I give to my daughter Nisiah Rigby, I also give to my beloved wife Sarah Lewis my plantation together with the whole of my household and kitchen furniture, also my part of the present crop, I wish it to be understood that myself and my Grand son James M. Lewis have got an Article respecting the present crop and I want it fulfilled on my part, my wife to enjoy said property during her natural life, and all my surplus property to be sold and my Executor to take care of the money arising therefrom and the interest of said money to be applied to the support of my wife, and should it not be sufficient for her support so much of the principal as may comfortably allow her must be made use of, so it understood that the money arising from the sale of the property and all the balance of my cash notes when collected are included in this bequest.

Further I wish that as quick as convenient will admit after the death of my wife that the property which land her three my be left to sell and the money arising therefrom together with any other money which may be left if any be equally divided among my children and grand children above mentioned each grand child to be equal with a child in comparison when of legal age and my sole executor to this my last will and testament, revoking and disallowing any other will or will heretofore made by me in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 1st day of August 1838.
