All of Atlanta's 28 supervised playgrounds will be in operation by Monday, Miss Virginia Carmichael, supervisor of city recreational facilities, declared Wednesday as she disclosed that 10 white and seven Negro centers are already open.

The eleven centers yet to open are: Bass Junior High School, Allen Couch School, Forrest Avenue School, J. M. Goldsmith School, Morningside School, Annie E. West School, East Lake School and Candler, Grant, Maddox and Piedmont Parks.

The recreation program, Miss Carmichael said, will stress games for small children such as volley ball, horseshoes and group contests and softball and sandlot baseball for older groups.

The program, which is being financed by \$25,578 in city funds, is aimed at reducing juvenile delinquency in Atlanta and in providing wholesome recreation for schoolchildren during the summer season.

Playgrounds for white children already are in operation at Adair, Bessie Branham, Howell, James L. Key, McClatchey, Mozley and Perkerson Parks and at Smillie and Crew Street Schools.

Negro recreation centers are in operation at Washington Park and Krogman, Gray, Howard, Johnson, Ware and Yonge Street Schools.

All the centers will be open from 9 a. m. until noon and from 3 p. m. until 8 p. m.

Civilian Losses in Britain 2 Out of ?

LONDON, June 2.—(AP)—Two civilians were killed or injured in air raids in the United Kingdom during the first three years of the war for every five casualties among the Kingdom's armed forces, an analysis of official figures shows.

Total casualties among the fighting men of the United Kingdom during that period, Deputy Prime Minister Clement Attlee announced Tuesday, were 275,844. Total civilian air raid casualties for the same period were 102,934—or 47,291 killed and 55,643 injured.

Since then civilian casualties have risen to 106,516—including 48,733 killed and 57,783 wounded—at the end of March, the last announced figure.

Rumanian Liberal Held as Allied Spy

NEW YORK, June 2.—(AP)—The German radio said in a broadcast Wednesday that Constantin Bursan, former Liberal member of the Rumania Chamber of Deputies and close personal friend of former Premier Gheorghe Tatarescu, had been arrested and interned in the Bucharest military prison on a charge of having made contact with British and American agents.

The broadcast, recorded by the Associated Press, said Bursan, formerly chairman of the board of directors of a large Rumania arms and railway equipment company, was shadowed on his trips to Istanbul where he ostensibly was engaged in negotiations for ships to transport several thousand Rumanian Jews to Palestine.
