To the worshipped Court of said County now in session for the County aforesaid. The petition of Edward Gleason and Polly R. Gleason administrators of John W. Gleason de^d. Your petitioners beg leave to state to your worship that since the death of said John they have been appointed and duly qualified in this Court as administrators of his estate. They would further state that the personal part of the personal estate of the said John consists in negro property that is to say, one negro woman partly supposed to be between 35 and 38 years of age one negro man named Addison aged about 23 years one negro boy named Carroll aged some where about Ten years one negro girl named Dorinda aged seven or eight years one negro girl named Julia aged about three years one negro girl not named aged about one year the other personal property it is believed is not more than a hundred dollars in value if that amount. The Estate is indebted to an amount considerably more than the value of all the personal property besides or exclusive of the negroes. Your petitioners Polly Gleason widow of said John is, under the laws of Tennessee as she is a widow entitled to have the personal property of her late husband after his just debts and liabilities are paid, her said husband having died without any lawful issue. Your petitioners further state that the other distributees or persons entitled to a distribution

Madison Pick in right of his wife Eliza D. - Many fam. friends daughters of Amos, some now deceased your petitioners represent to your worship that their only being two negroes in all at this time and eight distributed, two of whom, only being entitled to half the personal estate after payment of debts, it will be impossible or extremely inconvenient to distribute the personal estate and pay the debts of said John without selling said negroes as well as the other personal estate - they therefore pray your worship, to make an order to authorize your petitioners to sell said slaves on the usual credit as they have no doubt they cannot do their duty to themselves and the others concerned in any other way

I Samuel Henry of the County of White being sick and weak in body but perfect mind and recollection knowing the uncertainty of human existence do make and ordain this my last will and Testament - first my will is that my son William Henry have a full fifty three year old mead spring and a mead saddle now in the house to him forever -

2^d My will is that my beloved wife Polly Henry shall reside and take possession of the farm and lands upon which I now live and keep possession of all of my house and kitchen furniture farming utensils and that she allow for her use a sufficient quantity of stock to support her and my four youngest children for the purpose of raising and educating of my said youngest children which I wish to be during her life a widow -

3^d My will is that as some of my children have hitherto received a part and portion of my property that they should receive no more until the other of my children shall be raised to wit Robert Morgan Bussan Samuel and William have each received a portion of my estate to wit about sixty acres each. That so soon as my youngest children shall arrive at the age of twenty years that my executors herein after named shall pay to them the said sum of property of sixty acres so as to make all my children have equal portions of my property provided it can be done in the opinion of my executors without diminishing my said wife of

the means of raising the balance of my said youngest children agreeable to the intention here expressed. 4th My will is that should my wife Mary survive that she shall have child's part of all my present share and share alike and that all of the property which remains after satisfy the intention here expressed be divided amongst my children share and share alike, and the like disposition of the my children above it a part Mary at the death of my wife. 5th I wish and desire my two sons and young left to remain on the Farm with my wife and that my executors sell such parcels of my property as they may think necessary having a sufficient to satisfy my intention herein expressed. My will is that my daughter Elizabeth Ann have a bed and furniture now in my house which is her own property without diminishing her portion of my property.

6th My will is that the money arising out of the sale of such property as my executors may sell be disposed of by said executors to the payment of my just debts and what remains to be disposed of in supporting my wife and younger children and in their education and that the money be paid at six per cent interest until such time as may be necessary to use the same for said purposes.

7th I wish and appoint my son Samuel Henry and John Walker my executors to carry into effect this my last will and Testament. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand this 6th day of April 1833.
