Patrick McCutchen will, In the name of God amen I Patrick McCutchen of Williamson County and State of Tennessee have being all the faculties of my mind in their usual vigor, and preparing for that event which is the common lot of all human beings in order that no disputes may arise about what it has pleased the Almighty to grant to my industry and in order to make such a disposition of all my worldly affairs as shall be most consistent with my feeling do make and ordain this my last will and Testament hereby revoking all others heretofore made— In the first place it is my will and desire that my executors hereafter mentioned shall pay all my just debts with the greatest exactness as I have hitherto understood to do myself that no one can tax me with injustice Secondly, I will and bequeath to my Brother James McCutchen to my Brother Samuel McCutchen to the legal heirs of my Brother John McCutchen deceased to the legal heirs of my Brother William McCutchen deceased to the legal heirs of my sister Sarah McCutchen deceased to the legal heirs of my sister Margaret Bucknam deceased the several sums following to wit, To my Brother James three dollars, to my Brother Samuel three dollars, to the heirs of my Brother John Deceased, jointly two dollars, to the heirs of my Brother William Deceased, jointly one dollar & fifty cents to the heirs of my sister Sarah deceased, jointly one dollar, to the heirs of my sister Elizabeth deceased, jointly one dollar, to be paid by my executors whenever called for after twelve months from the time of my decease Thirdly, I will and bequeath to my beloved wife Hannah during her natural life the Tract of Land on which I now live, with all its appurtenances together with all the residue of my Personal property of every kind including the slaves which shall remain after the payment of my just debts mentioned in the first article and the several legacies mentioned in the second amounting to twelve and fifty cents and a contingency which shall be hereafter mentioned to be used as she may think proper the slaves nevertheless to be subject to the arrangement to be made in a subsequent article

of this Testament. Fourthly I will and bequeath to Patrick M. Cutchen fourth son of my Brother Samuel M. Cutchen my right, interest and claim to an undivided part of a Tract of Land for which Matthew Patton gave an obligation to James M. Cutchen and to which I have together with the said James & Samuel M. Cutchen a claim for a certain portion not now recited to the expense & loan out by Samuel M. Cutchen on the Education of the said Patrick but if the claim which is now litigating in law should not amount to two hundred dollars it is my will that the same shall be equal to the sum of two hundred dollars out of my own property which is the contingency mentioned in the third article. Fifthly I will and bequeath to the said Patrick M. Cutchen fourth son of my Brother Samuel M. Cutchen and to Elizabeth Larkins daughter of John Larkins by his first wife Margaret Smith and equally the land on which I now live with all its appurtenances together with all the residue of my Personal property at law excepted, which shall remain after the payment of my just debts and the same legacies mentioned in the second article and after making good the deficiency of two hundred dollars mentioned as a contingency in the fourth article to Patrick M. Cutchen or sexually, to take effect at the death of my beloved wife Hannah to when the same property is given during her natural life as mentioned in the third article. Sixthly I do my will and desire that my negroe man named Jack aged about twentyfour years also my negroe man slave named Ben aged about nineteen years also my negroe woman slave named Rose aged about twenty six years together with what children she may hereafter have (if any) before the death of my wife Hannah, also my negroe girl slave named Clara aged about seven years, also my negroe girl slave named Phebe aged about seven years also my negroe boy slave named Thomas aged about four years, also my negroe girl slave named Harriett aged about two years also my negroe girl slave named Maria aged about two months, the four last named slaves being the children of the above named Rose, shall all remain each at the time of the death of my beloved wife Hannah to whom they are given during her natural life as mentioned in the third article, be liberated from slavery, and forever entirely set free, provided those who are not now of age or shall not have arrived to the age of twentyone years at the happening of the death of my beloved wife Hannah shall be subject to the following disposition (Viz) Clara shall at the contract and under the direction of my Brother

until her arrival at the age of twentyone years and then be set free, Scinthia, Ben, Thomas, Harriett & Maria shall be at the contract and under the direction of James Marshall my wife's Brother until they shall each respectively arrive at the age of twentyone years, at which time or times they are to be each respectively liberated and forever set free, Lastly I do hereby nominate and appoint by bequest my friend Samuel M. Cutchen and my trusty and well beloved brother Samuel M. Cutchen and my trusty friend James Marshall Executors of this my last Will and Testament. In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and Seal this twenty ninth day of April in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twelve

