MAY 26TH LEFT FLORENCE AT 4 O'CLOCK A. M. ARRIVED AT W. N. C. 1/2 PAST 11 O'CLOCK P. M. DISTANCE 106 MILES.

MAY 27TH LEFT WILMINGTON N. C. AT 5 O'CLOCK A. M. ARRIVED N. C. AT 9 O'CLOCK ON THE FOLLOWING MORNING. DISTANCE 110 MILES.

MAY 28TH LEFT WELDON, N. C. AT 9 O'CLOCK A. M. ARRIVED SAME EVENING. DISTANCE 62 MILES.

MAY 29TH LEFT PETERSBURGH, VA. AT 12 O'CLOCK M. ARRIVED VA. AT 3 O'CLOCK P. M. DISTANCE 22 MILES.

MAY 30TH LEFT RICHMOND, VA. AT 5 O'CLOCK P. M. TAKEN ON RR. 12 MILES FROM CITY. CAMPED FOR THE NIGHT NEAR THE R.

MAY 31ST TAKEN TO THE FRONT LINES IN THE MORNING. ASSIGNED TO KERSHAW'S BRIGADE. MARCHED SOME (?) MILES AND SLEPT IN LINES NEAR COLD HARBOUR.

JUNE 1ST 1864 ADVANCED SOME DISTANCE AND THREW UP FORTIFICATIONS. AT 9 O'CLOCK ORDERED TO ATTACK THE ENEMY. KERSHAW'S BRIGADE CHARGED A BATTERY. THE CHARGE WAS MADE BUT WAS SOON REPULSED. FELL BACK TO THE FORTIFICATIONS IN THIS ENGAGEMENT. COL. KERSHAW WAS MORTALLY WOUNDED AND DIED THE FOLLOWING DAY. PRIVATE J. W. OF CO. "E" WAS KILLED. W. F. SOUTHERLAND WOUNDED IN THE SHOULDER. SEVEN (77) KILLED, WOUNDED AND MISSING FROM 20TH REGT. AT 4 P. M. THE ENEMY ASSAULTED OUR LINES BUT WAS HANDSOMELY REPELLED. LOSS.

JUNE 2ND THE ENEMY ATTACKED OUR RIGHT IN THE EVENING AND WAS REPULSED WITH HEAVY LOSS.

JUNE 3RD THE ENEMY WERE QUIET THAT DAY EXCEPT THE SHARPshooters. IN THE DARK WHEN THE ENEMY ATTACKED OUR RIGHT AGAIN BUT AS BEFORE WAS REPULSED.

JUNE 4TH ALL QUIET EXCEPT SHARPshootING WAS PRACTICED.

JUNE 5TH ALL QUIET EXCEPT THE SHARPshootING WHICH WAS PRACTICED. OUR STAY AT THAT PORTION OF THE LINES. SERGT. W. M. COWLEY WAS KILLED BY THE ENEMY SHARPshootERS.

JUNE 6TH, 7TH, 8TH, 9TH, 10TH, 11TH AND 12TH ALL QUIET EXCEPT USUAL FIRING OF PICKET AND ARTILLERY.

JUNE 13TH ORDERED TO THE RIGHT FROM COLD HARBOUR TO FLORENCE. DISTANCE 20 MILES. AT THIS PLACE WE REMAINED UNTIL THE 14TH WHEN WE WERE ORDERED TO WITHIN 2 MILES OF THE RIVER BELOW FLORENCE. DISTANCE MARCHED 10 MILES.

JUNE 17TH ORDERED TO MOVE IN THE DIRECTION OF PETERSBURGH. PETERSBURGH AT 10 O'CLOCK ON THE MORNING OF THE 18TH JUNE. P. M. WAS ORDERED TO THE ENTRENCHMENTS 1 1/2 MILES FROM COLD HARBOUR.

