sharpshooters in off of the same ridge.

At morning Maj. Richmond forward (who was also
in the advance) with an intention to unite my
whole force and show the battle but before
8 o'clock was again the first the enemy advanced
140 men and 1000 lbs of powder was thrown among
their ranks. 400. Captains from all the regts
leading up the road and were in the morning
and fought with no more success than the day
before. The prisoners are waiting the night.

The 1st and 2nd regts of the 64th Va. have been
properly accounted for. The 6th and 10th Regts
lost 400 men and were taken to the front.
Maj. Richmond's regiment lost many with shells
and shells.

Major Capt. Poterle is the wounded

in high severity & now commission officers and

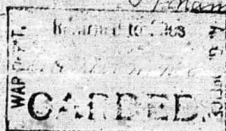

I have the honor to report that
after a week's sickness, on the 25th inst. at 11 1/2
A.M. I returned to my Regiment then on picket
and commanded by Capt. W. K. Bylett, and at the
time engaging the enemy. Capt. Bylett immediately
turned over the command to me & used diligence
to show me the position of our forces & the enemy
and made the following report of the action of
the Regiment up to the time of my arrival, that
on the 24th inst. at 4 1/2 P.M. the 53rd Va Regt the 9th
Va Regt & the 5th Va Battalion were sent out to relieve
the 3rd Va Regt on the advance line between the
Williamsburg Road & the York River Railroad, nothing
of moment transpired during the night. About
8 A.M. on the 25th inst. Capt. Bylett upon visiting
the picket post on the extreme right of the line,
resting on the Williamsburg Road soon ascertained
that one or more Regiments of the enemy were
advancing up the road and about that time heavy
firing commenced on the other side of the road, when
it appeared the pickets had been driven in - cautioning
his pickets to stand their ground until he could

reinforce them. Capt. A. went for his reserve,
consisting of Companies A & D. This little force
was double-quickened to the support of the pickets.
But before it could reach the line, the pickets on
the right next to the road were met retiring before
the enemy, who had suddenly advanced in over-
whelming numbers, driving them in by his immense
odds and rapid advance. The reserve together with the
pickets which had been driven in were promptly
deployed by Capt. A. & set to combat with portions
of our picket line which had not been forced back.
The men were ordered to lie down behind trees to
conceal their small numbers & position in order
that the enemy might be held in check until
reinforcements could arrive. In my hour & a quarter
did this little force of only three small companies
maintain its position against two Regiments
alone & unaided amid a storm of bullets rarely
surpassed for severity. The men were ordered not to
fire until they saw an object & thought they could hit
it. Hence almost every shot told as was indicated
by the frequent cries of those struck. While the right
of the 58th was enduring this fire the enemy had
advanced on the right of the road, and thus flanked
our position & gotten men in the rear of a portion
of it. Still Capt. A. & his command held their ground
until the whole 26th North Carolina came to their

assistance, & whose gallant commander Capt. A.
reported, and was ordered by him to take position
on his left. The 58th Co. & 26th N. C. were now subjected
to a terrific fire for some time but they returned it
with such effect that the enemy was driven back
and the 58th was enabled to resume its picket line.
Except a small portion of it immediately on the road
where from the exposure of a field and the fire from
a battery (placed by the enemy on the road after they
had advanced by us on the right of the Williamsburg
Road) it could not be occupied. There was fighting
along the whole line occupied by the 58th at intervals
during the day, but was indicated mainly on the right.
Several prisoners were taken by the 58th and the
loss of the enemy must have been heavy. Later in
the evening the woods were heavily shelled by the
enemy but the 58th men & officers gallantly stood
their ground. Though they were almost broken down
with fatigue & exhaustion from having been on picket
duty so long. It would be pleasing to mention the names
of those who most gallantly reported themselves, but
where all acted so well it might appear unwise.
As the Regiment has not yet come in, a list of its
casualties cannot now be made out, but it is
believed to be small. When the long continued &
terrible fire to which the Regiment was exposed
considered a small list of casualties would

them to be miraculous, and even only he
explained by the facts that our men were deployed
as skirmishers well concealed & protected, and
that the enemy were so stupid they could not
shoot this battle view is known to be correct
as prisoners taken were found to be intoxicated.
The Regiment is at this time acting
as reserve for the 14th & 38th commanded
by Capt Martin. Capt Light & himself
both being sick and unfit for duty.
