In the name of God, Amen: The twenty-fifth day of June one thousand eight hundred and twenty two I William Logan in the County of Williamson and State of Tennessee being much indisposed and weak in body but of perfect mind and memory thanks be given to God, therefore, and calling to mind the mortality of my body knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die do make this my last will and testament that is to say principally and first of all I recommend my soul to God, who gave it and my body to be returned to its Mother Earth and as touching such worldly estate wherewith it has pleased God to bless me on this life, I give, devise and dispose of the same in the following manner and form to wit my will and I order that all my just debts and funeral charges be paid. I then give and bequeath to my beloved wife Catharine Logan two hundred acres of land Beginning at my old corner a small regular farms the said original line running West so far as to include the improvement where I now live thence a Northwesterly direction so as not to interfere with the plantation whereon James Reynolds now lives nor the plantation whereon Thomas FAVOR now lives in all to include two hundred acres with all the things thereunto belonging such as my mazon and gear and all the farming tools my blacksmith tools my still and vessels and every thing thereunto belonging also all my household and kitchen furniture and all my library to be left at her disposal as she may think proper to distribute among my children except John Newlon's share hereunto which I give and bequeath to youngest son Newlon Wilson Logan my wish and desire is that all the stock of every kind be kept on the premises for the use and benefit of the family. I also will that all my children be equally schooled male and female according to their several capacities. It is also my desire that the hereinafter named executors be authorized to collect all the money rents and profits due my estate or may become due: Also if any negro fellow born doth not behave himself as a faithful servant to be sold by the executors to the best advantage and that money and all that is or may become due the estate to be put to interest or laid out in or for young negroes as they executors may think such advantage to the children my will and desire is that the two negro women Molly and Lucy be left at the disposal of my beloved wife Catharine as she may think proper. I also will that a certain negro boy named Peter remain upon the premises and be under the direction of my wife Catharine until my youngest son Newlon Wilson becomes of age and then the said Peter to be disposed of by the executors to the benefit of the children. I will and bequeath that the balance of land eight hundred and seventeen acres be equally divided among my ten male children according to quantity and quality each son to receive his equal share of the land as they become of age. I also will and bequeath to my two daughters Elizabeth Perry and Mary Callison a black negro girl a piece when they marry or become of age. It is also my will and desire that the will and testament should be open during the time of two years after my decease for the purpose of

settling the business of the estate and the witnesses constitute make and ordain my dearly beloved wife Catharine Callison and John Henderson executors of this my last will and testament wholly and solely and lawfully utterly the allow make and do annul all and every other wills and testaments bequest and execution by me at any time before named or made or bequeathed ratifying this and no other to be my last will and testament signed sealed and allowed by the said William Logan to be his last will and testament in presence of us
