In the name of God. Amen! I Samuel Henry
of the County of White being sick and weak in body but perfect
mind and recollection knowing the uncertainty of human existence
do make and ordain this my last will and Testament: first My will
is that my son William Henry have a bond fully three years after my
decease and a man's saddle now in the house to him forever.

2^d My will is that my beloved wife Polly Henry shall reside
and hold possession of the farm and lands upon which I now live
and keep possession of all of my house and kitchen furniture farming
utensils and that she allow for her use a sufficient quantity of
stock to support her and my four youngest children for the
purpose of raising and educating of my said youngest children
which I will to her during her life a widowhood.

3^d My will is that as some of my children have hitherto
received a part and parcel of my property that they should receive no more
until the others of my children shall be raised to wit Peter Morgan
Benjamin Samuel and Benjamin have each received a portion of my
estate to wit about sixty acres each. that so soon as my youngest
children shall arrive at the age of twenty years that my
executors hereinafter named shall pay to them the said sum
of property of sixty acres so as to make all my children to have
equal portions of my property provided it can be done in the
opinion of my executor without diminishing my said wife of

the means of raising the balance of my said youngest children according
to the intention here expressed. 4th My will is that should my wife
Mary again that she shall have child's part of all my property and
shall also and that all of the property which remains after satisfying the
intention before expressed be divided amongst my children I will and
shall alike, and the like disposition after my children arrive it over
Mary at the death of my wife. 5th I will and be it my business
and young sons to remain on the farm with my wife and that my
Executors sell such amount of my property as they may think necessary
having a sufficient to satisfy my intention herein expressed. 6th
My will is that my daughter Elizabeth have a bed and furniture
now in my house which is her own property without diminishing
her portion of my property.

7th My will is that the money arising out of the sale of such
property as my executor may sell be disposed of by said executor
to the payment of my just debts and what amount be disposed
of in supporting my wife and youngest children and in their education
and that the money be paid at lawful interest until such time
as may be necessary to use the same for said purpose.

8th I will and appoint my son Samuel Henry and John Walker
my executor to carry into effect this my last will and Testament.
The testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand this 8th day of
April 1834.

Report of a settlement made by Commissioners with
 Alfred Merrill and of the estate of Edward Marlow decd.
 returned upon oath at October Term A.D. 1834.

Pursuant to an order of the worshipful County Court
 for the County made at its July term 1834 appointing us the undersigned
 Commissioners to settle with Alfred Merrill and Edward Marlow decd.
 of the estate of Edward Marlow decd. we have proceeded to said settle-
 ment and upon the production of proper vouchers we find and report
 as follows:

That the property of said Marlow decd. sold by the administrators
 and bought by Alfred Merrill and others as appears from a regularly
 certified copy of the list of sales made at said term 1834 amounted to \$90.04.
 That said Alfred Merrill the admr in the year 1828, became indebted
 to the estate to the sum of Twenty dollars in cancelling a contract
 made between William Marlow decd. the decd. in his life time in
 relation to a horse owned by the decd. now being unsecured \$20.00
 That said Alfred Merrill received of Joseph Merrill a debt which he
 owed to said Edward Marlow decd. amounting to \$10.00
 Computation in all \$120.04

These two last items are furnished by the statement of
 said Alfred Merrill made before us.

We also find from a receipt of David Marlow
 dated 20 Sept. 1834 that he has received from said
 Merrill in the year 1828 all the articles which he
 purchased at the sale which she is and has applied
 to the support and benefit of the family of said Edward
 Marlow. Amounting to the sum of \$80.55 1/2
 That said Merrill on the 28 Sept. 1833 gave to said
 Robert a receipt against said Marlow as appears from
 the act and receipt of said Commissioner to \$21.50.
 That said Merrill gave to John all state in the
 year 1830 as appears from his receipt and sum \$7.40
 That said Merrill gave to John Marlow his account
 which is due to him 1829 to 1831 12.00
 That said Marlow paid Joseph M. Little for husband of
 the children of said Marlow and Marlow as appears from
 said Little's receipt dated the 18 April 1834 the sum \$6.00
 That he gave to John B. Merrill for husband as above
 as appears from a receipt dated 15 April 1834 the sum \$8.00 1/2
 Leaves a balance in favor of admr of \$17.46 1/2

We find \$500.00 paid from the showing made before us said
 Alfred Merrill has paid out and expended more of the estate than came
 to his hands and that not charging him with interest and expenses
 by the property returned to the admr Edward Marlow that the estate

over and above dollars \$15 3/4 cents
 That Edward Marlow the administrator received property of said
 estate to the amount of Eighty 5 1/2 cents.
 Given under our hand at this 13th day of October 1834.
