Brum I do further give and bequeath to my daughter Sally Brum a cow & Calf and a bed & furniture and my daughter Polly Brum I give a cow and Calf a cotton wheel a bed & furniture my two horses hites and all the farming tools I have as appendages to the farm to be used for the joint benefit of those my slaves to whom I have left the farm and to be disposed of in the same manner my stock of hogs I leave to those named in this my last will & testament my large family Bible and hymn Book I leave for the use of those of my family who may still reside in my house three Volumes of Mr. Fletcher's Works I give to my son Abraham Brum to my son Jeremiah Brum I give one volume of Mr. John Bailey's Sermons and one Vol. American magazine Saints and Reiefs seven sermons I give to my wife Christiana Patten I give to my daughter Sally devout exercises by Mrs. Mary Spencer I give to my daughter Polly and the balance of my books to be left amongst them all I give a Louisiana to my son John Wesley Brum I want these my slaves above named to pay what little I owe out of what they can spare most conveniently I do hereby nominate constitute and appoint my two Sons Jeremiah Brum and Abraham Brum and John Mayfield the executors of this my last will and testament John Brum & C. Mayfield signed sealed and delivered in the presence of witnesses present John Fielder William C. Allen which last will and testament as aforesaid was produced in open court October fifteen 1819 and was duly proven by the oaths of John Fielder & William Allen subscribing witness thereto and the same was ordered to be recorded.

and nineteen make and publish this my last will Testament in manner following that is to say first I give and bequeath to my step son John McCord one hundred acres of land lying in Benton County and State of Tennessee on the waters of Roaring River being the land that he now lives also one negro boy named Jack to him and his heirs forever 2nd I give and bequeath to my son Adam Hendrix one hundred acres of land lying in Benton County and State of Tennessee on the waters of Roaring River it being the land he now lives on also one negro boy named Patterson to him and his heirs forever 3rd I give & bequeath to my daughter Nancy Hill one negro boy named Ned and one named George to her and the heirs of her body forever but if she doth have any child hereafter it is my will that her son Elasha Hendrix shall have the same boy named Ned 4th I give and bequeath to my daughter Ruth Jackson one negro woman named Lucy and if the said Lucy or Indah doth hereafter have a child it is my will that the said Ruth Jackson shall have one of them to her and the heirs of her body forever 5th I give also bequeath to my son Thomas Hendrix sixty acres of Land being one half of the land that I now live on and one negro girl named Savannah one horse bridle and saddle one cow and calf one cow and pig one cow and lamb and one feather bed and furniture to him and his heirs forever 6th I give and bequeath to my son Isaac Hendrix thirty acres of land being one half of the land that I now live on also one negro woman named Lucy one horse bridle and saddle one cow and calf one cow and pig one cow and lamb and one feather bed and furniture to him and his heirs forever 7th I bind unto my beloved wife Mary Hendrix all the other part of my estate that hath not been before named during her natural life and also the one hundred and twenty acres of Land that is bequeathed to Thomas & Isaac and it is to be understood that they are not to have any right to the said land until after the death of their mother and the said Isaac Hendrix is not to have any claim or right to the said negro woman Lucy until after the death of his mother and provided the said Lucy do or shall have more children in the lifetime of my wife it shall be in her power to give them to the said Isaac Hendrix and after the death of the said Mary Hendrix to the rest of the property that is left to her shall be equally divided between my two daughters Nancy Hill and Ruth Jackson witness whereof I the said Thomas Hendrix hath hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal the day and year above written Thomas H. 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from said sale and all monies that shall or may accrue to said estate shall be appropriated to education of my children or to such thereof as may be necessary and for other necessary family expenses Stern 1819. It is my will & desire that in the event that my said Ann T. Blasby should marry again or my eldest child then living shall have attained the age of twenty one years that an equal division of my estate be made between my children then living leaving to my said wife Ann T. Blasby the privilege of taking two parts according to law. Lastly I nominate & appoint John W. Phillips Madison County Alabama Notary & James Hick of the county of Williamson & State of Tennessee as executors to the my last will & testament and that no security be required of them for the performance of their duties as executors of this my last will & testament discharging all others before by me made in testimony whereof I have unto set my hand and affixed my seal this twenty ninth day of May in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixteen Philip Blasby D.C. signed sealed and delivered published & declared in presence of us Robert W. In the name of God Amen I Thomas Edward Sumner a citizen at
the time of making ~~this~~ ^{my} Will of Williamson in the State of Tennessee being of
sound mind and memory and knowing on what day that he is
now appointed for all men to die and the hour of his deposition
unknown to me do make ordain and declare this to be my last
will and testament revoking all others heretofore by me made
My Will. I believe that the Almighty Ruler of the Universe
never intended that one part of the human family should become
superior to the others in price or honor of another part, believing
also that liberty is the natural and inalienable birthright of all
mankind and that we are all born with the same right and
privileges no matter what clime or country may have given us birth
or what colour nature may have stamped us with having from my
youth held in abhorrence every kind of slavery that degrades man
whatever cast or mask the might assume and constantly believing
that it is repugnant to the gospel of our Blessed Saviour Jesus Christ
and pure Republicanism with these ideas and impressions on my
mind which have not been nor never can be extinguished by time

