

Robert Allison's Will

In the Name of God Amen

On the twenty sixth day of April in the year of our Lord one thousand
 seven hundred and thirty two I Robert Allison of the County of Washington in the Territory of the United
 States of America south of the River Ohio being sick and weak in body but sound in Mind & Memory calling
 to mind the Mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die I do make &
 publish this my last will and testament which is today principally an offset of all I give & command my
 soul into the hands of God who gave it and to my body I command it to the dust to be buried in a Christian
 like and decent manner at the discretion of my executors nothing doubting but at the resurrection I shall
 receive the same again by the mighty power of God — As to such worldly estate wherewithal it has
 pleased God to bestow upon me in this life I give & devise of the same in the manner &
 form following bount in the first place I do make and bequeath my beloved wife Ann
 Allison with the assistance of my son Robert to be sole executor of the estate and that she is to have
 her living on the plantation with her son Robert during her widowhood and also an equal share of the
 remainder of the estate when ever any particular share hereon mentioned is taken out (to wit) the remainder
 to be divided between her and my two youngest daughters Jane & Polly and my son Robert equally
 likewise I allow to my daughter Ann all that is now called her Dower about the house to be & abiding
 in the first place two cows and calves one four year old horse & all her own clothes bed and bed clothes
 & because I wish to bequeath unto my youngest son Robert a plantation home mare and
 two year old horse both as also the wagon and all implements belonging to the farm —
 Likewise leave to each of my daughters that is to say the sum of six shillings and further expenses
 than they be helpful or serviceable to make an equal share of the rest of estate amongst them
 I do make & publish this my last will and testament in the presence of my wife Ann Allison

from following cows in the first place - as much as I can do my master will send
Bellson with the assistance of my son Robert to be sole executor of the estate and that she is to have
her living on the plantation with her son Robert during his minority and also an equal share of the
remainder of the estate when every one particular thing herein mentioned is taken out (first) the remainder
to be divided between her and my two youngest daughters Jane & Polly and my son Robert equally
I allow to my daughter Ann all that is now called the House about the house to be distributed
in the first place two cows and calves one four year old horse & all her own clothes & new clothes
however I will bequeath unto my younger son Robert Allison the plantation home mare and
two year old horse colt as also the wagon and all implements belonging to the farm —
I likewise leave to each of my three children the sum of six dollars and further enjoin
that they be helpful in opinion to make an equal share of the estate among them
equally agreeable to this my will so I do hereby declare & witness and do make all and doth
other former wills bequests legacies &c. etc. are rescinded by me — This done in any way
named will or bequeathed purifying & conforming this and no other to be my last will
& testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the day of
February above mentioned —
