I George Bennett of Williamson County State of Tennessee being weak in body but of sound mind and memory do here make my last will and Testament in these words and give following. To wit. I will that all my just debts be satisfied I have I leave to my wife Anna Bennett during her natural life or to whom my tract of land whereon I now live together with all my household and kitchen furniture, with all my tools and stock of every description, with the waggon and harness with four negroes namely Ned, Bob, Betty, & Lilly. I also give to John C. Bennett one half of land whereon he now lives which I have at one hundred dollars also one negro girl named ally which I value at two hundred dollars & one horse which I value at thirty five dollars & one sheep which I value at five dollars, & one cow & half which I value at twelve dollars. All amounting to six hundred and fifty five dollars. I also give to Jane M. Bennett one negro girl named Lucy which I value at one hundred dollars & two cows which I value at twenty four dollars, amounting to two hundred and two dollars. I also give to Joseph Smith one negro girl named Rebecca which I value at two hundred & fifty dollars, & one horse which I value at twenty five dollars and one cow which I value at twelve dollars & also four hundred dollars to be paid out of my notes & accounts & by the sales of Cobs and a half of corn and last and amounting to two hundred and twenty five dollars. I also give to Mary M. Bennett one tract of land whereon I now live at the death of my wife or my death, to wit. fifty acres of land more or less lying on the south side of the road leading from the mouth of the creek which I value at one half of the tract and will the other half to be sold and the net paid to the trustee at the date then to be made and also one man worth fifty dollars and also one negro girl to be worth one hundred dollars to be paid from sales of the stock and produce of the farm which is located in county of Washington of age and good color to be worth six dollars each and amounting to seven hundred and twenty dollars. I also give to Margaret Bennett one negro girl named Abigail which I value at two hundred dollars and two cows worth twelve dollars amounting in all to two hundred and twelve dollars. I also give to Elizabeth Bennett one negro girl named Nancy which I value at two hundred dollars and one horse which I value at twenty dollars at the death of said Elizabeth and one cow worth five dollars amounting in all to two hundred and twenty five dollars and two cows worth twelve dollars. I also give to my son George M. Bennett Dorcas and Rebecca his husband's dollars each to be paid from sales of the Negro I should to my wife or to her estate or some of the trustees proper to distribute it sooner, also one horse and saddle and Bridle which I value at one hundred dollars each, & two cows each worth twelve dollars each amounting in all seven hundred dollars and twelve each. Also I desire my little Anna Bennett should furnish all my unmarried children with their share they leave her or marry - to be equal with those that are married. - I also appoint my wife Anna Bennett Executor and my son John C. Bennett & Henry Hunter Executors of this my last will and Testament, Resolving all other Wills made by me whether verbal or written nullifying and confirming this my last will and Testament.
