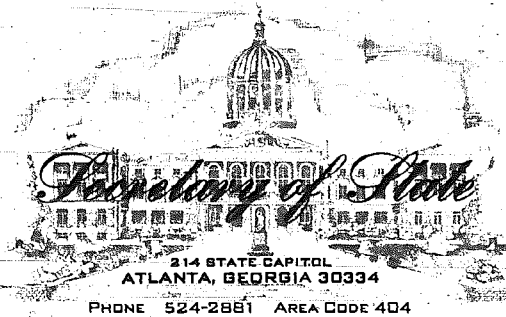

"Georgia- This indenture made the twenty third day of November in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventeen between John Lloyd of the County of Jones and state aforesaid of the one part and Michael Buckhalter of the same county and state of the other part witnesseth that the said John Lloyd for and in consideration of the sum of seven hundred dollars to him in hand paid by said Buckhalter at or before the sealing and delivering of these presents the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged hath granted bargained and sold unto said Buckhalter his heirs or assigns all that tract or parcel of land situate lying and being in the county of Jones containing one hundred and ninety six acres more or less being part of lot no one hundred and fifty three in the eleventh district Baldwin when surveyed now Jones County to Marke Strouds orphans beginning at the south corner of said tract running north forty five west twenty two and a half chains to a state corner on the original line thence north twenty two west fourteen chains to a rock thence north forty eight west seven chains to the head of a branch thence down said branch to the original line thence north forty five east forty one chains to the original corner thence south forty five east forty five chains to the original corner then to the beginning together with all and singular the rights members and appertinances thereunto belonging or in anywise appertaining to the said land and premises for the only use and benefit of him the said Michael Buckhalter his heirs or assigns forever in fee simple said John Lloyd for himself his heirs etc doth warrant and forever defend the above land and premises against the claim of any person or persons whatsoever claiming or to claim in ? whereof the said John Lloyd hath hereunto set his hand and affixed his seal the day and date first above written.

Buckhalter against Michael Buckhalter I Leroy Singleton Sheriff of the county aforesaid did lately seize the tract of land hereinafter described as the property of said Michael Buckhalter and after being duly and publicly advertised agreeable to law did on the sixth day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty nine at the place of public sales in said county of Jones expose the same at public outcry when Andrew I. Lane being the highest bidder the same was knocked off to him at the price of sum of eighty hundred and fifty dollars. Now this indenture made the sixth day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty nine and in the seventy third year of the Independence of the United States of America between the said Leroy Singleton Sheriff aforesaid of the one part and the said Andrew I. Lane of the other part witnesseth that the said Leroy Singleton Sheriff as aforesaid for and in consideration of the sum of eight hundred and fifty dollars to him in hand paid by the said Andrew J. Lane at and before the sealing and delivery of these presents the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged hath bargained granted and sold and by these presents doth grant bargain and sell so far as the office of Sheriff authorized me unto the said Andrew J. Lane one hundred and ninety seven acres of land more or less lying in the eleventh district originally Baldwin now Jones County (number unknown) being the place whereon Michael Buckhalter now lives adjoining lands of William Reynolds and others- together with all and singular the rights members and appertanences unto the said tract of land being belonging or in any wise appertaining and also all the estate right title interest property claim and demand of the said Michael Buckhalter in law reuity or otherwise whatsoever of in or to the same to have and to hold the said trace of land and premises and every part thereof unto the said Andrew I. This Indenture made this the tenth day of January in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty nine between Palatyne Strawther of the county & state aforesaid of the one part and Michael Burkhalter senr of the same place witnesseth that the said Palatyne Strawther hath this day made and delivered to the said Michael Burkhalter senr her certain promisory note subscribed with her hand and bearing even date with these presents whereby the said palatyne Strawther hath promised to pay the said Michael Burkhalter senr or bearer three hundred and six dollars and twenty four cents on or before the twenty fifth day of December next ensuing the date hereof for value received & now for and in consideration of the sum of five dollars by the said Michael Burkhalter senr to the said Palatyne Strawther in hand paid the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged as well as for the better securing the payment of the aforesaid promisory note the said Palatyne Strawther hath granted, bargained and sold and doth by these presents grant, bargain and sell unto the said Michael Burkhalter senr his heirs and assigns all that tract or parcel of land containing one hundred & fifty two acres and a half it being part of Lot (no 179) number one hundred and seventy nine in the eleventh district of Baldwin at the time of survey now Jones county To have and to hold said bargained premises to the said Michael Burkhalter senr his heirs and assigns to his and their own proper use, benefit and behoof forever, and the Palatyne Strawther, for herself her heirs, executors, and administrators the said bargained premises unto the said Michael Burkhalter senr will warrant and forever defend against the claim of herself and her heirs and against the claim of all other persons whatsoever provided nevertheless that of the said Palatyne Strawther her heirs executors and administrators shall and do well and truly pay or cause to be paid unto the said Michael Burkhalter senr his heirs and assigns the aforementioned sum of three hundred and six dollars and twenty four cents on the day and time mentioned and appointed for the payment in the said promisory note mentioned with lawful interest for the same according to the tenor of said note, then and from thenceforth as will this present indenture and the right to the property thereby conveyed as the said promisory note shall cease determine and be void to all interests and purposes In testimony whereof the said Palatyne Strawther hath hereunto set her hand and seal the day and year above written.

