After losing his wife in 1969, Uncle Burrell a few years later married Mrs. Sarah Elsberry, and their home was made happier by the birth of two children, namely: Mrs. Anna Lee, of Dallas, and Mrs. Remy Langston, of Gordon county. Besides the children just named, Uncle Burrell left scores of grand and great grandchildren, all of whom are among the best people in the state.

After the death of his second wife, which took place on the 11th of September, 1910, Uncle Burrell made his home among his children till his death which occurred on the 22nd day of May, 1912, at the residence of his son near Powder Springs at the ripe old age of 89 years, 7 months and 9 days.

Uncle Burrell was a man in every sense of the word. He was strictly temperate in all things. The old saying, "once a man and twice a child," was hardly applicable to him. With the exception of being a little hard of hearing he was as interesting and instructive to talk to as a man in the prime of life. He kept well posted on public affairs, and while he had his convictions both in church and state, he never censured anyone for differing with him. He never had a case in court in his life, and was but once upon the witness stand, and that time in a civil case.

Uncle Burrell joined the Primitive Baptist church in 1860 and was baptized by Elder Robt. Daniel. Most of Uncle Burrell's children belong to the church of the same faith and order. Truly they are following in his footsteps.

About two years after joining the church Uncle Burrell began preaching, and continued in the

Dear "Cousin" Burrell:

Thank you so much for your letter and the write-up about Elder B.M. Camp — "Uncle Burrell". This fills in a gap in our family tree.

Thomas Camp, born in Virginia in 1747, married Nancy Tarpley. They lived in No. Carolina, then moved to So. Carolina where their children were born, and then moved to Walton County, Ga., where he died in 1811. Their children were:

1. Burrell, born in 1774, married Betsy Moore, who was my gr. gr. grandfather
2. Bradford, born 1776 (moved to Louisiana)
3. Sherwood, born 1777 (married Lydia Kennedy, your great grandfather (Sherwood was a Baptist minister))
4. Hosea, born 1778, moved to Alabama.
5. Larkin, born 1779, mar. a Miss Brewster, moved to Alabama, had son named Manning and Sheriff
6. Thomas, born 1781, married a Miss Hamby, moved to Arkansas.
7. Sarah, born 1784, married John C. Calhoun, had children named Lavinia and Harriet
8. Nancy, born 1786,

Sherwood was born in No. Carolina. His children were:

1. Edmund Kennedy Camp, born in Jackson Co., Ga. 1804, married Penelope Willingham
2. Ira Camp (I believe he married Tempy Owens in 1828 in Newton Co., Ga. In 1833 he was in business with Joseph L. Irwin. He was killed in his home by Federal Army in Paulding Co. Ga. (near New Hope Church).
3. Joe (settled in Texas).
4. Thomas, lived in Paulding, Ga. I am on the trail of a Thomas Allen Camp, and I believe it is this Thomas, son of Sherwood. If so, I have the names of all of his children.
5. Burrell M., born in Walton Co., Ga. 10/13/1822, your grandfather, and I do appreciate getting the names of all his children.

Thomas Camp, the father of Burrell and Sherwood, from whom you and I descend, was the son of a famous Thomas Camp who had at least 24 children. His first wife was Winifred Starling, and their children were Edmond, Joseph, John, Nathaniel, Thomas (the one born in 1747), Starling, Hosea, Williams, Alfred, Benjamin, Elizabeth and Joel. After his wife Winifred died, he married 18 yr. old Margaret Carney and they had 12 more children.

Burrell, my great, great grandfather, had children named Lewis, Edwin, Brown, Grace, Seaborn Marion, and Mary Pollie. Lewis was my great grandfather.

Lewis married Leah Daniel and their children were: Thomas D. (who was the grandfather of Mrs. L. H. Lloyd in Lindale), Nancy (mar. Samuel Rigby), Tildie (mar. Whitaker Butler), Mary (mar. Will Hendrix), Lida (mar. Pickens Butler), Seaborn E. Burt (mar. Susan Hendrix), and William Lewis, my grandfather (mar. Fannie Daniel).

My grandfather had 11 children, 3 of them still living. My father was William Lewis also. He has been dead since 1934. There are 9 in my family. My father's youngest sister was Esther Camp, married Delphus Cranford. Their oldest son, Alton Cranford, lives at 212 Cherry St., Rome, Ga. If you are ever up that way, look him up. He'd be happy to meet you.

If you could give me names of ^{at least one of the} children of your father's brothers and sisters that I could write to and get their whole families, I would appreciate it. Also, if you know of any old family Bibles somewhere. That

might give us some leads, I would like to know about them. I especially would like to know about your grandfather Burrell's brothers, if you have heard stories and remember hearing about any of them.

When I get all of these things together and printed, I will send you a copy.

Thanks again, and I hope to hear from you again.
