

Isaac Mulkey's Will.

I Isaac Mulkey do make unto Publish this my last will and testament hereby revoking and making void all other wills by me at any other time made.

First I direct that my funeral expenses and all my just debts be paid as soon after my death as possible out of any money that I may die possessed or may first come into the hands of my Executor.

Secondly I direct that all my property including my stock household and kitchen furniture farming utensils tools and all other property not named in this will be given to my loving Companion for the support of her and any of my children that are single and laboring under bodily affliction to belong to my wife during her widowhood but should she marry it is to be given up to each of my single children as may be unable to make a living by their own exertions and at the death of the last of them included in this second direction I direct that it go into the hands of those that support them while they live and my Executor is hereby directed to give up the property to my widow Rachel Mulkey as soon as he enters on his Executorship.

Lastly I do hereby nominate and appoint my two sons Philip Mulkey and Robt H. Mulkey my Executors to carry this will into effect.

William Hale's Will

Third my will and wish is that all my personal or moveable property to be sold and the money equally divided between my four named heirs.

Fourth my will and wish is that the proceeds of the four shares that I hold in the estate of my father George Hale to be sold divided equal between my four above named heirs.

Fifth my will and wish is that my land may remain for the benefit of my heirs until the youngest one becomes twenty one year of age then to be equally divided between the above heirs if agreed by them if not agreed on by them to be sold and the money divided between the above named heirs.

Sixth my will and wish is for all my dues and demands to be collected and all my debts to be paid.

I hereby nominate and appoint Hiram D. Hale my Executor to this my last will and testament for which I hereunto set my hand and seal this 28th day of September 1855
