CALLAWAY HISTORY

THE CALLAWAYS ARE OF ENGLISH ANCESTRY. THE FIRST OF THE FAMILY TLE IN AMERICA APPARENTLY CAME FROM THE VICINITY OF BEDFORD, ENGLAND, 17TH CENTURY AND LOCATED IN WHAT IS NOW KNOWN AS BEDFORD COUNTY, VIRGI

THESE ENGLISH EMIGRANTS, INCLUDING THE CALLAWAYS, FOLLOWING THE C CUSTOM OF EARLY ENGLISH SETTLERS IN AMERICA, NAMED THE COUNTY WHERE TH LOCATED "BEDFORD" AND THE TOWN OR COUNTY SEAT "NEW BEDFORD" AFTER THE TOWN FROM WHICH THEY CAME. IT IS INTERESTING TO KNOW THAT THE NAME CASTILL APPEARS OVER SHOPS AND AMONG THE PRESENT INHABITANTS OF BEDFORD,

MOST OF THE CALLAWAY BAPTIST PREACHERS WHO ARE MENTIONED IN THIS WERE DIRECT DESCENDANTS OF THOMAS CALLAWAY WHO WAS BORN IN BEDFORD COUVIRGINIA IN 1712. HE WAS ONE OF A LARGE FAMILY AND WAS A BROTHER OF REALLAWAY WHO ACCOMPANIED DANIEL BOONE TO KENTUCKY AND MANY OF HIS DESCENDERING THE CALLAWAY NAME ARE FOUND IN KENTUCKY, TENNESSEE AND MISSOUR THOMAS CALLAWAY WAS A VESTRYMAN IN AN EPISCOPAL CHURCH AT NEW BEDFORD, AND WAS AN ENSIGN IN THE COLONIAL TROUPS IN THE FRENCH AND INDIAN WARS HAD A LARGE NUMBER OF CHILDREN, SOME OF WHOM REMAINED IN VIRGINIA AND WENT NORTH, SETTLING IN NEW YORK. SHORTLY PRIOR TO THE REVOLUTIONARY SOMETIME AFTER 1760, THOMAS CALLAWAY WITH AT LEAST FOUR OFHIS SONS, TO JOHN, JACOB, JOSEPH AND ISAAC, LEFT VIRGINIA AND MOVED TO HALIFAX COUN NORTH CAROLINA.

THESE FOUR SONS FOUGHT WITH THE AMERICAN ARMIES DURING THE REVOLU WAR AND AT ITS CONCLUSION CAME TO GEORGIA.* APPARENTLY JOHN CALLAWAY WELDEST OF THE FOUR BROTHERS AND HE SETTLED IN WILKES COUNTY GEORGIA IN ABOUT THE SAME TIME THE OTHER THREE BROTHERS, JACOB, JOSEPH AND ISAAC, IN WILKES COUNTY. (*SEE NOTE ON LAST PAGE)

MOST OF THE BAPTIST MINISTERS WERE DIRECT DESCENDANTS OF ONE OR THOUSE OF THESE FOUR BROTHERS.

FROM JACOB CALLAWAY THERE WERE DESCENDED HIS SON, REV. JOSHUA S. (HIS GRANDSON, REV. PITT MILNER CALLAWAY, AND HIS GREAT GRANDSON, REV. | MILNER CALLAWAY, JR.

FROM JOHN CALLAWAY THERE WERE DESCENDED HIS SON, REV. ENOCH CALLAW HIS GRANDSONS REV. ABNER R. CALLAWAY AND REV. BRANTLEY M. CALLAWAY, ANI GREAT GRANDSON, REV. JOHN SANDERS CALLAWAY, AND HIS GREAT GRANDSOMR. R. M. CALLAWAY. ALSO HIS GREAT GRANDDAUGHTER IDA (PROF. M. L. BRIT MOTHER) AND HIS GREAT GRANDSON, FULLER CALLAWAY.

FROM JOSEPH CALLAWAY THERE WERE DESCENDED HIS GRANDSON, REV. JOHN CALLAWAY, AND ALSO HIS BROTHER DR. MORGAN CALLAWAY, WHO WAS A DISTINGUI MINISTER OF THE METHODIST CHURCH AND CONNECTED WITH EMORY UNIVERSITY FOR SEVERAL YEARS.

