Monsieur, Par la lettre du 25 juin dernier

IT having been officially certified, by the certification of the returning Officers, bearing date the *30th* day of *August* 1829, that you were duly elected by our *seventh* Congressional District, to represent us in the *brandy fort* Congress of the United States, which commences on the *7th* day of *December* 1829, and expires on the 4th day of March, 1831, you are hereby authorized and commissioned to claim and hold a seat as a Member of the House of Representatives of the United States, for the term aforesaid, and vested with all the rights, privileges, and immunities conferred by the Constitution on members of the said House.

our Governor, Captain General, and Commander in Chief, hath caused the Great Seal of State to be hereunto affixed, and signed the same at our city of Raleigh, on the *30th* day of *November*, A.D. 1829
