Sarah Humphreys Will

State of Tennessee
Washington County

March 17th 1871.

I Sarah Humphreys being in my perfect senses and viewing the uncertainty of life and the certainty of death, it being appointed for all to die, do make and publish this my last will and testament, hereby revoking and making void all other wills by me at any time made.

First - I direct that at my death my body be decently buried and all my funeral expensals, and just debts be paid out of any money I may die possessed of or that may first come into the hands of my executor.

Secondly, I will and bequeath my three horse brutes to be used for the benefit of James M. Wheelock and wife and children, for the purpose of raising and educating their children to be disposed of as he the said James M. Wheelock

may think best for the use of the family, he may keep them on the farm or sell them at either public or private sale as best suits him.

Thirdly - I will and bequeath Hannah Whitlock wife of James M. Wheelock my blanket & little wheel, one corner called Tennessee County, to Sarah Whitlock my Calico quilt piece in half squares. To John Anderson Whitlock my Bureau and one bed and my bedding. To William Anderson Whitlock one case called the winding time. To George Washington Whitlock one corner called the Chariot wheel.

Fourthly - To my brother Elmer Whitlock I will and bequeath one bed two sheets one corner one quilt called the winding compass. To Martha L. Whitlock daughter of Elmer my big wheel. Fifthly - I will and bequeath to James M. Wheelock and wife a note on Thomas Humphreys for about one hundred and forty dollars with some interest, and to each of us I and Thomas Humphreys and one or E. S. Hunt which I direct to settle to pay my just debts and funeral expenses & the remainder to be equally divided between my brothers Edmund, William, Peyton B. & Elmer Whitlock. My wishes were all my children I bequeath to Hannah Whitlock wife of James M. Wheelock my helper & my dress kettle. I give to John Anderson Whitlock. Sixthly - I nominate and appoint R. S. Ferguson my executor to close up the business of this will and to carry its provisions into effect.

Given under my hand and seal this 17th day of March 1871.

There is some money due me from Nathan Shipley which I want collected and divided equally between Edmund, William, Peyton B. & Elmer Whitlock.