FROM REV. ISAAC CALLAWAY THERE WERE DESCENDED HIS SON, REV. WILLIA ERSON CALLAWAY, HIS GRANDSON, REV. JESSE WERCER CALLAWAY, REV. SAMUEL F CALLAWAY, AND HIS GREAT GRANDSONS REV. SUMMER BATTLE CALLAWAY, REV. THC CALLAWAY, REV. TIMOTHY WALTON CALLAWAY AND REV. TIMOTHY FURLOW CALLAWAY IS EXCEEDINGLY PROBABLE THAT REV. FRANCIS CALLAWAY, WHO WAS BORN IN WILL GEORGIA IN 1790, AND HIS SON, REV. WM. GADSTON CALLAWAY, WERE DESCENDAN ONE OF THE FOUR BROTHERS NAMED ABOVE, BUT THERE IS NOT SUFFICIENT INFOR TO STATE THIS AS A FACT.

ITTIS QUITE PROBABLE THAT REV. WM. CALLAWAY OF CALHOUN COUNTY, ILLINO AND REV. JAMES W. CALLAWAY OF LINCOLN CO., MISSOURI, WERE DESCENDANTS OF RICHARD CALLAWAY WHO ACCOMPANIED DANIEL BOONE TO KENTUCKY AND WAS ONE OF T PIONEERS AND EARLY SETTLERS OF THAT COUNTRY.

ALL OF THESE BAPTIST PREACHERS WERE MEN OF UNUSUAL STRONG CHARACTER A WERE LEADING AND INFLUENTIAL CITIZENS IN THEIR COMMUNITIES AND PREACHED TH GOSPEL WITH GREAT FORCE AND VIGOR AND HAD MUCH TO DO WITH BUILDING UP THE GREAT STRENGTH OF THE BAPTIST DENOMINATION IN THE SOUTH AND PARTICULARLY I GEORGIA.

THERE WERE THREE FIRST COUSIN BAPTIST PREACHERS LIVING IN WILKES CO., (1) REV. JOSHUA CALLAWAY, WHOSE GRANDDAUGHTERS WERE (A) MRS. BLACK, MOTHER EUGENE BLACK, (B) MRS. ORME, MOTHER OF EVELYN AND QUILL ORME AND (C) MRS. ALBERT COX AND (D) MRS. RANDALL.

(2) REV. ENOCH CALLAWAY FOR FORTY YEARS PASTOR OF SARDIS BAPTIST CHURCH WHOSE GRANDSONS ARE (A) FULLER CALLAWAY OF LAGRANGE (B) DR. ENOCH CALLAWAY (NOW DECEASED) AND (C) HOWARD CALLAWAY OF ATLANTA (THREE BROTHERS) -- ALSO ELY CALLAWAY OF NEW YORK AND (E) HENRY CALLAWAY OF LAGRANGE, HALF BROTHERS THE THREE ABOVE MENTIONED; (F) JUDGE ENOCH CALLAWAY OF AUGUSTA AND—(G) W. F CALLAWAY (R.M. CALLAWAY'S GRANDFATHER) AND GREAT GRANDSON M. L. BRITTAIN, PRESIDENT OF TECH.

MY FATHER, REV. WM. ANDERSON CALLAWAY, WAS BORN IN WILKES CO., GA., IN OCTOBER 1804. HIS FATHER WAS ISAAC CALLAWAY OF WILKES AND HIS MOTHER, POLL (MARY) BARRETT, WHOSE FATHER LEWIS BARRETT, WAS FROM RICHMOND, VA., BUT MON TO WILKES CO. BEFORE THE MARRIAGE OF POLLY, HIS DAUGHTER. POLLY BARRETT'S MOTHER WAS A MISS PRICE OF VA. MMY (AUNT ABBIE'S) GRANDWOTHER HAD ABROTH JOHN BARRETT WHOM I REMEMBER. HE WAS A BACHELOR AND LIVED WITH COLONEL JOH T. GRANT'S GRANDFATHER IN WILKES CO.

