My Dear Beech:-

Some months ago I wrote you a letter as long as a harlot's dress and sent it over to Glennie to read and ask him to put the proper street address on it and forward it to you. I almost fell over when Glennie wrote back to me and said that you were his brother and that you both were sons of Elvin Hollon and he in turn was the son of "Little Jack" Hollon. I remember "Little Jack" when he was successor of Wolfe county. He was a first cousin to my father, James Buchanan Hollon, and he in turn was the son of "Old Jackson Hollon", brother to my grandfather John Hollon Jr., we call him, and Jackson and John Jr. were the sons of the Pioneer John Hollon, Sr. Now if we could find John Hollon Sr.'s father we would be on a "Wilying Snipee".

Kelly Combs, of Irvine, and a cousin of ours told me that he had heard Old Press Hollon talk a lot about the Old Hollons and that he set down a great deal that he said and that Press said Old John Sr.'s father and mother were named William and Rebecca. I can well believe this because Old John, Sr. named his first son William and his first daughter Rebecca, after his father and mother. There are now two hundred William and three hundred Rebeccas at large. But from whence Old William and Rebecca came is the great question and one on which I have racked my brain, wore out my fingers and wrecked my typewriter as you can judge from the copy of a letter I am enclosing. I suppose it help wreck you too.

My brother Clay who has been in the printing business in Chicago for fifty years was down, he and his wife, and spent ten days with me last Nov. We and went over to the old Hollon bairwick and spent the day prognosticating. We kindly went over the situation and considered what old John, Sr. had accomplished and the manner of his burial and the construction of his monument and we decided that there was something behind old John somewhere better than his descendants had enjoyed. So we decided to try to trace him up. Clay is now retired and has plenty of time on his hands and a willing spirit with which to work at the project. But his eyesight is none too good having had both of them operated for cataracts. The winter has been very severe in Chicago and his family will not let him go to the Newberry Library down town by himself as his eyes do not focus very well as far down as the ground. But when he can have one of his family accompany him he does go down and he has rubbed up a lot of information on the Hollon family in the Library.

I was never more astonished in my life than I was when he found that Hollon family was one of the oldest and most respectable families in America. Not as much astonishment was caused by finding out that the Hollons were a Mass. family as anything else. I had always supposed that they were a French Huguenot family and that they came over to Charleston, S. C. in 1696 after the revocation of the Edict of Nantes in 1686 and that multiplied and spread up into N. C. and on into Ky. But such was not the case. In 1620 the first two Hollons came to Dorchester, Mass., and rather layed out and founded the Colony of Dorchester. There were two brothers, the eldest was named Christopher and the younger John Hollon. His name is mostly as my grandfather and my great grandfather (Your great-great grandfather) wrote it. I am convinced that our Hollay branch of the family and the Townshend, Farnum, branch of the family are the only ones that have kept the correct spelling of the name, most of the others having changed the name to Hollins. John Hollon ist. we call him was a most remarkable man. He and his family soon dominated the whole colony of Mass. in a business way. Although he was a Puritan and had no writing bibles or the world. It

... he did not neglect to provide for them in which he was then sojourning in. He soon signed on three old Puritan "Patriots" more comfortably on a belly full of pie than they could when their bellies were flopping against their backbones. And of course having "charity toward the truth-seekers" he set about supplying their needs. He went into the mercantile business. By 1684 his son was a wealthy and highly regarded merchant and also had a ship line running the coasts of Mass. and on up to N.Y. He would buy anything the Colonists could raise up to sell and that he in turn would ship or in Europe or in Africa or in Asia taking a small tithe for himself. He transported slaves in his own ships. On the return trip he would bring back what the Colonists needed to buy, which was everything, and my guess is that he did not fail to "honor" the "Abolition" in taking a small tithe on that also. He was like the ancient Jews of old Palestine were to all people they had to pass through that country for the East. ~~the West~~ They had their "Going and Coming", a pretty convenient arrangement I call it.