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nor by the sophistical reasonings and arguments of men & others from
the pulpit the Bench the Bar or the Press. It has ever been my ardent
and anxious desire to emancipate my slaves or negroes in my life
time that I might settle them on lands of their own and content
to them my admonitions and fostering hand till the laws of the State
in which I have lived has permitted my doing as I (Methumur) de-
sire by them my conscience forbids me to sell to goods or to will my
slaves or negroes to any person or persons whatever for the purpose
of being held as property or detained in slavery therefore it is my will
and desire that all and every one of my slaves or negroes and their
increase should be free and emancipated from slavery and so to leave
an to this last postivity and I will them so accordingly yet not
to offend against any existing law I leave them my negroes in trust
to a Society in the State of Pennsylvania denominated and known
in law by the Pennsylvania Society for promoting the abolition of
slavery and the relief of free negroes unlawfully held in bondage and
I also give in trust to said Society five thousand dollars out of
any money due to me by bonds or notes of hand for the purpose
of purchasing good labor pair of horses animals tools for agri-
culture &c &c the manufactory clothes and house hold furniture
and kitchen utensils also provisions in plenty for the first year
they are settled on the lands bought for them and to repay expenses
of moving them to their lands and I desire that the lands bought
for them may be near some Town or Village as price and conveni-
ence will admit and that the lands when bought be laid out
like a village to have in each lot not less than twenty five acres
of land my desire is that my slaves remain on the lands where they now
live ~~the~~ ^{the} Sumner and work for their support and clothing until they are con-
veyed to the state or territory where they are to be settled on their own lands
and I desire that they may be paid and settled on their own lands
within twelve months after my death and that their names ages and
complexions and other marks be registered in the county in which
they are paid & settled but should the Pennsylvania abolition society
aforesaid refuse to take the said negroes aforesaid under their protection
for the purpose of having them paid and settled I leave them in
trust to my executors hereafter named to have them emancipated
and settled on lands bought for them and the five thousand dollars
left for the use of said negroes in trust of the abolition society
I leave in trust of my said executors to be applied as I have above
directed and I desire my executors hereafter named to have my negroes
emancipated and settled on their own lands within twelve months
after my death if possible I give to my beloved wife Mary Sumner
in case she claims us dead in my slaves or negroes and starts no
obstacle in the way of their being emancipated and to be free from
slavery four hundred and fifty acres of land more or less

to wit beginning at a large and white oak (Philburne) which was
the beginning corner of my Father's service right thence East to the
bank of Nelson Creek thence north by a broken line to the South
side of a knoll near the cotton patches there thence to the western
boundary of my father's service right thence South to the
beginning lot or to include the improvements so as to include
the improvements about I live. To her & her heirs forever.

Item I give unto my beloved wife Mary Sumner on condition
she does not directly or indirectly claim any down coming slaves
nor stirs no obstacles in the way of their being emancipated and set
free from slavery - Eleven thousand dollars - my stock in the brick

Item I give to my Cousin John S. Rufusone the marked half of my table
spoons which are made of Silver and the one half of the tea Spoons to him
and his heirs forever. The money I have in the hands of Lump Plum-
mer Esquire of Marionton North Carolina if he has not bought
back stock with it for me I desire that stock may be bought
with it and I give the said stock to my sister Lucy Bount
on these conditions to wit that she will support in clothing
good eat and lodging my three old negroes Sancer Hagan and Tom
who are now living near her plantation in Warren during their
natural lives to her and her heirs forever. Item I give to my Sister
Lucy S. Bount on condition she emancipates and sets free
from Slavery at or before her death or leaves them by will to the
Pennsylvania Society for the abolition of Slavery to be paid by them
and funds sufficient to move and settle them that is all the slaves
she inherited by my father and brothers death four thousand dollars
to her and her heirs forever. Item I give to Phillips Sumner my
husband the following tract of land to wit beginning at John
Swancys South west corner thence East to John S. Rufusones corner
in Swancys line thence South with Rufusones line to my wife
Mary Sumner North East corner thence west with (Philburne) the

Chapman all of Williamson County and John Comerelle of Parkville executors of this my last and testament Should any dispute arise relative to any word sentence or paragraph I desire it may be left to three good impartial men to decide on I have made no provision for the payment of my debts (Mr. Summer) debts as I dont recollect owing ten dollars in the world but request my executors to pay all just debts out of my monies due me or now in my possession Inclosed with this my last will is a schedule of my estate as near as I can recollect my slaves excepted at the bottom of every page I have signed my name as near like as possible Signed this my last will and seal'd with my seal this thirtieth day of September in the year of our Lord in thousand and eight hundred and six ten Mr. Summer (Signed) acknowledged in presence of us Jacob Adams Richard R. P.