HE HAD AN INDEPENDENT PROPERTY AND LIVED WITH THE GRANTS AS A GENTLEMARELATIVE. THE GRANTS LIVED IN THE COUNTRY AND, AS THEY WERE RICH, AND HAD PLENTY OF LEISURE, NO DOUBT ENJOYED THE COMPANIONSHIP OF A BRIGHT BACHELOR.

I REMEMBER - UNCLE JOHNNIE'S VISITING US IN LAGRANGE BEFORE THE TIME OF RAILROADS AND HE TRAVELED IN A BUGGY WITH TWO HORSES. BROTHER WILLIE SAYS OUR FATHER BOUGHT ONE OF THE HORSES. MR. GRANT WILKINS TOLD ME THAT MY GRE UNCLE JOHN AND COL. GRANT'S FATHER ALWAYS TOOK OPPOSITE SIDES ON ANY QUESTI THAT CAME UP AND DELIGHTED IN THE FRIENDLY BUT EARNEST DISCUSSIONS THAT ENS COL. JOHN T. GRANT TOLD ME ONCE THAT WE WERE RELATED BUT I WAS YOUNG THEN A LIKE MOST YOUNG PEOPLE, ASKED NO QUESTIONS. HIS WIFE WAS SISTER OF CHIEF JUSTICE JAMES JACKSON WHO DIED IN ATLANTA MANY YEARS AGO. I THINK THE CRUT FIELDS WERE THE CONNECTING LINK BETWEEN HER FAMILY AND OURS. THE GRUTCHFIE ARE A PROMINENT GEORGIA FAMILY. I USED TO HEAR MY FATHER SPEAK OF COUSIN EMILY CRUTCHFIELD OF WHOM HE WAS VERY FOND. SHE LIVED IN GREENE COUNTY, I THINK.

MY GREAT GRANDFATHER'S SECOND WIFE, WHOM HE MARRIED IN WILKES CO., WAS MISS MAY TOOMBS, AN AUNT OF GEN. ROBERT TOOMBS. THE HALF BROTHER AND SISTE RESULTING FROM THIS UNION - CORNELIA BARRETT, MARY WOOLF ASKEW'S GREAT, GRE GRANDMOTHER, AND THE OTHERS LIVED WITH MY GRANDMOTHER, MRS. ISAAC CALLAWAY IN WILKES COUNTY AFTER MY GREAT GRANDFATHER'S THIRD MARRIAGE. MY GRANDFATH DID NOT LIKE THE MARRIAGE. MY GRANDMOTHER MUST HAVE GIVEN OFFENSE TO HER STEPMOTHER FOR HER FATHER LEFT HER ONE DOLLAR IN HIS WILL AFTER GIVING EVER THING ELSE TO HIS WIFE AND HER CHILDREN.

CORNELIA BARRETT WAS THE NAME OF THE HALF SISTER WHO LIVED WITH MY GRAND-MOTHER. SHE MARRIED MR. REYNOLDS OF OGLETHORPE CO. SHE WAS THE MOTHER OF MARY REYNOLDS WHO MARRIED MR. PINSON OF NEWNAN AND BECAME THE MOTHER OF IDA, LIZZIE, ELLEN AND JIMMIE PINSON. IDA PINSON MARRIED WINFIELD WOOLF, OF ALABAMA, AND THEY HAD FIVE CHILDREN - WINFIELD, MARY (MRS. SAM ASKEW), J.J., LEILA, AND ASHBY -- ALL OF ATLANTA BUT J.J.

ERASMUS REYNOLDS, A SON OF CORNELIA, LEFT A FAMILY OF SEVERAL CHILDREN, IN LEXINGTON, GA., OF WHOM DR. WILL REYNOLDS IS THE OLDEST. DR. WILL HAS A SON WHO IS ALSO A DOCTOR. I AM TOLD IT IS A FINE FAMILY AND SUCCESSFUL FINANCIALLY.

MY GREAT GRANDFATHER, LEWIS BARRETT, WAS AN UNUSUALLY GOOD MAN, AND FREED HIS SLAVES BECAUSE HE DID NOT BELIEVE IN SLAVERY. MY BROTHER ANDREW, WHEN A SICK SOLDIER DURING THE CIVIL WAR, WAS ENTERTAINED AND CARED FOR BY MEMBERS OF MY GREAT GRANDFATHER'S FAMILY WHO WERE STILL LIVING IN RICHMOND, VA., AT THAT TIME. THEY WERE FINE PEOPLE.