Twenty Barrels of Corn and my blacksmith tools and further my Will & desire is that my Executors shall pay particular attention to the aforesaid free Negroes so that they shall be under no incumbrance whatever And whereas there is long & old Existing Accounts between my son Nicholas & my self and my Brother Hardon & my self which is now out of date and our recollection and whereas I hold my Son Nicholas Bond for considerable money & my Brother Hardon holds my Bond which last Bond I wish discharged out of the first and not otherwise And after all my last debts is paid as aforesaid I wish all the rest residue and remainder of my Estate of what kind or nature whatsoever to be sold for the best price that can be had But remonstrated that Peter Hainston of Stokes County N. Carolina has a power authorizing him to sell the Snow Creek Iron works & lands appertaining thereto & transmit me the money which proceeds of said or whom hereafter sold I give & bequeath one third

part thereof to Nicholas Seales. half the crop growing or on hand not other wise disposed
of at the time of my decease Item I give and bequeath
unto my daughter Elizabeth Old the negroes, stock, and house
hold furniture which I have heretofore lent her now in her
possession also five hundred acres of Land lying in said
County of Williamson which I have already made her husband
Thomas Old a deed for all which I give unto her and her
heirs for ever Item I give and bequeath unto my
three Grand Children Sally Ann & Hartwell Hobbs three
negroes in the following manner (To wit) To Sally Hobbs a negro
girl named Little Susa, To Ann Hobbs a negro girl named
Hannah, and to Hartwell Hobbs a negro boy named Samual
which I give to them and their heirs forever provided they
all believing at my decease otherwise it is my will
and desire that the survivors or survivors shall

have wholly or equally the negroes or negroes devised with their increase to the deceased to them and their heirs for ever. I give and bequeath to my Son Halbut Reese the land & plantation which I gave him in Dinwiddie County Virginia & which he has since sold to Doct. Hardway also the negroes heretofore given by me to him together with their increase also the household furniture & stock of every kind left in his possession by me at the time of my removal to the Western Country also the Thousand pounds which I lent him to begin business with all which I give to him & his heirs forever. Further it is expressly to be understood that the above mentioned stock was that left in his possession at the store & no more.

I give and bequeath to my son Beverly Reese all my land lying between White oak creek & Cox road, except what I have before given, reserving one acre to the meeting house there on containing fourteen hundred acres be the same more or less. also eight negroes and their increase if any (to wit) Charles Caesar Big Bob Little Bob Charlotte Winney Rheabon and David, also one feather bed & furniture, six head of cattle & one head of sheep and twenty head of pigs to him & his heirs for ever.

I give and bequeath to my Daughter Matilda Reese one feather bed & furniture, also such other articles of house hold furniture as are called here also five hundred acres of land lying in said County of Williamson on West Harpeth Beginning where Pattersons road crosses West Harpeth thence south from the bank of West Harpeth where said road crosses with said road to the next road East with said road to Allen Hills line thence north to west Harpeth thence down West Harpeth with its meanders to the Beginning containing five hundred acres and be the same more or less. also eight negroes (to wit) Little Diley Moses May Mucka, Salina Briston George & Chelsey all which I give to her and her heirs forever also one Sarah fully now at my other

plantation to her and her heirs for ever. I give and bequeath to my Daughter Jane Watson five hundred acres of land in said County of Williamson which I have made her husband John Watson a deed for also the negroes & furniture which I have heretofore lent her now in her possession all which I give to her and her heirs forever. I give to my son Patrick Reese twelve hundred acres of land in said County of Williamson including the houses & plantations where on now live reserving five hundred acres including said improvements for the use of my wife Sally Reese during her natural life as herein before mentioned also twelve negroes (to wit) Sam Peter Edmund Little Aaron, Ben Lewis Jim Ganney, Gillum, Seck Lewis & Tom also one Aaron more commonly called his Roan fully also at the decease of my wife it is my will & desire that he should have all my house hold & kitchen furniture also the plantation utensils lent to my wife as herein before mentioned to him & his heirs for ever. It is my will and desire that all my Estate both real and personal not herein before mentioned or disposed of be equally divided between my children (to wit) Elizabeth M. Lane Watson, Matilda Beverly & Patrick Reese to them and their heirs for ever. It is also my desire that the nine negroes herein before mentioned as lent to my wife with their increase at her decease be equally divided between my five children last above mentioned to them & their heirs forever. I give to my daughter Nancy Hobbs one dollar in cash to her & her heirs for ever. Lastly I nominate Thomas M. & John Watson my sons in Law and my friend Abraham North Executors to this my last Will & Testament & fully work ing and making void all wills by me heretofore made.