So he was very rich and was known as the first American "Merchant Prince" and the first American Millionaire. He and his family headed the list of the "Who's Who" of the Early Colonial American Families. These old Hollens (something like the new Hollens) had children in litteres. As soon as one of his sons or grandsons got old enough to begin business, Old John would set him up in business in some other Mass. settlement and the first thing anybody knew the newcomer would dominate the city. This went on all over Mass. for well nigh over 100 years. I never could have dreamed that would you? But just before and during the Revolution they began to migrate to other States, N.Y., Penna., N.H., Vermont, Md., Va. and N. C. and then on into Ky. Clay wrote me that he found a Francis Hollen on the tax list of Bourbon Co., Ky., in 1792. Wolfe Co. was then right in the middle of Bourbon Co. (I wish it was now). I wrote to the Clerk of Bourbon Co., and he wrote me that he could find no Hollen in the Index to Deeds but that he found a Francis Holland that had purchased a license to marry Miss Rhoda Rhodes in 1795. See how the name relates? On further investigation I found that Francis Holland, of Ky., had signed the "Hartford Declaration" in 1776 and that this Hartford Declaration was the "declaration of Independence in Kroc Points". As a matter of fact it was the same man all the way through. I have no doubt that this man was closely related to William Hollen for whom we are searching. My guess is that the Hollens came through Pa. to Md., from Md. to Amelia Co., Va., and then down one of them over the R. like into Rock County, N. C. where Daniel Hollen died in 1790. In the 1790 census, Joseph Hollen signed two deeds in Amelia Co., Va., in 1790. Both of which was signed Joseph Hollen and the second was signed Joseph Holland. Joseph Hollen was the son of John Hollen who signed the Declaration of Independence in 1776. Joseph Hollen was the son of John Hollen Jr., Nathaniel's son and A son named John born 1782. The Hollen name was passed down through the family and was the son of John Jr. Any way it showed that Joseph was rather a standard name among the old Hollens. So in answer Hollen as familiar as corn bread and sorghum molasses, so say nothing of corn meal.

Now before I forget it, I will tell you what I started to write you about before I got off on to the above proration (whatever that is). We need and this year help in the search for my great-great grandfather and your great-great grandfather "Grandpa" William Hollen. He must have been a "Great" grandpa or a triple one. Assume you are there at the U. of N. C., at Chapel Hill, and there may be a lot of information right under your nose that would lead to this connecting link between John of Nelly and John of Dorchester Height, the very heights that a Mr. Washington about 100 years later fortified and forced the British to evacuate Boston. Dorchester is now a Ward in the City of Boston. Inquire of the Librarian and he can tell you how to search.

Well my time and paper are about to exit at the same time so I will desist.

My Dear Mr. Griffis:-

I certainly am enjoying your new book "Essays on North Carolina History". One little item in it is the cause of my writing you this letter. One word sometimes will bring on a shower of words.

I writing about Major James Hollond, of Bathertown County, S. C. and Henry County Tenn. on Page 223 you say, "The inscription on his bon-like tomb". The word bon-like to the word that particularly struck me as it reminded me of the bon-like "Pyramids" under which John Hollon, Sr., and many other Hollons are buried in the old Hollon graveyard on Hollly Creek, Wolfe Co., Ky. I am sending you some snapshots of these old monuments to see if they bear any resemblance to the one under which your Major Hollond is buried in Henry County, Tenn. I have never in any cemetery, large or small, at any place ever seen monuments of like construction. Mrs. William Wrenett Bach, a probably the best known Genealogist in Ky. went over to Hollly Creek with me to see these monuments and she said she had been in hundreds of old and new cemeteries and that she never saw at any place monuments of like construction. I sent snapshots just like I am sending you to Prof. Thomas D. Clark, Professor of History at the University of Ky. and he wrote me back that he had never seen accounts of like construction although he had seen a number of different kinds of "grave spades" but nothing like these and that as soon as he had time and the weather was favorable he up to get me to take him over to see them.

