

Joseph Keener's will.

In the name of God Amen.

I Joseph Keener of the County of Washington & State of Tennessee, my health being impaired, but of sound mind, and disposing memory, and considering the certainty of death and the uncertainty of the time thereof, and being desirous of settling my worldly affairs, and thereby be the better prepared to leave this world when it shall please God to call me hence - I do therefore make and publish this my last will and testament in manner and form following, viz: First and principally I commit my soul into the hands of Almighty God and my body to the earth to be decently interred at the discretion of my executors herein after mentioned - and after all my just debts are discharged, I then give, to my beloved wife Rebecca Keener, during her natural life or widowhood, all my estate both personal and real to be disposed of in such a manner as will be conducive to the benefit of my family, and it also is my wish if it be consistent, that my wife do dispose of so much of the estate as will be sufficient to get a plantation for my family to live and support upon - I do also give unto my wife full power and authority to mine, convey and devise in the manner to the purchase which I have above named, all the legacy which is coming or was bequeathed unto me by my father died. - If my wife should marry then all the property must be equally divided between her and my children - but if not, then at her death to be disposed in the manner which I have named, that is, equally divided among them. Furthermore I appoint my wife Rebecca Keener, the true and lawful executrix of my estate. And I do appoint John Barnes in my place, to be executor of his father Joseph Barnes last will and testament, leaving my execution entirely clear in any respect. In witness whereof I have set my name and affixed my seal, this thirteenth day of July, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and thirty two, in presence of three witnesses.

Samuel Crawford's will.

In the name of God Amen.

I Samuel Crawford of the State of Tennessee and County of Washington being weak of body but of sound mind, do make this my last will and testament. I do first recommend my soul to God who gave it, and secondly it is my will and desire that all my just debts should be paid and that my property which it hath pleased God to bless me with, shall all be left in the care of and at the disposal of my beloved wife, until my children come of age, then to be divided share and share alike, so as to make all equal, each one according to the share for any portion of the estate he may have until the youngest child comes of age.

Samuel Greer Senior's will.

In the name of God Amen.

I Samuel Greer Senr. of the County of Washington and State of Tennessee, being weak of body but of sound mind and memory, then is to Almighty God, and knowing that it is appointed for man to die, do anticipate that which will make and ordain this my last will and testament in manner and form following - I give and bequeath to my son John Greer, for and during his natural life the tract of land in my name which was purchased from John Keeney, containing eighty acres, adjoining the lands of David Purcell's heirs, Isaac Hanks and others, and after his decease it is my will that my two sons Samuel Greer and Thos. G. Greer, their heirs to shall have the fee simple in said lands and tenements in common - I give and bequeath unto my son Samuel Greer all my personal property and effects whatsoever, and I do hereby appoint my said sons, Samuel and Thos. G. Greer my executors, to see this my last will and testament carried into effect during the natural life of my said son John Greer, sealed, published and observed in the presence of us subscribers who attested the same in the presence of Testator and each other the 8th day of April 1826.
