

Jacob Keblers Will

In the name of God Amen. I Jacob Kuller of the State of Tennessee Washington County being now in good health and of sound mind and memory and knowing that all men have to die, do make this instrument of writing my last will and Testament in the following manner.

First I leave and bequeath to my wife Mary all my household goods and furniture of every description, during her natural life and for her to dispose of it as she may choose also a support called Susanah during her lifetime, then to be sold and divided between Sarah Keckelbe, John Keckelbe, Sarah Keckelbe, Elizabeth Keckelbe, Caroline and Mary Ann Engersol and Lucy Haws also my will is that my wife shall possess and enjoy full privilege of my dwelling house and other necessary houses that she have the use of and a decent support given her from the income of my plantation during her life, and also my daughter Mary to have the privilege to live with her as long as she lives a single life.

Second I give and bequeath to my son Samuel Kuller the plantation whereon I now live with all my farming utensils of every description, but he is to find his brother a decent maintenance during her lifetime.

Thirdly I give to daughter Mary a horse to be worth sixty dollars.

Fourthly my will is that all my personal estate and property of every description that I shall die possessed of be sold and divided (except what shall be necessary for my wife to keep for her use) and not particular billed by me, in the following manner: To each one of my children a equal division, and also an equal share to both Anne Engersols two daughters.

Fifthly I nominate and appoint my two sons John Keckelbe and Samuel Kuller Executors of this my last will and Testament, hereby revoking all other wills, legacies and bequests by me made and pronounce this to be my last will and Testament in testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal the 21st day of October 1828

Henry Hagals Will

In the name of God Amen. I Henry Hagal of Washington County and State of Tennessee being in good health of body and sound mind, do make and put in writing this piece of paper to be my last will and Testament in manner and form following, that is to say, in the first place my will and desire is that all my just debt and funeral expenses be fully paid and discharged. Secondly I give and bequeath unto my well beloved wife Colleanor the dwelling house and plantation together with all the farming tools, household and kitchen furniture, together with all my stock, horses cattle sheep and hogs so long as she remains my widow, and in case she never marries all the before mentioned property to be hers during her life.

Thirdly at the decease of my wife my daughter Sarah to have one hundred dollars and then all the remaining property to be equally divided with her Sarah and all the rest of my children. Fourthly I do nominate and appoint my well beloved wife Colleanor executrix of this my last will and Testament, with full power as executrix, hereby revoking and making void all other will or wills by me heretofore made, acknowledging this to be my last will and Testament, in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal this 21st June in the year four thousand eight hundred and thirty.