MY FATHER HAD FOUR BROTHERS AND THREE SISTERS. LEWIS CALLAWAY, WHO HAD QUITE A FAMILY OF CHILDREN BUT DRANK, AND HIS CHILDREN HAD A HARD TIME. HE MOVED TO TEXAS YEARS AGO - I THINK ABOUT 1858 - AND I HAVE NOT HEARD OF THEM SINCE. I HAVE FORGOTTEN THE NAMES OF HIS CHILDREN. UNCLE LEWIS DIED IN TEXAS YEARS AGO. GEORGE, JAMES HERVEY, AND MERRILL PRICE WERE THE OTHER THREE BROTHERS. UNCLE GEORGE MARRIED A MISS ELIZABETH MILNER AND LIVED IN OGLETHORPE COUNTY. I HAVE FORGOTTEN THE NAMES OF HIS CHILDREN. MERRILL WAS KILLED IN THE WAR BETWEEN THE STATES AND WAS SAID TO BE A VERY FINE MAN. HIS WIDOW DIED HERE SEVERAL YEARS AGO AND HIS SON WAS IN SCHOOL HERE, BUT I DO NOT KNOW WHAT EVER BECAME OF HIM. ROLAND WAS HIS NAME.

JAMES H. CALLAWAY, ANOTHER BROTHER OF MY FATHER, MARRIED A MRS. CADES AND HAD ONE DAUGHTER WHO DIED WHEN FOURTEEN YEARS OF AGE. UNCLE JIM AND AUNT SARAH LIVED IN ATLANTA, AND WERE CONSECRATED CHRISTIANS, AND BEING BLEST WITH ABUNDANT MEANS THEY DID A GREAT DEAL OF GOOD IN THE WORLD, PARTICULARLY TO THOSE POOR WHO WERE AT LIBERTY TO VISIT THM AND STAY AS LONG AS THEY PLEASED. UNCLE JIM AND AUNT SARAH WERE BELOVED MEMBERS OF THE SECOND BAPTIST CHURCH OF ATLANTA AND DIED IN 1876 WITHIN THREE MONTHS OF EACH OTHER AND ARE BURIED IN OAKLAND CEMETERY.

UNCLE JIM IS STILL REMEMBERED BY THE SECOND BAPTIST CHURCH AND IS FREQUENTLY SPOKEN OF EVEN YET AS ONE OF THE FORMER PROMINENT AND BELOVED MEMBERS.

MERRILL PRICE, MY FATHER'S YOUNGEST BROTHER, MARRIED A MRS. MAY IRWIN WALTON, A RICH WIDOW WITH THREE CHILDREN - A DAUGHTER, BELLE WALTON, CALLED AN HEIRESS, AND TWO SONS, JOHN AND STOKES. THE CALLAWAYS LIVED IN GOOD STYLE IN WASHINGTON, GA., AND WERE AMONG THE BEST SOCIALLY IN AN ARISTOCRATIC TOWN. BELLE WALTON MARRIED COL. ROBERT BACON OF LAGRANGE, AFTERWARD OF BACONTON, NEAR ALBANY. BELLE WALTON WAS A PARTICULAR FRIEND OF MY SISTER MARY. SHE MET COL. BACON AT MY FATHER'S AND MOVED TO THE COUNTRY. DURING THE WAR OR DIRECTLY AFTER, UNCLE MERRILL BOUGHT A LARGE PLANTATION NEAR ALBANY AND MOVED HIS FAMILY THERE.

ROBERT BACON AND BELLE WALTON HAD FOUR DAUGHTERS - CORNELIA, WIFE OF DR.
ROBERT WILLINGHAM, DISTINGUISHED SECRETARY FOREIGN MISION BOARD OF THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION; BELLE, MRS. WALTER COOPER, OFWEST END; ELLA AND
LAURA (UNMARRIED). THEY CLAIM RELATIONSHIP WITH THE CALLAWAYS AS UNCLE MERRILL
WAS THEIR STEP GRANDFATHER.

