of this life. Do Make & put in writing this my last will & testament in manner & form following
to wit. It is my will and desire and I do order all my last debts & funeral expenses shall
be paid and discharged. Then I give & bequeath unto my well beloved wife Ann one third
part of all my household furniture & Stock during her remaining my Widow and the use of my
smalling plantation until my youngest son comes of lawfull age then my will & desire is that
the land shall be sold & the Money equally divided amongst the boys that may be alive at
that time and that the remaining two thirds of my household & Stock be equally divided
between my daughters to be given to them as they may come to lawfull age or get married &
my will and desire is that at the death or remarriage of my said wife that the
third of my Moveable property by this will given to her during her life or Widowhood
be equally divided between my daughters - And I do nominate and appoint
my said wife to be the executrix of this my testament & last will hereby
revoking & disanaling all former testaments willys legacies & exentions by me
heretofore made and do Make and publish this sheet of paper to be & contain
my last will and testament. Son witness whereof I have hereunto set my
hand and seal this fourteenth day of May One Thousand Seven hundred and
Twenty six.
