Nuncupative Will of David O. Moore.

On the 26th day of June A.D. 1887 between the hours of 8 and 9 A.M. David O. Moore deceased in his last sickness at Mark Seaton's own habitation in the first civil district of Washington County State of Tennessee where he David O. Moore had been previously residing over ten days and where he had been suddenly surprised by his last fatal sickness in the presence of the undersigned witnesses whom he especially requested to bear witness thereto that his will was as follows to wit we were called into the room where the deceased was lying by H. Glaze. Mark Seaton came in first and when H. Aston came in said three

H. Glaze spoke to said David O. Moore as follows Davy I will state the matter over in the presents of these witnessses as you have just stated it to me and you can answer you say (addressing deceased) that if you die you do not want that note to come against me and you want me to have one of your mules decessed David O. Moore replied yes if I die I dont want that note I hold against you to ever come against you and I want you to have one of my mules the said David O. Moore died on the 27th day of June 1887

Circuit Court Monday April 16th 1888.

Be it remembered that at a Circuit Court began and held at the Court House in Jonesboro for the County of Washington and State of Tennessee on the 3^d Monday after the 4th Monday in March 1888 it being the 16th day of April 1888 present and presiding the Hon. Andrew J. Brown the elected to hold the Courts for the first judicial Circuit of Tennessee when among other things the following proceedings were had and ordered to be entered of record, to wit,

Cooper who being elected tried and sworn the truth to speak upon the issue joined and there not being sufficient time to finish the consideration of this cause to day the jury were respite from rendering their verdict until tomorrow

Came again the parties by their Allies and also came the same Jury who were on a former day sworn in the cause to wit, James Brabec, H. Campbell, W.A. Headrick, P.H. Mattern, C. Smith, J. J. Gibson, E. Davidson, J.W. Sherfey, R.M. Morrell, James Hale, S.B. Slaughter and W.M. Cooper, who upon their oaths do say that they find the issue joined in favor of Ptlff. that the paper writing purporting to contain and be the last will of David O. Moore Deo d is and does contain the nuncupative will of said David O. Moore Deo d.

It is accordingly adjudged that said paper writing be adjudged back to the County Court of Washington County to be there further proceeded with as the law directs and it is further adjudged that the contestants David Moore and Wilson Moore and R.G. Moore, their Surety on their prosecution bond pay the costs of the case for which execution may issue, and thereupon Dfts by Ally moves the Court to tax Ptlff. with attendance of the following witnesses summoned