MERRILL, UNCLE MERRILL'S OLDEST SON, MARRIED KATE FURLOW OF AMERICUS, GA., A DAUGHTER OF AVERY PROMINENT MAN OF THAT SECTION. THEIR CHILDREN WERE MAGGIE WHO MARRIED GEORGE WHEATLEY OF AMERICUS; MERVIN, MRS. _ OF CLAYTON, GA.; VIOLA, MRS. HARRIS OF AMERICUS, REV. FURLOW AND REV. WALTON CALLAWAY AND MERRILL OF ATLANTA.

HENRY, UNCLE MERRILL'S NEXT SON, LIVES IN ALBANY, AND HAS BEEN MARRIED TWICE. HE HAS SEVERAL CHILDREN BUT I DO NOT KNOW TO NAMES.

JIM CALLAWAY, THIRD SON OF UNCLE MERRILL'S, FOR MANY YEARS ONE OF THE EDITORS OF THE MACON TELEGRAPH, AND WHO DIED AT THE JOHNS HOPKINS ABOUT TWO YEARS AGO, MARRIED NELLIE FURLOW, SISTER TO KATE FURLOW, AND A BELLE. THEY HAVE A SON IN WASHINGTON, D. C., A VERY PROMINENT LAWYER - MERRILL; A DAUGHTER MARY, MRS. JONES OF MACON, A VERY CULTURED WOMAN; ANOTHER DAUGHTER WHO MARRIED A MR. AXON OF SAVANNAH, A RELATIVE OF THE FIRST MRS. WOODROW WILSON. THERE

TUCKER, THE FOURTH SON, LIVES IN ATLANTA AND MARRIED ADDIE CRICHTON. THEY
HAVE SEVERAL CHILDREN - THE OLDEST CRICHTON AND THE YOUNGEST ADELAIDE.

MY FATHER'S SISTERS WERE ELIZA, LULA AND HARRIET AND LIVED IN MCDONOUGH, GA. SINCE ABOUT 1830 WHERE THEY AND THEIR WIDOWED MOTHER MOVED WHEN MY FATHER ACCEPTED A PASTORATE THERE. ONE WAS MRS. LOWE.

MY FATHER, WILLIAM ANDERSON CALLAWAY, WAS THE SECOND SON OF ISAAC AND POLLY CALLAWAY. HE WAS MARRIED TO MARTHA POPE, DAUGHTER OF JOHN POPE AND ELIZABETH SMITH, IN 1826. ISSUE: (1) JOHN ISAAC, (2) JESSE MERCER, (3) MARY ELIZABETH, (4) ANN JUDSON (DIED IN INFANCY), (5) GEORGE WILEY, (6) DR. HENDLY VARNER, (7) ANDREW FULLER, (8) THOMAS MERRILL, (9) REV. SAMUEL POPE, (10) MARTHA ABBIE, (11) WILLIAM A. (12) HARRIET ELIZA OF WHOM ALL ARE DEAD EXCEPT ABBIE AND WILLIAM A.

MY FATHER MARRIED IN 1851 A MRS. HARRIET BOONE, WHO HAD THREE DAUGHTERS AND A SON. OF THIS MARRIAGE THERE WERE BORN A SON, CHARLES MALLORY AND LULA (MRS. TRAYNHAM) BOTH OF AUSTIN, TEX. LULA IS DEAD AND HER TWO CHILDREN - A SON AND A DAUGHTER-ARE ALSO DEAD. CHARLIE DIED IN 1920 - A LOVELY MAN.

MY GRANDFATHER, JOHN POPE, HAD FOUR GRANTS OF LAND IN WILKES CO. AMOUNT-ING TO ELEVEN HUNDRED ACRES; WAS CAPTAIN IN THE INDIAN WAR AND REPRESENTED WILKES CO. IN THE LEGISLATURE IN 1810.

JOHN ISAAC CALLAWAY MOVED TO AUSTIN, TEX. IN THE EARLY SEVENTIES AND DIED IN MANOR AT THE HOME OF HIS DAUGHTER, MRS. DAVID LANE, IN 1898. HE MARRIED MISS MARTHA LONG OF TROUP CO. SUMNER BATTLE, THEIR FIRST CHILD, WAS BORN IN LAGRANGE IN 1854 AND DIED IN BOLESVILLE, ARK. IN 1916. HE WAS A CONSECRATED CHRISTIAN MINISTER. HE IS SURVIVED BY HIS WIFE AND DAUGHTER LILA AND MADGE, MRS. WOOLLARD OF CLARKVILLE, ARK. LILA, HIS WDDOW, IS A NOBLE WOMAN.