Now if these "Pyramids" as I call them bear any considerable resemblance to the monument to Major James Hollond, it will be no small help in tracing the genealogy of John Hollon, of Hollly, back to John Hollon (Born 1614), of Dorchester, England and Dorchester, Mass., which last Dorchester he no doubt founded. This John Hollon, of Dorchester (Not a Fort in Boston) was a man of no small abilities. He was reckoned America's first "Merchant Prince" and millionaire. He had his docks, warehouses and steam going ships, one of which was "The Endeavour". He was reckoned at the top of the list of "The's who" of early Colonial families. However his descendants did not sail forth from Mass. for over 100 years. They infested or inhabited Roxbury, Charlestown, Marlboro, Newton, Watertown, Lexington, "Cambridge Village" and many other cities of Mass. I suppose that Harvard University now covers land that was formerly a Hollon "Farm, Patch". All the Hollons seemed to be of a Commercial and Merchantile turn of mind. I suppose that after awhile Mass. got overrun with them when they began to invade other states. Just before the Revolutionary War they began to go to other states and genealogically that is where my troubles begin. Then you would find the son's name Hollond and the father's name Hollon. Some of them probably were inclined like me and wanted to know from whence they came and got to tracing their genealogy and found back in England that the name was originally Hollond and they went back to spelling that way but without doubt the original American way of spelling the name was Hollon.

My brother, Clay Hollon, of Chicago, is perusing in the Eustis Library at intervals and sent me the name of a Mount. Isaac Hollond, Revolutionary Soldier, with the following information:-

Colonel James Holland, (1734-1810) Mtn. in Capt. Joseph Martin's Company.  
Col. Francis Hollis, Maj. served as Sheriff, Tryon Co., N.C., 1777-1778. Born in  
Tenn. Died in Henry County, Tenn. (B. A. R. Book 78, Page 202).

This agrees with your account except that he says that he was born in Tennessee and the date of his death. There can be no doubt that it is the same man. I had thought perhaps that he might be my great-great grandfather as my great grandfather had a brother, George, and this George had a son that was afterward known as "Uncle Jimmy Hollis". But from you book that cannot be. But it could be that my great-grandfather, William Hollis and this Major James Hollis could have been brothers and both of them sons of a the William Hollis that you say (Page 69) that emigrated from England. Rutherford County is considerable distance from the sea coast for an emigrant to settle down very soon after arrival in America. It may be that instead of his having emigrated from England that emigrated from France. Do you have any information about the brothers and sisters of Major Hollis? It might be that the William Hollis who was a Pvt. and fought in the Revolutionary War from Rutherford County and who had deeds recorded for a large tract of land in 1790 and another large tract in 1801 was a brother of Major Hollis and the father of John Hollis, Sr., my great grandfather. If we could find that this last named William Hollis had a son named John, one named George and his wife named Rebecca we would have the men we are looking for.

There is no doubt in my mind that there is a connection between the Hollis family and North Carolina. I have a cousin living here in Hazel Green that was raised in the home of my grandfather, John Hollis, Jr. and she says she remembers very distinctly hearing our grandfather talk of his having rode on horseback with his father to visit a sister of his father in N. C. and that the strongest sight he saw on the trip was very black negroes with very red hair. But where in N. C. is the question. John Hollis, Jr.'s wife was a Gibbs and her father and grandfather were both named John, the older John being a Revolutionary Soldier. Both three Johns came from Rutherford County. John Hollis, Jr., married a woman by the name of Charity Brewster.

If it turns out that this William Hollis, Soldier of the Revolution, and who was pensioned at the age of 60, and of Rutherford County, is not the father of John Hollis, Sr., my great grandfather, it will be proven that John Hollis, Sr., did not originate in Rutherford County.

However there were other Hollises in N. C., the names of some of whom I will set down:

Daniel Hollis, Moved in Rock County, N.H. (B. & G. Grants 1790) "Dane Hollis". Had two sons under 16 yrs of age. Two sons over 16 yrs of age. 3 females. Halifax District, Rock County, N.C.

William Hollis, Pvt. Bricker's Co. 7th. Reg. Enlisted Feb. 12, 1777 for 3 yrs.

Reuben Hollis, Pvt. Same 8th. Reg. Enlisted Dec. '77, 3 yrs. Ended Jun '78.

Daniel Hollis, Militia---S201---Gallatin District.

William Hollis, Pvt. & Surgeon. Enlisted Feb. 24, 1778, Lt. Tatum's Co., Col. Gibson Linn's Master Roll. Functioned at age 60. Rutherford County, N.C. (This is the one I think might be my great-great grandfather and brother to Major James Hollis).

