

William Garrison. Will

In the Name of God Amen.

The thirtieth day of March in the year of our Lord

One thousand seven hundred and Ninety, William Garrison of the County of Washington
in the State of North Carolina planter being very sick and weak in body but sound in
mind and memory calling to mind the Mortality of my body and memory that it is
apparent to all men once to die to make and Redeem their own body and esteem
that is to say principally profited of all I have and received in this life
of God who gave it me and as for my body I recommend it to the dust to be buried in a
Christian like and decent manner at the discretion of my executors nothing doubting
but at resurrection I shall receive the same again by the mighty power of God —

And as touching such worldly estate wherewithal I hath pleased God to bless me in this life
I give and dispose of in the manner and form following. That is to say —

In the first place I give and bequeath one to my beloved wife Margaret one house and land the
one feather bed with covering between one half of the deeper furniture and two cows but shall
be her sole of my whole stock and a decent suffitent out of the land during her widowhood
In second I give to my eldest daughter Anna one house to the value of fifteen pounds with
one saddle and bridle one cow one feather bed with covering one fourth part of the deeper
furniture and ten pounds besides — Between I give to my second daughter Mary One
house and land the same and covering & in same were fourth part of the deeper furniture
and ten pounds besides and likewise living with her Mother on the land while of age the
Marriage — And in the third I give to my Beloved son William Garrison ten pounds besides
leaving out of my estate — ten pounds to remainder of my estate

and my wife to be buried in a Christian way — And I do for the execution of this

In the first place I give and bequeath an 80 my beloved wife Margaret One house and lot the
best feather bed with covering between one half of the draper furniture and two cows but shall
be her choice of my whole Stock and a decent sufficient part of the best during her widowhood
I likewise give to my oldest daughter Janet One horse to the value of fifteen pounds with
One saddle and bridle One cow one feather bed with covering One fourth part of the draper
furniture and ten pounds besides — Likewise I give to my second daughter Mary One
horse saddle and bridle and covering One cow one fourth part of the draper furniture
and ten pounds besides and it goes to her with her Mother on the same article of life as
Married — And in this I agree to the clause in my last will in regard to her
leaving out first ^{the} naming part of the will — It can be remanded of my other
lands and houses able to be divided by two or different men chosen by the executors and
qualified for that purpose and equally divided among my other three sons according
to the present will Only reserving to my youngest son John Part of the whole what
may be necessary to furnish him with a competency of earthly learning at the
discretion of the executors — As I likewise make and ordain David Carson
and John Strain as the sole executors of this my last will and testament —
And I do hereby utterly disallow revoke and disannul all and every other
former will and instrument ratifying and confirming this and no other to be
my last will and testament signed sealed and acknowledged in the
present ^{year}

The foregoing will was proven in court by the oaths of
John Strain and David Carson to be read at Maine
Sept 1790