WALTER POPE IS THE SECOND SON AND WILLIAM HENRY IS THE THIRD SON, LIVING IN FORTH WORTH, TEXAS. THE HOME OF WALTER IS NOT KNOWN. JOHNNIE DIED UNMARRIED - THE FOURTH SON. MATTIE, HIS DAUGHTER, MARRIED DR. DAVID LANE, NOW OF AUSTIN AND HAS THREE SONS -- ROY CALLAWAY, JOSEPH CALLAWAY AND JOHN CALLAWAY LANE.

JESSE MERCER MARRIED TWICE. HIS FIRST WIFE WAS ELIZABETH HULING. ONE SON, ANDREW, WAS THE ISSUE OFTHIS MARRIAGE. ANDREW'S DAUGHTER, BELLE, MARRIED A MR. HARPER AND THERE ARE FIVE CHILDREN BORN TO THEM. KATIE, ANDREW'S SECOND DAUGHTER, MARRIED A MR. HOGG, OF TROUP CO. NO CHILDREN.

CALLAWAY FAMILY IDENTIFIED WITH EARLY DIXIE HISTORY

Georgia, Maryland, Virginia, Kentucky, North Carolina and Alabama are colonial homes of the Callaway family. Founder fathers include Anthony Callaway, of Isle of Kent County, Maryland, 1655; Caleb Callaway, of Virginia, 1661, whose wife was Elizabeth Lorane, and their children, Caleb, Jr., William, Dorothy, Mary and Joshua. The last named married Isabel Garrett March 20, 1728, and had a son, Thomas.

In 1665 Thomas Callaway, from England, had a grant of 766 acres in Charles City County, Virginia. It may be that he was a brother of Caleb and that the latter's son, Thomas, was his namesake. At least, that is the supposition.

Francis Callaway is the next name in the family history, and from him the families of North Carolina and of Kentucky trace their ancestry, for his son, Francis, Jr., went to North Carolina and founded a branch of the family, while his brother, Richard, was a pioneer of Kentucky, going there with Daniel Boone.

Other children of Francis Callaway were: Thomas, born in 1712; William, James, George, Elizabeth and Anne. Thomas was living in Halifax County, Virginia, in 1752, and a little later on he was captain of colonial militia in the French and Indian War, 1755-1758. With four sons, he settled in Wilkes County, Georgia, in 1782. A fifth son, Elijah, was born in Georgia. The four born in Virginia were John, Joseph, Jacob and Isaac. Their mother was born Anderson. Her first name has not been handed down to the present day.

Callaway County, Kentucky, is named for Richard Callaway, Boone's companion. Later, Richard went to Missouri, and Callaway County is named for the family. Richard was born in Bedford County, Virginia, in 1724. He also was a soldier, with the rank of colonel, in the French and Indian War. In 1777 he was the first Representative from Kentucky in the Virginia House of Burgesses. Richard and wife, Frances Walton, were the parents of several sons and daughters.

In 1761 William Callaway, Gent., as he is called, made a gift of 100 acres in Bedford County, Virginia, "to be settled into a town." New London was the name, but it was only a hamlet or small town of 70 or 80 homes in 1776.

Among the families related to the Callaways are the Mercers, Milners, Sanfords, and Royalls — the last named of South Carolina.

Records are found in histories of Meriwether and Wilkes Counties, Georgia; Chambers County, Alabama; Hening's Statutes, Volume 3; The Richmond Standard, History of Kentucky, by Collins, Volume 3. Also there is a family Bible extant with valuable data and a carefully compiled family genealogy, by T. W. Callaway, dedicated to the "Clan Callaway."

Kalloway was one way to spell the name in the long ago. There seems to have been a saint in the family — St. Callaway. The coat-armour blazoned in Bolton's Armory has no crest or motto unless it is the legend of St. Callaway, or prayer — "Ora Pro Me."