THE BURKHALTERS

By O. B. Colquitt
Former Governor of Texas.

Taken from Southern Historical Research Magazine, Dallas, Texas.
April, 1936.

"Now let me give you something about the family of my mother, Ann Eliza Burkhalter, whom I have never ceased to worship, though she has long since gone, more than to that bourne where the 'weary are at rest'. The lessons of trust and faith, and duty, that she has taught me, have never been lost on me.

"Michael Burkhalter, the Senior, the first of my mother's ancestors in America, came to Savannah, Georgia in 1734, either from Holland or from Switzerland. The family tradition says from Holland, but it appears that in Faust and Brumbaugh's list of Swiss Emigrants in the 18th Century to the American Colonies, (volume 2-page 38) is a note translated which says that Hans Knobel has bought the homestead of Michael Burkhalter, who is believed to have emigrated to South Carolina and since 'Burkhalter emigrated without permission and paid no emigration tax, these 90 crowns (due by Knobel to Burkhalter) are confiscated by the Landvogt for the use of the government.

"We have no records showing the date of his birth. He was evidently one of the 'Salzburger' protestants driven out of the Salza River valley in Austria by the Catholic Prince who beheaded their preachers and drove the Lutherans out of the Salza Valley by the thousands. In his charter for the colony of Georgia, Oglethorpe stated that the colony was intended to furnish an asylum for the persecuted Salzburgers and the imprisoned debtors of London. The first ship load of Salzburgers landed in Savannah and went up the river some thirty miles and established their own colony and called the town 'Ebenezer.' Their original church built of brick made in the neighborhood is still standing. On the cupola they had a white swan as an emblem of innocence until the Revolutionary War when the British tore it down and made away with it, but a search for it has continued until now. The family tradition says that Michael Burkhalter was on the second ship load of emigrants of Salzburgers and Moravians- on which John and Charles Wesley were passengers to Savannah.

"Michael Burkhalter was granted 50 acres of land for himself and 50 for his eldest son. The Colonial Records of Georgia show that he later applied for 500 acres more of land for himself and five sons, which was granted to him by the Trustees of the Georgia Colony in meeting in London April 18, 1743, on the recommendation of the Common Council of Georgia. The representative of the Trustees and Oglethorpe reported Michael Burkhalter to be the best planter in the Georgia Colony. He laid out and established a road to this land which is still called the Burkhalter road and is marked with a bronze tablet, placed by the Colonial Dames. His will is dated January 1, 1762, and soon thereafter he died. His will provided for the sale of his property for the use of his wife after his death, and at her death it was to go in equal parts to his children of the first and second bed." The will contained a provision that because 'my mother-in-law, Catherine, always behaved obediently and dutifully to me, I do ordain that her child, Mary Catherine, shall inherit an equal portion of all my children."

