seven
My wish and desire is also that my wife Margaret and son
Douglas should be the executors of the estate.
