To the worshipped County Court of Tennessee now in session for the County aforesaid. The petition of Edward Glason and Polly R. Glason administrators of John W. Glason decd. Your petitioners beg leave to state to your worships that since the death of said John they have been appointed and duly qualified in this Court as administrators of his estate. They would further state that the principal part of the personal estate of the said John consists in negro property that is to say, one negro woman formerly supposed to be between 35 and 38 years of age one negro man named Adison aged about 23 years one negro boy named Carroll aged some where about Ten years one negro girl named Dorinda aged seven or eight years one negro girl named Julia aged about three years one negro girl not named aged about one year the other personal property it is believed is not over one hundred dollars in value if that amount. The Estate is indebted to an amount considerably more than the value of all the personal property besides or exclusive of the negroes. Your petitioners Polly Glason widow of said John is, under the laws of Tennessee as she is advised entitled to have the personal property of her late husband after his just debts and liabilities are paid, her said husband having died without any lawful issue. Your petitioners further state that the other distributees or persons entitled to a distribution

wife Mary Anne. Edward, James, William, George & Susan. Dec. Madison Pick in right of his wife Eliza D. —. Many families, some daughters of some, some now deceased. Your petitioners represent to your worship that their only living negroes in all at this time are eight distributed, seven of whom, only being entitled to half the personal estate after payment of debts, it will be impossible or extremely inconvenient to distribute the personal estate and pay the debts of said John without selling said negroes as well as the other personal estate — they therefore pray your worship, to make an order to authorize your petitioners to sell said slaves on the usual credit as they have no doubt they cannot do their duty to themselves and the others concerned in any other way.

In the Name of God. Amen! I Charles Carter son of the County of York and State of Tennessee being much advanced in age and very infirm in body, but of sound and disposing mind and memory thanks be given to God for the same. Calling to mind, the uncertainty of life, and that it is appointed unto all men once to die. He makes and ordains this my last will and testament in form following, Namely: I give up my immortal soul into the hands of the Omnipotent God, who made me, trusting in his mercy for a happy immortality, and my body to be returned to the dust from whence it came and be buried by my executors hereinafter named in a decent Christian like manner not doubting but that at the day of the resurrection of the dead my soul and body will again be united. And as to the worldly goods which it hath pleased God to bestow upon me, I will devise and bequeath as follows: Namely 1st In the first place, I give and bequeath to my dearly beloved wife Rebecca Carter one negro woman named Femina, and one negro woman named Betty and their future increase to be by my said wife held and enjoyed during her natural life.

2nd I give and bequeath unto my beloved son William Carter one negro boy named Benjamin and one negro girl named Matilda to him and his heirs executors or administrators forever. Together with all the future increase of said negro Matilda in like manner. And to my son George Washington Carter I give and bequeath one negro boy named Thomas and one negro girl named Matilda together with all the future increase of the said Matilda to him and his heirs executors or administrators forever. Providing nevertheless it is my will and desired that in case either of my two sons William or George all Carter should die under the age of twenty one years and unmarried that his share under this my will shall go to the survivor, and should they both die under said age and unmarried, then it is my will and desired that my said wife Rebecca Carter (if living) shall have the negroes hereby given to my said sons William and George all to be by her disposed of as she or her executors or administrators may think proper.

3rd And I hereby give and bequeath unto my beloved son William Carter and George all Carter after the death of my said wife Rebecca Carter the aforesaid negro women Femina and

Polly and their future increase to be equally divided between them my said two sons should and should not, should nothing of them did before he arrived at the age of twenty one or twenty two, then it is my will and desire that his share in said property shall go to and vest in the survivor.

4th. I have hitherto given to the children of my first wife as much property consisting of land and negroes as I intend for them namely - I gave to my daughter Nancy wife of Henry Slaughter one negro named Danny and a tract of land, and some other property - I gave to James Carter one negro woman named Liza and a tract of land - I gave to Staunton Carter one negro girl named Lelia and a tract of land - I gave to my daughter Lucy wife of James Slaughter two negro girls named Fane and Minny - I gave to my daughter Polly who is now dead but was wife of John Charles a negro girl named Chancy and a boy named George Washington - And I gave to my daughter Polly who is now dead, but who was wife of John McDaniel two negro girls Rick and Maria and other property was given by me to said children, and they and to take nothing by this will in addition to what was given as aforesaid.

5th. One Thomas Dale Carter of Jackson County has now in his possession a negro man of mine named Harry and a tract of land containing two hundred and forty acres in said county of Jackson which he was to keep for three years and of which he has expended and was for the use of said land and negro for said three years to pay a debt of about four hundred & two or eleven dollars and interest to Smith & Co. of Gainesborough.

Now it is my will and desire and I do so order that the said Dale Carter pay said debt and that he surrender said land & negro immediately after my death. And I do bequeath and devise to my executors said negro man Harry and the aforesaid tract of land to be by them sold to raise and pay all my debts and funeral expenses and particularly to pay debts and interest to John Fryer, the title amounting to five hundred and fifty dollars without interest and should thus be a surplus after paying the debts and funeral expenses then it is my will that the said Rebecca Carter have it to her own use. I hereby declare that the tracts of land purchased by John Fryer in the name of Rebecca Carter my said wife and Leliana & George M. Carter is not in trust for me but for their own proper use benefit & behoof forever.

6th. I hereby will ordain and appoint John Fryer and my wife Rebecca Carter executors of this my last will and

form will or will by me made publishing and declaring this to be my last will & testament - The testimony whereof I have subscribed my name and affix my seal this 15th day of May A.D. 1829. Signed sealed published and declared by the said Charles Carter his wife his last will & testament in our presence, and we in presence of each other and in presence and at the request of said testator have subscribed our names as witnesses thereto - The words "if living" inserted before signed.

opinion of my executors without diminishing my said wife of

the means of raising the balance of my said youngest children agreeable
to the intention here expressed. 4th My will is that should my wife
Mary agree that she shall have a child's part of all my property share and
share and that all of the property which remains after satisfy the
intention before expressed be divided amongst my children Shaw and
Shaw alike, and the like disposition of the my children above it as per
Mary at the death of my wife. 5th I wish and desire my two sons
and young both to remain on the farm with my wife and that my
executors sell such parcels of my property as they may think necessary