"His will was written in German and he made his pastor executor. His will indicated that he was twice married, but unfortunately we have no data as to the maiden names of either of his wives. He had five sons and two daughters. The Revolutionary records of land allotments in Georgia to soldiers in that war, the following were allotted land for service in the Revolutionary War: Michael (Jr.), Jacob, Joseph, Rudolph, Peter, John and Joshua Burkhalter. John and Joshua were sons of Michael Jr., and I assume the others were brothers, nephews or sons of Michael Jr.

"Michael Burkhalter, Jr. was the eldest son of Michael Sr., already discussed. Michael Junior's two sons, Joshua and John, were like himself soldiers in the Revolution. A certificate from Colonel E. Clark says Michael was in the Battle of Kettle Creek near Augusta where the Georgians whipped the British. Besides Joshua and John, Michael had a daughter named Patsey. He was born in Alsace-Lorraine in 1725 and died in Georgia, in 1828, aged 103 years. He came to Savannah, Georgia, with his father, from the old country in 1734. In 1750 he married a daughter of Conrad Densler, a farmer, near Savannah.

"John Burkhalter was the son of Michael Burkhalter, Jr., and his wife, nee Densler, and was born in 1763, died in 1862, aged 99 years. He and his brother Joshua were buried on their farms near Pea Ridge (afterwards changed to Buena Vista) in Marion County, Ga. Their graves are marked as Revolutionary soldiers, though John's remains have been moved to Buena Vista cemetery. John Burkhalter married Sarah (Hardin) Loyless, a widow, and the daughter of Henry Hardin, of Puttysylvania County, Va. who was also a soldier in the Revolutionary army. Tazwell was the original county seat, but it was moved to Pea Ridge, the center of the county, and the name changed to Buena Vista.

"David Newsom Burkhalter, son of John Burkhalter was born in Georgia. He was my grandfather, and I regret that I haven't the date and place of his birth. He married Ann Eliza Short, daughter of Captain and Mrs. Thomas Short, Jr., who moved from Amelia County Virginia, to Georgia. He and his father, Major Thomas Short, Jr., were officers in the Continental Revolutionary army. Captain Short married his cousin, his mother being the sister of Col John Jones, and his wife Dorothy, was the daughter of Colonel Jones, and the Jones family in Virginia ran back to Peter Jones the founder of Petersburg, Va.

"David Newsom Burkhalter and Ann Eliza Short's children were: John Thomas, Sally, Ann Eliza, Mattie, Fletcher, Lucy, David Crockett and Jennie.

"Ann Eliza Burkhalter married Thomas Jefferson Colquitt at Buena Vista, Ga. April 14, 1853. Their children were Eulalie, Ida, (died in infancy), David Thomas, Oscar Branch, William Fletcher, John Milton, and Pierce. (My grandmother named me: she had a brother named Branch Short, and the Short family in Virginia were connected in some way with the Branch families in Virginia and North Carolina, but I have not been able with the little research I have made to find the 'connecting link'). Ann Eliza Burkhalter Colquitt, my mother, died near Daingerfield, Morris County, Texas, in September, 1879. My father died at Daingerfield in April 1885. They are buried in the Daingerfield Cemetery.

(A study of Michael B. in S.C. records will show that he never left S.C. was granted land there and died there in 1804. The Ga. Michael paid his way over and came as tradition of the family. See Egmont Papers and Early Settlers of Georgia. Georgia Michael and S.C. Michael history in folder. Copy of Mich. Sr. will 1762 shows "sister-in-law" instead of mother-in-law as stated by Gov. Colquitt. -- F. Fuss.)

"State of Hamstead June 1738. 4. Mich. Burgholder with 7 young children by a former wife, but his present wife is gone from him. Settled 2 years and more but little done, the first year by reason of sickness now 5 acres cleared and well planted with rice and pease besides one acre of English wheat which he had come to good maturity and was ripe in May, very good housing. Mich. Burgholder, Junr. son of Mich, Senr. 24 acres cleared and planted with corn and pease under the care of his father. (N.B. Burgholder, Holstatler, Houlster and Dester are industrious and laborious men the rest of little account."

