Hicks Lineage

Robert and Thomas Hicks, b in England ca 1575; sons of James, b ca 1550; son of Baptist, b ca 1526; son of Thomas, son of John, b ca 1470, descendant of Ellis Hicks, knighted by Edward, the Black Prince, at the battle of Poitiers, 1356.

- 1 - Robert Hicks, came to Plymouth, Mass. in the ship Fortune, 1621; had lands there in 1623; went to Duxbury ca 1630; to Scituate after that, and d 3/24/1647. He was a leather-dresser at Bermondsey, Southwark, London, and m Elizabeth ---- who d early; he m (2nd) Margaret ---- who came over in the Anne, 1623, bringing the children, who were probably her own. Robert Hicks made his will 5/28/1645; his inventory amounted to L 39. 13 s his wife Margaret executrix. Her will was dated 7/8/1665.

Yesterday, I spent the day in Boston looking up your Coat-of-Arms and found the following;

From American Families - Genealogical and Heraldic by Griggs - Page 58

"Arms - Gules, a fesse wavy between three fleurs-de-lis or.

Crest - A buck's head, couped at the neck or, gorged with a wreath of laurel proper

Motto - Tout en bonne heure (all in good time)"

"The surname Hicks is one of the most ancient of names derived from the baptismal name Richard, and is derived directly from the nickname Hick or Higg. It appears in medieval English registers of as early date as the Hundred Rolls. The family in England, though not large, has figured prominently in history and in numerous branches bears coats-arms.

The Hicks families of New England comprise the progeny of Robert Hicks who settled Plymouth, Mass. in the second year of the little colony's existence. Since the year his descendants have been active in New England life and affairs. The Hicks families in southeastern Mass. have ranked among the foremost of this historic section of the country for over 250 years."

Robert Hicks, immigrant ancestor and founder of the family in America, was born in England toward the close of the sixteenth century. He was great-grandson of Thomas Hick of Trotworth, who inherited his estate from his father, John Hicks, a descendant of Ellis Hicks who was knighted by Edward the Black Prince in 1356.

Robert Hicks was of London in 1618, where he followed the occupation of leather dresser. He came to New England in 1621, a passenger on the ship "Fortune" and settled in Plymouth where he lived until his death March 24, 1647.

He married (1) Elizabeth Morgan, (2) Margaret Winslow, who joined him in America with their sons, Samuel and Ephraim and two daughters in August, 1623. They were passengers on the ship "Ann".

I found the same coat-of-arms in several different heraldic authorities, and the most complete and authentic, so there seems to be no question about the family having the right to a coat-of-arms.

I have already sent you the pedigree from Robert, so I will not repeat it here. I am sure it will have been of service to you, and if there is anything else that bothers you, let me know. Your line is most interesting.
