I Peter Range, of the county of Washington and State of Tennessee, being of sound mind and good memory, do this day, make this my last will and testament in the following form-

Second - My wish is for my three daughters Susanna, Luisa, & Elizabeth, to have one hundred dollars, each, in money -

Third, My wish for my other three daughters Elleanor, Mary, & Martha, to have two hundred dollars each in money, each, also one good horse, saddle, & bridle, two beads, and bedding, one Beauron, one set of chars, one good cow and calf -

Fourth, My wish is for my son James to have the use of timber off of the farm that I now live upon so long as he may live where he now lives -

Fifth, I will and bequeath to my son, William all of the farm, which I now reside upon, also to have all of my stock and all of my moveable property and moneys that I may die possessed of -

Sixth, My will is for my son, William to pay to my above named six daughters, all of the money & property that I have willed to them - also to maintain my three youngest daughters and to admit them apacable home upon the farm that I now reside upon so long as they remain single -

Seventh, My will and wish is that my two sons James and William to be Executars to this my last will and testament where if I have herunto, set my hand and sign my seal this 25th day of March 1857

Martha Stare's Will

I do hereby nominate and appoint Nathan Shipler my Executor, in witness whereof I do to this my will set my hand and seal this 19th day January 1867.