Note- From the above and reference to The Colonial Records of Georgia By Candler Vol. 6, Page 133 we find that Michael Junior was married to a daughter of Conrad Densler in May 18, 1745 when he filed the petition to the Trust. She evidently cared for the children of Michael Senior in 1746. His wife was named Anna as shown in later records in this article- F. Fuss. D.A.R. records of Mrs. Mamie Burkhalter Little give Michael Sr. born in Germany died 1762 and wife Barbara, the mother of Michael Jr. It lists Michael, Jr. born 1725 in Germany died at Jones Cty., Ga. 1828 and wife Martha Newsom. (Undoubtedly there is a mistake in wife Martha Newsom as Anna was married to Michael Jr. from 1745-1772 as shown in this record)

"Those at Hamstead have shewn their industry with very little success, and tho they have been well supported but tired with their experiments on land so little fruitful, they have all left it but one man, who is a Switzer and having some cattle is in hopes of better things."



I, Christain Burkhalter of the State and County aforesaid, being in perfect memory, but weak in body and calling to mind that it is ordained for all man kind one to die, do make and constitute this my last Will and Testament.

1st. I give to my dutiful daughter Nancy Burkhalter, one horse to be of the value of sixty dollars.

2nd. I lend to my loving wife Mary Burkhalter all my estate during her natural life, all my estate both real and personal, and at her death to be equally divided between my children in the following manner: I give to my daughter Nancy one negro boy, named Peter to her and her heirs forever, and the remainder and the remaining part in the following manner, (Viz) To Barbery Morris, I give one fifth part to her and her heirs lawfully begetting her body. To John Burkhalter one fifth part forever, to Nancy and her heirs lawfully begotting of her body forever, to Mary Griffis one fifth part for ever, to Betsy Morris one fifty part to her and her heirs lawfully begotten of her body forever, and Lastly I appoint my friend John Martin, my son John Burkhalter and my Son-in-law John Griffis, Executors of this my Last Will and Testament.

I, Micheal Buckhalter of the State and District aforesaid, being in sound health and memory, but calling to mind the uncertainty of life do make, and ordain this my Last Will and Testament in manner and form following.

FIRST: I commit my body to the earth to be buried in a decent manner at the discreation of my Executors here after named and my soul to return to God who gave it.

SECONDLY: I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Ann Buckhalter my negro woman named Bet during her natural life, and after her decease the said negro woman Bet is to be set free by my Executors. And I also leave my beloved wife the plantation where I now live together with all my working tools, and household property and all my live stock of every set and denomination whatsoever which is not otherwise dispose of in my natural life, and after the decease of my beloved wife Ann Burkhalter all my working tools, I give and bequeath unto my youngest son Henry Buckhalter over and above his equal share of the other property and all my household furniture and stock of all secks and denomination is to be equally divided into seven parts and each living child to be contented, and fully satisfied with their equal share or part and my two Grandsons, Jonathan Stringer and Willis Stringer is to have one childs part divided between them and my six living children, William Burkhalter and John Burkhalter and Nancy Beckum, David Burkhalter, Elizabeth Fudge and Henry Buckhalter, which I also constitute and appoint together with Absolom Napper to Executors to this Last Will and Testament and do hereby request the two persons before mentioned namely Henry Burkhalter and Absolum Napper to equally divide the said property as before as written. In witnesses hereof I have here unto set my hand seal this tenth day of January, One thousand eight hundred and four.

THE SALTSBURGHERS

MICHAEL BURCHALTER, was a Salzburger who paid his way to the Colony of Georgia. The name was spelled a number of ways, BURCHALTER, BURCHARTER, BURCHARDT, BURCHARD, etc. He settled at Hamstead and arrived 1735. This information was taken from "A List of The Early Settlers of Georgia-- University of Georgia Press.

The following is taken from The Colonial Records of Georgia by Gandler.

Volume 1, Page 77.

"Palace Court
Oct. the 12th 1738

"Mr. Vernon and Mr. Dundy acquainted the trustees, that the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge were desirous, that the persecuted Saltzburghers should have an asylum provided for them in Georgia.

"Resolved

"That the Trustees do establishing a Colony in Georgia in America do greatly approve the proposal of the Society for promoting Christian Knowledge for defraying the Expense of settling certain of the poor Saltzburghers in Georgia in America; and will readily join and concur in sending and settling so many of them, as by the Contributions which the said Society shall transmit to the Trustees and what other money the said Trustees shall for that purpose receive, they shall be enabled to send and settle in the said Colony.

