I received a note from Lr. Bostic wrote to Dr. Hicks requesting the history of the Cam; family for you, and as neither of them knew much of them, I will give you all that I know of our forefathers, as me and my son, J.J.Camp and his five little boys are all that remain of the name in this section. My grandfather and your great grandfather was named Thomas Camp was born Feb. 8, 1717, died 1798 and e me to this section of country from the lower portion of Virginia and where married his first wife.