JUNE 19TH LIEUT. J. F. MATTISON WAS SENT TO JACKSON HOSPITAL. HE DIED ON THE 30TH OF JUNE (OF TYPHOID FEVER). IN THE EVENING THE ENEMY ASSAULTED OUR LINES AND WAS REPULSED. JOSHUA PRUITT WOUNDED SLIGHTLY. REMAINED IN THE ENTRENCHMENTS UNTIL THE NIGHT OF THE 20TH WHEN WE WERE CARRIED TO THE REAR. HEAVY SKIRMISHING EACH DAY.

JUNE 25TH, 26TH, 27TH AND 28TH ALL QUIET.

JUNE 29TH ORDERED DOWN THE PETERSBURGH AND WELDON R. R. ORDERED BACK SAME NIGHT TO OUR OLD CAMPS IN REAR.

MAY THE 25TH 1864 LEFT CHARLESTON FOR RICHMOND, VA. AT 1 1/2 PAST 11 O'CLOCK A. M. ARRIVED AT FLORENCE, S. C. 1 1/2 PAST 11 O'CLOCK P. DISTANCE 106 MILES.

MAY 26TH LEFT FLORENCE AT 4 O'CLOCK A. M. ARRIVED AT WILMINGTON N. C. 1 1/2 PAST 11 O'CLOCK P. M. DISTANCE 106 MILES.

MAY 27TH LEFT WILMINGTON N. C. AT 5 O'CLOCK A. M. ARRIVED AT WELDON, N. C. AT 9 O'CLOCK ON THE FOLLOWING MORNING. DISTANCE 162 MILES.

MAY 28TH LEFT WELDON, N. C. AT 9 O'CLOCK A. M. ARRIVED AT PETERSBURG, VA. SAME EVENING. DISTANCE 62 MILES.

MAY 29TH LEFT PETERSBURG, VA. AT 12 O'CLOCK M. ARRIVED AT RICHMOND, VA. AT 3 O'CLOCK P. M. DISTANCE 22 MILES.

MAY 31ST TAKEN TO THE FRONT LINES IN THE MORNING. ASSIGNED TO KERSHAW'S BRIGADE. MARCHED SOME (?) MILES AND SLEPT IN LINE OF FORTIFICATION NEAR COLD HARBOUR.

JUNE 1ST 1864 ADVANCED SOME DISTANCE AND THREW UP FORTIFICATIONS. AT 9 O'CLOCK ORDERED TO ATTACK THE ENEMY. KERSHAW'S BRIGADE ORDERED TO CHARGE A BATTERY. THE CHARGE WAS MADE BUT WAS SOON REPULSED AND FELL BACK TO THE FORTIFICATIONS IN THIS ENGAGEMENT. COL. L. M. KERSHAW WAS MORTALLY WOUNDED AND DIED THE FOLLOWING DAY. PRIVATE ROBBEN CO. OF CO. "E" WAS KILLED. W. F. SOUTHERLAND WOUNDED IN THE ARM. SEVEN (77) KILLED, WOUNDED AND MISSING FROM 20TH REGT. AT 2 O'CLOCK P. M. THE ENEMY ASSAULTED OUR LINES BUT WAS HANDSOMELY REPULSED WITH LOSS.

JUNE 2ND THE ENEMY ATTACKED OUR RIGHT IN THE EVENING AND WAS AGAIN REPULSED WITH HEAVY LOSS.

JUNE 3RD THE ENEMY WERE QUIET THAT DAY EXCEPT THE SHARPSHOOTING IN THE DARK WHEN THE ENEMY ATTACKED OUR RIGHT AGAIN BUT AS BEFORE WERE REPULSED.

JUNE 4TH ALL QUIET EXCEPT SHARPSHOOTING WAS PRACTICED A GREAT DEAL.

JUNE 5TH ALL QUIET EXCEPT THE SHARPSHOOTING WHICH WAS KEPT UP DURING OUR STAY AT THAT PORTION OF THE LINES. SERGT. W. M. COWAN WAS KILLED BY THE ENEMY SHARPSHOOTERS.

JUNE 6TH, 7TH, 8TH, 9TH, 10TH, 11TH AND 12TH ALL QUIET EXCEPT THE USUAL FIRING OF PICKET AND ARTILLERY.

