Gen. Emory at Reg. Va. Vols.  
June 18th 1862.  
Capt O'Brien A.D.C. Jr., on Sunday morning, the  
1st inst. the morning orders Gen. Shields appeared in  
force on the east bank of North River at Port Republic.  
We upon I immediately sent my Regt under  
arms and ordered to take a very little while I  
was directed to move the regiment to a position on  
the N.E. of the village road and to throw out a line of  
skirmishers. This post was in position on the left and  
was the only point from which a flank movement  
of the enemy was apprehended. I threw out the  
skirmishers and deployed them as to prevent an  
advance on the left in this position until  
about dark when I was ordered to withdraw and  
march the Regt to camp, crossing the river at  
Port Republic and encamping near the village. I took  
part in the engagement of some day, between a portion  
of the Confederate forces and the evening orders Gen. Shields  
ordered through ranks and file 31st A. Monday the 9th at  
5 1/2 P.M. I was ordered to cross the North River at Port  
Republic and marching down the river a short distance  
to a place called W. I arrived that the enemy were pre-  
paring to give battle. The 1st Regt (Col Allen) was in  
front of me. His Regt. filed to the right through an open  
field. I was directed to follow and I followed. Col Allen  
whereupon I filed to the right following Col Allen in  
passing through the open field. The enemy's battery was  
brought to bear upon the regiment but fortunately doing  
no damage. Arriving at the woods on the right, I formed  
on the right of the woods in line of battle. Then we dis-  
mounted and advanced through a very dense wood and

at that time, arriving at a point in a field (that  
 the time as before was very dark, the morning falling  
 darkness of the darkness that I had observed in  
 the enemy. This was a considerable killing for  
 many who were concealed in the brush and although  
 very close range in damage was done, the enemy sur-  
 vived. At that moment the enemy began to throw grape  
 shot into the woods which they continued for  
 some time with great violence, from the effects of which  
 many were wounded, some fatally. Here Col. Allen  
 told me to fall back which I did. Shortly thereafter  
 told me to move forward with him. After advancing  
 a distance the retreat of the enemy commenced and  
 we in pursuit. Officers and men all acted well and  
 were actively engaged with the enemy but the con-  
 flict was such as to justify me in saying that the  
 fight would have been equal to any other.

I have the honor to submit the following report of the

8th & 9th Mass. near the town of Port Republic -  
The engagement of the 8th Mass. was a serious one, the enemy did not  
hesitate, the 2nd Regt Mass. was ordered to support Capt. Cassin's  
Battery, and remained near it during the day.  
At an early hour Monday morning the command crossed the  
South River, & moved down the bank leading to Swift Run Gap.  
The command had proceeded about one & a half miles, when the  
enemy made their appearance, & commenced shelling our  
position. The 2nd Regt Mass. was ordered up and took  
position in the field to the left of the line. In the 2nd Regt Mass.

a short distance the rear of it, the command moved on  
leaving fire of shell, for some distance, the Battery moved

I have the honor to  
report the movements of my Division in the  
Battle near Port Republic on the 9<sup>th</sup> June 1862.

When I received the order to march to  
Port Republic, to join in the attack on the  
forces under General Shields, my command  
included in addition to my own Division,  
the 2<sup>nd</sup> Brigade of the Army of the Valley  
District. This brigade under the command of  
Col. J. M. Patton had been attached to my  
command during the engagement of the day  
before. My command had been engaged

with General Fremont throughout the day  
on the 8<sup>th</sup> June and kept upon their arms.  
The Brigades commanded by General Fremont  
and Colonel Patton, (except one regiment) and  
the 1<sup>st</sup> of the Louisiana Regiment Col. Noyes, had  
before night closed in been advanced within  
range of the enemy's musketry. Day was  
breaking on the morning of the 9<sup>th</sup> June, be-  
fore these troops commenced their march  
from this position to the other field at Port  
Republic, seven (7) miles distant, some of  
them without food for 24 hours.

The commands of General Fremont  
and Col. Patton were kept in position to  
hold the enemy under Fremont in check and  
keep him from advancing upon Port Re-  
public, or taking any part in the engagement.

on that day. The difficulty in effecting the crossing of the South Branch of the river at Park Republic, occasioned a delay which separated the forces in my command. When I reached the field, the 8th La. Brigade, commanded by General Taylor, had been sent by Major General Jackson under cover of the woods to attack the enemy in flank and rear. One of the Regiments of the Second (2nd) Brigade of my Division was detached to the left, and I placed the 68th, Col. Scott, and the 44th Va., Col. Letcher, under cover at the woods with the flank towards the enemy.

When, after a severe struggle, from the advantage of position and numbers the enemy were driving our front on the left and the flank of the advancing enemy, (at least two Brigades), came in front, an advance was ordered. The two Regiments bravely led by Colonel Scott rushed with a shock upon the enemy, taking him in flank. For the first time that day, the enemy was then driven back in disorder for some hundreds of yards. At the same instant while our Artillery was retiring rapidly from the field, our piece was halted and opened fire upon the enemy, showing great quickness and decision in the Officers commanding it.

These efforts checked the enemy so long that although Col. Scott's command was driven back to the woods with severe loss, there was time to rally and lead them to

the assistance of the 8th Brigade, General H. Taylor coming which was heard engaging the enemy far to their rear. The remnants of two Regts reached Gen. Taylor, at the moment when, shown in his report, fresh troops of the enemy had driven him from the Battery he had captured. His Brigade formed and advanced with these two Regts and the enemy fled a second time from the Battery and the field, after exchanging a few shots.

The credit of first checking the enemy, and then assisting in his final repulse, and of the capture of the Battery, is due to these two Regts. It would be difficult to find another instance of Volunteer Troops after a severe check, rallying and again attacking the enemy.

To Gen. Taylor and his Brigade belongs the honor of deciding two battles, that of Winchester and this one. As soon as his fire was heard in rear and flank, the whole force of the enemy turned to meet this new foe.

Col. Walker, coming 4th Brigade ordered by the Maj. Genl. Comdg, to follow the 8th Brigade, was lost in the mountains, reported to me, and joined in the present. Gen. Trimble, coming 7th Brigade, with flank of Col. Patton's command, was left to hold Fremont in check, the 52nd Va. Regt. was detached, and fought on the left flank with Gen. Winder.

Col. Scott reports: "I particularly commend the gallantry of Lieut. Walker, Co (B) 44th

On this may have been others equally worthy of commendation, but I could not fail to notice him. When the brigade halted in the field and sat down, he alone sat down, went on foot and attempted to get the brigade to advance still nearer the enemy. I endorse this report and recommend the officer to Executive favor. Lieut. Col. J. M. Jones, Maj. Jas. Barbours, Lieut. J. T. Turner and Capt. Hugh M. Nelson, of my Staff, rendered valuable service in rallying the broken troops. Lieut. G. Campbell Brown was absent, owing to the wound received the day previous.

Enclose sub-reports of Col. Scott and Gen. Taylor - also a detailed list of Killed and Wounded, amounting to 78 Killed, and 535 wounded, and 14 missing in all 617 Killed, Wounded, and missing.

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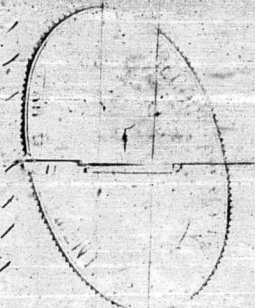