"Resolved

"That the said Society be desired to inquire by their Correspondents in Germany, in the Names of the said Trustees, whether any of the said Saltzburghers will be willing to become British subjects, and to settle in the said Colony of Georgia, on the Terms to be offered by the said Trustees.

"Resolved

"That the said Society be desired to inquire by their Correspondents in Germany, in the Names of the said Trustees, whether any of the said Saltzburghers will be willing to become British Subjects and to settle in the said Colony.

"Resolved

"That the said Society be desired to publish such further Accounts of the deplorable State of the poor Saltzburghers as they shall think proper; and at the same time to make publick the Design of the said Society, jointly with the said Trustees, to apply such contributions as shall be received for the Relief of the said poor Saltzburghers, to the settling as many of them

as they shall be able to British subjects in Georgia in America.

"Ordered

"That the Trustees of the Trust be given to Mr. Vernon and Dr. Bundy for the great pains they have taken in this affair. which was accordingly."

"Agreed to the following Articles for the poor Salzburgers to go to Georgia viz.

"Let the Trustees will deliver, as far as their Contingents will enable them the charges of passage and provisions for the Voyage, to Georgia in America of such English, Dutch, or other Men from Rotterdam, as are persecuted for the Protestant Religion."

"2dly To all those who want it some assistance will be made for food."

"3dly On their arrival in Georgia each family will have provision given them gratis till they can take in their harvest, and also seed will be given them when necessary to sow all the lands they shall in the first year make good for sowing."

"4thly Each man shall be entitled to three Lots, viz a Lot for House and Garden within the Town, a Lot for Garden Lots near the Town, and a Lot for Tillage at a small distance from the Town; sufficient in the whole to give a comfortable Subsistence to themselves and Families; and that they shall have the said Lands enclosed to themselves, and their heirs male for ever."

"5thly They shall obey such laws and Regulations for the maintenance of Property, Peace, and good Government as the Trustees shall think necessary from time to time to establish; and on that point shall assist each other in clearing their Lands building houses, and such other works as shall be necessary for their mutual safety in common with the Settlers; other subjects there."

"6thly That upon their settling in Georgia they become Denizens, and have all the Rights and Privileges of Englishmen."

"7thly That they shall be protected in the free Exercise of their Religion, and in the full enjoyment of all the Civil and Political Rights of the free Subjects of Great Britain."

"8thly Commissions for taking Subscriptions and collecting money for the purposes of the Charter, Granted to Dr. Bundy, Dr. Richard Bandy, Robert Howe Esqr, Benjamin Lamb Esqr and Matthew Lamb Esqr."

"A Commission was granted by Mr. Arch. Mason Atty of Law to in some measure for taking Subscriptions, and collecting money for the purpose of the Charter."

"Ordered accordingly"

"Sealed the said commission granted to Mr. Arch Deacon Atwood.

"Order'd some people who had offer'd themselves to go to Georgia and had been examined, to attend tomorrow for us the afternoon.

"Adjourned to Thursday the 19th of Oct. at ⁴~~xx~~ o'clock in the afternoon."

"Mr. Vernon delivered to the Trustees Extracts and Letters relating to the Saltzburghers, and Emigrants from Bertholdsgaden &c with some queries desired to be answered by the Trustees.

Volume 1 Page 93 Dec. 20th 1732.

"Mr. Vernon acquainted the Trustees, that He and Mr. Towers had drawn up in pursuance of their Desire, answers to the queries relating to the Saltzburghers and Emigrants from Bertholdsgaden, which he had delivered to the Society for promoting Christian Knowledge, and that the Society had sent a letter with the said answers to Germany.

Page 93.

"That there is already sent to Germany an Invitation for sending over fifty Saltzburghers Families to be transplanted at the charge of the particular collection for those people. That the Trustees hope for a publick Encouragement at the meeting of the Parliament for sending over more people for strengthening of the Colony.

Page 110

"That the Names of all those who go to Georgia, paying their own Expences, shall be published in One of the News Papers before their Grants are delivered to them.