JUNE 13TH ORDERED TO MOVE TO THE RIGHT FROM COLD HARBOUR TO FRASIER'S FARM. DISTANCE 20 MILES. AT THIS PLACE WE REMAINED UNTIL THE 16TH OF JUNE WHEN WE WERE ORDERED TO MOVE WITHIN 2 MILES OF THE RIVER BELOW DRURY'S BLVD. DISTANCE MARCHED 10 MILES.

JUNE 17TH ORDERED TO MOVE IN THE DIRECTION OF PETERSBURG. ARRIVED PETERSBURG AT 10 O'CLOCK ON THE MORNING OF THE 18TH JUNE. AT 2 O'CLOCK P. M. WAS ORDERED TO THE ENTRENCHMENTS 1 1/2 MILES FROM CITY.

JUNE 19TH LIEUT. J. F. MATTISON WAS SENT TO JACKSON HOSPITAL WHERE HE DIED ON THE 30TH OF JUNE (OF TYPHOID FEVER). IN THE EVENING THE ENEMY ASSAULTED OUR LINES AND WAS REPULSED. JOSHUA PRUITT WOUNDED IN LEG SLIGHTLY. REMAINED IN THE ENTRENCHMENTS UNTIL THE NIGHT OF THE 24TH WHEN WE WERE CARRIED TO THE REAR. HEAVY SKIRMISHING EACH DAY.

JUNE 25TH, 26TH, 27TH AND 28TH ALL QUIET.

JUNE 29TH ORDERED DOWN THE PETERSBURG AND WELDON R. R. 10 MILES. ORDERED BACK SAME NIGHT TO OUR OLD CAMPS IN REAR.

JUNE 30TH ALL QUIET.

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MAY 31ST TAKEN TO THE FRONT LINES IN THE MORNING. ASSIGNED TO KERSHAW'S BRIGADE. MARCHED SOME (?) MILES AND SLEPT IN LINE OF BATTLE NEAR COLD HARBOUR.

JUNE 1ST 1864 ADVANCED SOME DISTANCE AND THREW UP FORTIFYCATIONS. AT 9 O'CLOCK ORDERED TO ATTACK THE ENEMY. KERSHAW'S BRIGADE ORDERED TO CHARGE A BATTERY. THE CHARGE WAS MADE BUT WAS SOON REPULSED AND FELL BACK TO THE FORTIFYCATIONS IN THIS ENGAGEMENT. COL. L. M. KEITT WAS MORTALLY WOUNDED AND DIED THE FOLLOWING DAY. PRIVATE ROBBEN COLEMAN OF CO. "E" WAS KILLED. W. F. SOUTHERLAND WOUNDED IN THE ARM. SEVENTY SEVEN (77) KILLED, WOUNDED AND MISSING FROM 20TH REGT. AT 2 O'CLOCK P. M. THE ENEMY ASSAULTED OUR LINES BUT WAS HANSOMELY REPULSED WITH HEAVY LOSS.

JUNE 2ND THE ENEMY ATTACKED OUR RIGHT IN THE EVENING AND WAS AGAIN REPULSED WITH HEAVY LOSS.

JUNE 3RD THE ENEMY WERE QUITE THAT DAY EXCEPT THE SHARPSHOOTING UNTIL DARK WHEN THE ENEMY ATTACKED OUR RIGHT AGAIN BUT AS BEFORE WERE REPULSED.

JUNE 4TH ALL QUIET EXCEPT SHARPSHOOTING WAS PRACTICED A GREAT DEAL.

JUNE 5TH ALL QUIET EXCEPT THE SHARPSHOOTING WHICH WAS KEPT UP DURING OUR STAY AT THAT PORTION OF THE LINES. SERGT. W. M. COWAN WAS KILLED BY THE ENEMY SHARPSHOOTERS.

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JUNE 17TH ORDERED TO MOVE IN THE DIRECTION OF PETERSBURGH. ARRIVED PETERSBURGH AT 10 O'CLOCK ON THE MORNING OF THE 18TH JUNE. AT 2 O'CLOCK P. M. WAS ORDERED TO THE ENTRENCHMENTS 1 1/2 MILES FROM CITY.

