I G.W. Kitzmiller being of sound mind and disposing  
memory knowing it is appointed for all men to

my wish is that my property that may  
be on hand including money and effects  
be equally divided between all my

with.

I constitute and appoint my wife

## Sarah A. Broyles Will

In the name of God amen!

I, Sarah A. Broyles  
being of sound mind, memory and understanding  
do make ordain and declare this to be my last will

To my daughter Sarah Ann I give all the pictures  
painted by her and their frames, one of my gold brooches,  
she and her sister to draw for choice, also one of my  
feather beds now in Tommies possession, also one eighth  
part of my silver, my gold chain, one pair of linen  
sheets, one large nice table cloth, and to her daughter