I had a letter from a Miss Hollis Hollis, Charles, N.C. and she said she still

Lived in the home of her ancestor Major Holland who came from Derrygreenagh, N. I. in 1800. He must have been in N. C. before and during the Revolution and made a home at Charlotte in 1803. However it is evident that he is the same man and you can see the rapid changing of the name.

This letter is getting long and tedious to you and to me also but if you have any information at hand in the children of the William Holland, the one I think might be the brother of Major Holland, I would appreciate your sending it to me. There were two ladies from N. C. who joined the D. A. R. on the record of this William Holland. One of them was a Miss Kate Holland, Seiling Springs, N. C. and the other one was Mrs. Aileen J. Gamble, Box 407, Shelby, N. C. There was another member joining on the record of Pvt. Thomas Holland, 214 W. W. 10th, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. I wrote to Miss Kate Holland but as yet I have received no reply.

I am anxious to hear if there is any comparison between the grave stones, a picture of which I am sending you, and the monument of Major Holland in Memphis Co., Tennessee.

It seems to me that if John Hollow 1st., of Dorchester Engand and Dorchester Mass., is the beginning of our Hollow line in America, that the above outline has to be correct through Nathaniel because he was the only son of John that had sons. Then the bewilderment starts. Nathaniel had three sons that could have continued the line. How will you find out which one? Joseph, Nathaniel 2nd. or John 3rd? If John 3rd. continues the line then he has five sons through either one of which the line could be continued. Which one? Joseph, John 5th., Jonas, Ephraim, or Samuel? It looks to me that would be an endless job to look them all up.

These sons of John 3rd. you have enumerated are the fourth generation and should produce the fifth generation in which Old William should be produced. It seems to me that we will have to find William first and then who was his father. I think that Miss Nellie Holland gave us the right clue when she told us that her ancestor Basal Holland had a brother named Matanathan and another named William and that they came from Georgetown Md. I got a line up on Basal from Mrs. who found him as Rev. Soldier but his name was Basal Hollow on his record. So if I were you I would pursue the Md. Records very closely. Old William must have been in Amelia Co. with Joseph, George and Daniel.

Miscellaneous Notes on Nellon Family

Samuel Nellon Lived in Amelia County, Va. in 1702.

Jeremiah Nellon lived in Boston, Mass. in 1646. Was a Preacher. Went back home to Northamptonshire, England, to his Church and a good living. No one knew who his father was.

Thomas Nellon, Son of John Nellon 1st. Named after Thomas Yarmouth who had him baptised at Barnstable, Mass., May 9th., 1641. John 1st.'s wife was probably Judith Yarmouth, sister to Charles Yarmouth.

Jessiah Nellon, Roxbury, Mass. "Is not mentioned in town records as S. A. or D".

Samuel Nellon, Of Framingham, Mass. Married at Marlboro in 1695 but returned to Framingham where his children, Samuel, Mary and Martha (Twins) andannah were born. He married Mary Collier and settled on Salem Plains, in Framingham in 1694. Was born in Hantuckett in 1661.

Jeremiah Nellon, Listed in Penna. Census, 1790, was one Jeremiah Holland (or Nellon) of Lancaster Co. Indexed as Holland or Nellon.

Christopher Nellon, Boston, Mass. (1613-1704). Wife Anne. Children: John 1648, Bridget 1650, Elizabeth 1655, Hannah 1658, Debora 1661, Mary 1663. (Probably brother to John 1st. of Dorchester).

Francis Nellon Was on the Tax List of Bourbon Co., Ky. in 1791. Later Note:-"Francis Holland, of Maryland, in 1776 signed the "Hartford Declaration" which resulted in The"Declaration of Independence". Hist. of Md. Vol. I Pg. 561.

Major Nellon, Son of William and Mary Harrison Nellon emigrated to N.C. 1728.

Lient. James Nellon, (1754-1810) Lient. in Capt. Joseph Hardin's Company, Col. Francis Logistic Reg. Served as Sheriff Tryon Co., Tenn., 1777-78. Born in Penna. Died Henry Co., Tenn. (D A R Book 75 Page 208)

Daniel Nellon, In Nash Co. N.C. (U.S. Census 1790) "Free White". Had two sons under 16 yrs of age. Two sons over 16 yrs of age. + 3 Free Families. Halifax District, Nash County, North Carolina.