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JUNE 25TH, 26TH, 27TH AND 28TH ALL QUIET.

JUNE 29TH ORDERED DOWN THE PETERSBURGH AND WELDON R. R. 10 MILES. ORDERED BACK SAME NIGHT TO OUR OLD CAMPS IN REAR.

JUNE 30TH ALL QUIET.

JULY 1ST ALL QUIET.

JULY 2ND ORDERED DOWN THE PETERSBURG AND WELDON R. R. RETURNED SAME NIGHT.

JULY 3RD, 4TH, 5TH, 6TH, 7TH, 8TH, 9TH, 10TH, 11TH, 12TH, 13TH, 14TH AND 15TH ALL QUIET.

JULY 16TH AGAIN ORDERED ON THE PETERSBURG AND WELDON R. R.

JULY 17TH LAY IN LINE OF BATTLE IN REAR OF R. R.

JULY 18TH RETURNED TO OUR OLD CAMPS AND REMAINED THERE UNTIL THE 23RD OF JULY WHEN WE RECEIVED ORDERS TO MOVE TO THE NORTH SIDE OF JAMES RIVER. ARRIVED AT THE ENTRENCHMENTS AT 6 O'CLOCK P. M. DISTANCE 22 MILES.

JULY 24TH REMAINED IN CAMP ALL DAY, THAT NIGHT RECEIVED ORDERS TO MOVE AT 4 O'CLOCK A. M.

JULY 25TH FORCED LINE AND MARCHED 1 1/2 MILES. ORDERED BACK TO SAME POSITION. ON SAME EVENING RECEIVED ORDERS TO MOVE AT 2 O'CLOCK P. M. MARCHED 6 MILES AND ATTACKED THE ENEMY'S PICKETS, DROVE THEM CAPTURED 49 PRIVATES, 4 COMMISSIONED OFFICERS, 3 SERGTS. AND 2 CORPS TAKEN POSITION ALONG THE RIVER ROAD, THREW UP FORTIFICATIONS SAME NIGHT.

JULY 26TH CO "E" THROWN OUT ON SKIRMISH, HEAVY SHELLING THROUGHOUT THE DAY FROM THE ENEMY'S BATTERIES AND IN THE EVENING DROVE IN OUR SKIRMISHERS. (J. T. ASHLEY WOUNDED IN RIGHT ARM, SINCE AMPUTATED), (CORP. C. P. WRIGHT MORTALLY WOUNDED, DIED NEXT DAY).

JULY 27TH THE ENEMY ATTACKED US ON OUR LEFT REAR AND FRONT BEING CUT OFF, WERE FORCED TO RETIRE FIGHTING. (CORPORAL W. C. HALL WOUNDED LEFT ARM, SLIGHT). RETREATED SOME THREE MILES TO OUR FORTIFICATIONS AND REMAINED THERE UNTIL NEXT MORNING.

JULY 28TH AGAIN ORDERED TO MARCH. KERSHAW'S, MCGOWAN'S AND LANE'S BRIGADES ORDERED TO CHARGE THE ENEMY'S LINES, THE CHARGE WAS MADE KERSHAW'S BRIGADE TAKING THE ENEMY POSITION BUT HAD TO FALL BACK MUCH EXPOSED. (W. D. GILKERSON WOUNDED IN HIP) FELL BACK 2 1/2 MILES THREW UP BREASTWORKS.

JULY 29TH REMAINED IN ENTRENCHMENTS ON NEW MARKET HEIGHTS.

JULY 30TH LEFT NEW MARKET HEIGHTS AT 4 O'CLOCK P. M. MARCHED 3 MILES BEYOND JAMES RIVER AND CAMPED FOR THE NIGHT. MARCHED 7 MILES.

JULY 31ST CONTINUED THE MARCH 3 MILES ALONG THE LINES BETWEEN THE JAMES AND APPOMATOX RIVERS. CAMPED IN REAR OF LINES.

AUG. 1ST 1864 MOVED CAMPS ONE AND HALF MILES.

