

Samuel Sherrill Will

I Samuel Sherrill of the County of Washington and State of Tennessee being sick & much infirmitiy in body but of sound mind and memory calling to recollection that it is apperent that all men are to depart this mortal life. Do make constittute and ordain this my last will & testament and do give & bequeath such worldly goods and property as I both here pleased god to posses me with in the following manner to wch. Item I give and bequeath unto my wife before daughter Catherine Sherrill the wife of John Senior since a Negro wench named Phebe & her young child called but about ten weeks old which dies with their increase I give and bequeath unto the said Catherine Sherrill and the heirs of her body for ever. Item I give & bequeath unto my wife beloved son Joseph Men Slave named Smart about thirty five years old. Item I give & bequeath unto my wife beloved son John Sherrill a Negroe boy called Sime about three years old the son of a slave called Sime. Item I give and bequeath unto my wife beloved daughter Mary Jones the wife of Littlepage Ray senior my two Negroe women called Jane and Martha. Item I give and bequeath unto my two and wife beloved sons George & William Sherrill my plantation and tract of land on which I now live containing as esteped in the original grants two hundred and fifty acres also being the land purchased from John Senior the same to be divided in the following manner that is to say beginning on the lower bound of the tract by me on the river Nolochucky adjoining the lands of John Senior hence thence running up the river Nolochucky to the top there to turne from thence to run nearly a north course or back course as well not include a greater quantity then One hundred acres which is to be formed into one division being the lower and the one adjoining next to the lands of John Senior senior which land I allot give & bequeath unto my son George Sherrill and his heirs and assigns for ever, and also together with the aforesaid land one Negroe woman named Ruth supposed to be about forty years old item I give and bequeath all the remainder of the said tract of land byg about into my son William Sherrill and his heirs and assigns for ever and I also give and bequeath unto my son William all my stock of horses bows & hogg beasts of every kind whatever and my house & furniture of every description that is in mey in my possession at the time of my decease. Also give unto my son John Sherrill two Negroe boys the posthumous post. There rated as for his legacy I now by will and bequeath unto him the summe Adam & his dillars in addition to what I have heretofore given him. I do hereby revoke all former wills & testaments that I have at any time heretofore made ratifying & confirming this as my last will & testament and do hereby Ordain appoint & constittute my trusty & well beloved friend John Senior & William Sherrill my executors of this my last will & testaments in writing whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this fourth day of Janurary in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and 1800.

John Weary Will

In the Name of God Amen

I John Wren of the County of Washington & State of Tennessee being weak of body but sound in memory and judgment calling to mind my Mortality do make this my last will and testament as follows. First & principally I give up my soul to god who gave it and my body to be buried in a decent Christian Manner at the discretion of my executors and of such worldly goods as god hath blessed me with - I give & bequeath to my colored wife Agnes my dwelling house and furniture with all my stock (except such things as shall be hereafter mentioned) to her at her desire to keep and support her family on & to further the three young daughters (viz.) Nancy, Charlotte & Sarah and it is my will that each of them should have the same portion of my two other daughters - long after her death if the will be sufficient I give and bequeath to my daughter Betty my young Servt Maria Davis, my son with two cows and two young cattle and a good bed and furniture with what household furniture her mother can give her. I give and bequeath to my daughter Lou my young boy Mure two cows two young cattle with a houses furniture and what household furniture her mother can give her - I give & bequeath to my son Benjamin one hundred and fifty acres of land of the lower end of the tract I now live on also one third of a tract of land lying at the foot of the Piney Mountain together with one third of the value of the estate and effects. I give & bequeath to my son George one hundred and twenty acres of land adjoining to Benjamin of the same tract I now live on also one third of the tract of land lying at the foot of the Piney Mountain together with one third of the value of the estate and effects. I give & bequeath the remainder of the tract I live on one hundred and one forty four acres to my wife Agnes until my son Hugh comes of age then one half to belong to him and the other half to belong to her. In testimony at my death the whole to belong to him also one third of the tract of land lying at the foot of the Piney Mountain to testify to my son Hugh together with the third of the value of the estate and effects and it is my will that he should have to the amount of twenty five pounds of my moveable estate when he comes of age as one third of the estate & effects I give and bequeath my Negroe boy Charles to my wife Agnes during her life and after her to go to the Child that shall be willing to take my son John and take care of him while he lives. I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary Cunningham one cow and calf - I give and bequeath to my daughter Margaret Wilson one cow and Calf - And lastly I constittute and appoint my wife Agnes my son Benjamin & my son-in-law John Wilson executors of this my last will and testament and do hereunto set my hand and seal this fourth day of January One thousand eight hundred and signed sealed and delivered to be the last will & testament of the testator
