

Will of Ann. S. McAdams, Decd.

State of Tennessee } I Ann. S. McAdams wife of
Washington County } Samuel B. Adams, and formerly
am J. Duncan, being sound in mind and memory
being reminded of the certainty of death, and for the
love and good will that I have towards my husband
Samuel B. Adams make this my last will and testament
First, I commit my soul to God who gave it and
my body to be Christianly and decently Interred
(Secondly, my will and desire is that (Whereas by the
last will and testament of my Father & Mother Joseph
& Polly Duncan dated 31st day of March 1856 I "Ann
McAdams" is made an equal heir and entitled to my
portion in said Estate), my said husband shall have
the entire use and benefit of my interest in said estate
during his life time to use as he may think best and proper
and at his death whatever may remain unconsumed to
go to my son Joseph B. McAdams for his use and
benefit and if he should not be living at the death
of my said husband then to go to the use and benefit
of his child Samuel B. Adams or if he should
have any more lawful heirs born after the date of
this will then all of his children to share equal and
alike in said estate (thirdly, I nominate and constitute
my husband Samuel B. Adams my Executor of this
my last will and Testament - Signed and Sealed by me
this 18th day of April 1861 in the presence of these witnesses

I Godfrey Saylor do Make and publish this my last will and
testament and First I direct that my funeral Expenses and all my
debts be paid as soon after my death as possible out of any money
I may be possessed of or may first come into the hands of my Executor
and Secondly I give and bequeath to my wife Susanah Saylor two
Breads and Sticks and as many Breads those as she wants and
one small table and one facing leaf table and whout
Cocking utensils she wants one pair of fine dogs Shovel and pot
Ramble and one years provision ten Bushel of Wheat and
ten Bushel of Corn and thirdly I Bequeath that David
Saylor shall have the Thirde of the present Crop of Wheat and
he is to Cut it and Thrash it and Measure it in the half Bushel
and the Corn and oak some way and my wife to have one
Borough and one half of the garden and the other to David
Saylor and fourthly I Bequeath that the Land shall
be Sold also the fifth I Bequeath that the property be equally
divided Between my wife and David Saylor John Saylor and
Henry William Saylor and Mary an Saylor and Godfrey S. Saylor
and that Money to be put in to the hands of the Mother
for there use as guardian for said Children the three to
have one Share of said Estate.

I do hereby nominate and appoint Abraham Saylor
my Executor in witness whereof I do to this my will set
my hand and seal this the 24th day of May 1861