Volume 1 Page 137 Sept. 12th 1733.

"A letter from Mr. Henry Newman to the Rev. M. Urlsperger at Augsburg relating to the Establishment of the Saltzburghers in Georgia was read and approved of."

"Mr. Vernon reported from the Society for propagating Christian Knowledge that they agreed to defray the Expense of the Saltzburghers and other Emigrants in their Journey from Germany to Rotterdam and to support a minister and catechist if the said Saltzburghers and other Emigrants be settled together in One Town, But if they shall be settled at such a distance as one Minister cannot conveniently attend them, then the Society will maintain two Ministers and two catechists."

Page 139 Sept. 26th 1733.

"Mr. Vernon produced copies of Letters from the Rev. Mr. Urlsperger to Mr. Newman acquainting him with several obstacles thrown in the way of the Saltzburghers coming over by the Jewish Part of the Magistracy of Augsburg. That the Number ready to embark is at present but Forty one, and that many of these object to their going to America; and that there seems but little likelihood of increasing the number."

"Resolved

"That Mr. Vernon be desired to procure Letters to be writ to Mr. Urlsperger to send over the said Forty One Saltzburghers immediately or as many of them as are willing to come. Being assured that their Reception in Georgia will encourage others to follow them. And that Mr. Urlsperger be desired to dismiss such as are unwilling to embark. To acquaint him that an application has been made to his Majesty to send Instructions to his Minister at Vienna to apply to the Imperial Court that the Jewish Magistrates at Augsburg may be induced to consent, that the Georgian Colonists may be admitted to their city."

From the information passed down through the years, Micheal Burkhalter and Jane Griffin moved their family to Cass County, Texas, near the present town of Linden somewhere close to the year of 1850. Except for their eldes son, Daniel Brunson, who remained in Tennessee in or close to the Lookout Mountain area. The son, David Witt was a Primitive Baptist Preacher, as well as his father. He established their religion in the Old Union Community at Simms, Texas in 1850. That Church, the Primitive Baptist Church (Hardshell) celebrated their 100th anniversary in 1950. Since then the old Church has been torn down and a new one built on the same site. The Church has had Burkhalters among its members since it was established.

Daniel Brunson Burkhalter helped move the Cherokee Nation to their Oklahoma Reservation at the age of twenty. He saw the horrors of the "trail of tears" in 1818. For this service he was granted the privileged of filing for a tract of land-one-fourth of a section -or 160 acres (or more - I hope sometime to look up the county record) in Deerhead Cove, DeKalb, County, Alabama, (County seat Fort Payne, Alabama (nearest town to place was Trenton, Georgia) As the story is handed down, another man, in the same service to his country, wanted the same tract of land. Daniel Brunson signed for it only two hours before the man arrived. *(over)*



This Indenture made this 27th day of May in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred & twenty between Peter Buckhalter & Sarah Buckhalter, of the same place of the one part & Robert Beville of said County of the otherpart, Witnesseth that the said Peter & Sarah, his wife for and in consideration of the sum of One hundred & fifty dollars to them in hand paid by the said Robert, at or before the sealing & delivery of these presents, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, hath sold and by these presents, doth grant, bargain and sell, unto the said Robert his heirs and assigns, 209 acres of land purchased by the said Peter of Willis Smith & wife, & being a part of One thousand acre tract beginning in the edge of the branch & running South seventy-two, West thirty-one chains, to a stake corner, thence north fifty West eleven chains, fourteen links, to a stake corner, thence two East, forty-seven chains forty links to a pine corner, thence North seventy-one, East thirty-six chains, forty links, to a stake corner, thence South two, East fifty seven chains, fifty links, to the beginning agreeable to the plat made by James Oliver, County Surveyor - Together with all & singular the rights & appurtenances thereunto belonging, also the right, title, claim & demand of the said Peter & Sarah his wife, to have and to hold unto the aforesaid Robert, his heirs & assigns, the aforesaid tract of land & all and singular the premises with their rights, unto the said Robert, his Heirs and assigns forever & the aforesaid Peter and his wife, Sarah, by virtue of these, do warrant and defend the same against every person whatsoever. In witness whereof they have set their hands & seal the year & day above written.
