### Jackson Hale's Will.

I Jackson Hale being sound in mind and sense of perfect understand ing, do publish and make this my last Will and Testament in form and substance thus is to say:—

Secondly—My will is that all my just debts and funeral expenses be paid out of any money that I may die possessed of or as soon as any may come into the hands of my Executor.

Thirdly—My will is that my beloved wife Elizabeth shall have my mare, bridle and saddle and all my house hold and kitchen furniture of every kind.

Fourthly—My will is that the rest of my stock of every kind to sell and all my farming tools and utensils and all the grain & every kind be sold and equal divided between my wife Elizabeth and my daughter Harriet and my son Eliphalet, share and share alike.

Fifthly—My will is and I do hereby set forth power in my Executor and authority to dispose of my real estate in such manner as full and large a sum now in every respect as I would do myself if living.

Sixthly—My will is that the proceeds arising from the sale of my land shall equal be divided between my wife Elizabeth, and my daughter Harriet, and my son Eliphalet share and share alike.

Seventhly—My will is that my beloved wife shall go and live with or at her father and that she is to keep and rear my children if she remains my widow, but if she should marry again then it is my will that my Executor shall take my son and youngster and rear them.

Eighthly—and lastly my will is and I do hereby nominate and appoint Henry Hales as my Executor for which I prepare this writing at my hand and affix my seal this 30 of April 1839

give us even after my death as people out of any money that I may die possessed of or may first come into the hands of my executors.  
 Secondly - I give and bequeath to my dear beloved wife Anna all my house for the space of said Anna's lifetime, provided she live single, but if she marries she only has the house while she remains single. I also give said Anna all my personal property for the purpose of keeping her and raising my children comfortable, during the time of her widowhood, but if she marries, she only holds an cow and one bed and bedding. I also give said Anna my black dog Spencer during her widowhood and then said Spencer falls to my heirs in like manner of the house. I also give to said Anna my black girl Rachael during said Anna's lifetime and then said black girl falls to my heirs in like manner of said black dog Spencer, and said black girl continues in the same manner of the girl if then living. Thirdly - I give and bequeath to my two daughters, to wit: Sarah and Mary five hundred dollars each and also one bed and bedding each of them. Fourthly - I give and bequeath to my three sons, to wit: Archibald, George and John five hundred dollars each of them, and also one bed and bedding each of them, and if they die young none of my estate it is to be equally divided with my heirs consisting of both boys and girls. Lastly I do hereby nominate and appoint John French my executor. In witness whereof I do to this my will set my hand and seal this the 6th day of August 1848.

I William French of the County of Washington and State of New York being now weak in body but of sound mind and memory, taking into view the mortality of the soul, knowing it is appointed for all men once to die to make and record this my last will and testament, this is to say in the first place I give and recommend my soul unto God who gave it and my body to a decent burial at the discretion of my executors and touching such worldly estate as God has pleased to bless me with in this life I give and dispose of in the following manner and form that is to say, after the payment of all my just debts and funeral expenses I give and bequeath unto my wife Rebecca all the house hold and kitchen furniture and also one small mare and one horse with two cows and calves, and also one big steer and two hogs and twelve sheep all to her choice, one wind mill, one potting shed, and one old
