

Next Sunday morning at the Baptist church a funeral sermon commemorative of the life of the lamented Frank C. Armstrong will be preached by the pastor, Rev. Dr. J. H. Hays. The friends of the deceased in town and county are respectfully invited to attend. Red.

Dear Index: Allow me a few lines. I have just heard that this man of God fell on sleep at his residence, near Washington, Ga., on the evening of the 15th of this month; in the green old age of seventy-six. In a Christian life of thirty-eight years, the writer has been associated with not a few persons of spirit, but if he ever knew one more sincere, stronger in faith, more pure in character, more zealous in the word of God, he cannot recall it to church to which our brother belonged. The pastor, who began his work in 1851, was from the text: "Search the scriptures." Twenty years after, when that pastor was called away, the writer, informed by the deceased that he never read him to such a revealed study of the Bible, that for many years he had read the Old Testament, twelve times a year, and the New Testament, twelve times a year. The result of this study was that his heart and mind was saturated with its precepts. He seemed to think and feel in the language and spirit of heaven. For him the power of those times was possessed. His petitions, communications, and his ministrations, were like the Scriptures, and they read more than any letters he like apostolic epistles, than any letters he ever received. In those communications he was so labored for much comfort

trouble, with the result that he has been a much more stimulant to life & labors. During this time he has had several pastors, but at the foot of none of them has he been more willing to sit and learn, than at the feet of the Lord Jesus Christ.

The testimony of one of brother Armstrong's pastors is that while in health, though he lived fartherest from the church, he was always the most punctual and regular of the attendants, and (though imperfect as to the organ of hearing, he was one of

the heart of listeners and retainers of what he heard. For many years he was a great sufferer, but he rarely complained; was full of peace and joy, and seemed ever to realize that his conversation was in heaven. He

The legacy of such a life, to children and family, is more than countless riches. It was honor to live on the same planet with such a man.