Joseph Nellon. Deed from Joseph Nellon conveying 50 acres to Charles Noy, March 11, Page 268, Year 1772. However I notice in another Deed this name is spelled "Holland" from S.L. Farrar, Jr., Clerk Circuit Court Amelia Co., Va. Farrar's mother was a Nellon.

Lient. Avery Nellon (1740-1820) (Clay) Served as Lient. & Quartermaster in 5th Mass. Reg. under Col. Rufus Putnam. He was born in Mass Marlboro. Died in Richfield, N.Y. (He was grandson of John 3rd. mother's maiden name Avery)

Thomas Nellon (Clay) (1758-1799) Served as a Pvt. in Capt. White's Co. Col. Davies Reg., Virginia Troops. He was born and died in Va.

John Nellon (1726-1804) (Clay) Served as Artificer in Capt. Wheeler's Co. Mass. Troops. He was born and died in Boston. Married Eliz. Fallon 1761.

John Nellon, Jr. (1758-1824) (Clay). Was Carpenter's mate on the ships Rhode and Deane under Capt. Buffington & Capt. Hinman. He was born & died in Boston. In 1798 in 1797 he married Sarah May.

Thomas Nellon (1762-1816) (Clay). Served as Pvt. in S.C. Militia. He was born in Ireland. Died in Laurens S.C.

Capt. Richard Holland, (1700-1818) Commanded a company of Va. Militia at the battle of Guilford Court House. He was born and died in Prince William Co., Va. Married Martha Jones Walker in 1782. (Clay).

William Holland, (1760-1838) (Clay) Was a Pvt. in Maryland Troops in 1782-83. From Somerset Co. Md. where he was born and died.

Ephriam Holland (1714-1786) (Clay) Served as Pvt. in Capt. John Maynard's Co., Col. Job Cushing Reg. Died in Scyeston, Mass. "This man is a Hollon, son of John 3rd. He had a son Ephriam 2nd. born 1756 but this boy had no son to be father of John of Nelly."

Luther Holland (1750-1821) Was Pvt. 1776 under Capt. John Wheeler and Col. Ephriam Doelittle and Lieut. 1776 under Capt. Wing Spooner and Col. Nathan Sparhawk. He was born in Shrewsbury, Mass. and died in Peterham. "The man is a Hollon, son of Jonas Hollon (1711) and grandson of John Hollon 3rd. Had no sons."

Mrs Alberta Brown Register, born in Washington, D.C., wife of Elbridge Vlitch Register. Descendant of Nathan Holland & Sarah Waters. Nathan took "Oath of Fidelity and Allegiance" in Montgomery Co., Md. 1778. He died 1801 at Rockville, Md. (See Basal Hollon below). (Clay).

Lieut. Park Holland (1752-1844) (Clay) Rec'd pension for services as pvt., Ensign, Lieut., and Paymaster in Mass. Troops under Col. Putnam and Col. Holmes. Was born in Shrewsbury, Mass. Died in Bangor, Me. "This man is a Hollon, son of Jonas (1711) and grandson of John Hollon 3rd. His grandmother was Elizabeth Park."

John Holland (1748-1826) (Clay) Served as Ensign in Capt. Isaac Lewis Co. of Foot, Delaware Militia. He was born in Newcastle, Dela. Died in Clifton, N.Y. Married Elizabeth Stevens.

Lieut. George Holland Of Virginia. Was Lieut. in the 14th. Va. Reg. at White Plains. Was with Washington at Valley Forge. (Clay).

"Soldiers of American Revolution from State Records of North Carolina" (Iva)

William Holland Pvt. Bricker's Co.--7th. Reg. Enlisted Feb. 19, 1777 for 3 years.

Reason Holland Pvt. 5th. Reg. Enlisted Dec. '77, 3 years. Outd. Jan. '78. (See extract from letter from National Society D A R.)

Basal Hollon Militia---2224---Salisbury District. (See extract letter L. A. T. & Letter from Nellie Holland).

William Holland Pvt. and Ensign. Enlisted Feb. 26, 1778, Lieut. Tatums Co. Col. Gideon Lamb's Master Roll. Pensioned at Age 80. Rutherford Co., N.C. (See Mr. Orlando W. York's letter where he had deeds recorded for large tracts of land in 1798 & 1801)