AUG. 2ND NOTHING UNUSUAL OCCURED. (LIEUT. W. C. PRUITT TAKEN CHARGE COOKING DETAIL)

AUG. 3RD ALL QUIET. (CORP. JESSY ROBINSON AND L. P. TUCKER LEFT ON 2 DAYS FURLOUGH OF IN ULCENCE) (CORP. W. C. HALL LEFT HOSPITAL ON 4 DAYS FURLOUGH)

AUG. 4TH AND 5TH ALL QUIET.

AUG. 6TH LEFT CAMPS AT 3 O'CLOCK MARCHED 3 MILES TO CHESTER STATION P. R. R. ORDERED ON THE TRAIN FOR RICHMOND. ARRIVED THERE NEAR SUNSET ORDERED TO THE CENTRAL R. R. AND ORDERED ABOARD THE TRAIN AT 12 O'CLOCK THAT NIGHT.

AUG. 7TH ARRIVED AT GORDONSVILLE NEAR 9 O'CLOCK A. M. DISTANCE 75 MILES. CHANGED CARS AT THE ABOVE STATION AND WAS TAKEN WITHIN 7 MILES OF CULPEPER C. H. WENT INTO CAMPS.

AUG. 8TH, 9TH, 10TH AND 11TH REMAINED IN CAMPS ALL QUIET.

AUG. 12TH ORDERED TO LEAVE AT SUNRISE. MARCHED 3 MILES ABOVE CULPEPER C. H. AND HALTED TO TAKE DINNER. AT 4 O'CLOCK P. M. TAKEN UP LINE OF MARCH. MARCHED 15 MILES AND HALTED AT 9 O'CLOCK P. M. MARCHED 25 MILES.

AUG. 13TH CONTINUED THE MARCH UP TO 1/2 PAST 8 O'CLOCK A. M. REMAINED THERE UNTIL 4 O'CLOCK P. M. CONTINUED THE MARCH UNTIL 8 O'CLOCK P. M. TAKEN UP CAMP FOR THE NIGHT. MARCHED 15 MILES.

AUG. 14TH CONTINUED THE MARCH FROM 5 O'CLOCK A. M. UNTIL 2 O'CLOCK P. M. TAKEN UP CAMP FOR THE NIGHT NEAR FRONT ROYAL ON THE SOUTH PRONG OF THE SHENANDOAH RIVER. MARCHED 12 MILES.

AUG. 15TH MARCHED SOME 2 MILES UP THE RIVER AND CAMPED.

AUG. 16TH WOFFORDS AND TRYANT'S BRIGADES THROWN ACROSS THE RIVER OPPOSITE FRONT ROYAL. ENGAGED THE ENEMY.

AUG. 17TH LEFT CAMPS CROSSED THE RIVER AND FOUND THE ENEMY TO BE RETREATING. PURSUED THEM TO WITHIN 4 1/2 MILES OF WINCHESTER. CAMPED FOR THE NIGHT WITH ORDERS TO MARCH AT DAWN OF DAY.

AUG. 18TH LEFT CAMPS AT DAYLIGHT MARCHED TO WINCHESTER. FOUND GEN. EARLY IN POSSESSION OF THE TOWN.

AUG. 19TH AND 20TH REMAINED IN CAMPS ALL QUIET.

AUG. 21ST LEFT CAMPS AND MARCHED SOME 9 MILES. AT 10 O'CLOCK A. M. OUR SKIRMISHERS ENGAGED THE ENEMY AND DROVE THEM SOME FOUR MILES TO LEE'S FARM WITHIN 7 MILES OF CHARLESTOWN. MADE A STAND WITH A FIELD BATTERY. KERSHAW'S BRIGADE FLANKED AND DROVE THEM BACK. TAKEN UP CAMP FOR THE NIGHT. LEFT WING OF 20TH REGT. ON PICKET.

AUG. 22ND LEFT CAMPS IN PURSUIT OF THE ENEMY. FORMED A JUNCTION WITH GEN. EARLY. MARCHED 5 MILES AND WENT INTO CAMPS AT 8 1/2 O'CLOCK A. M. THE ENEMY HAVING RETREATED BACK WITHIN TWO MILES OF HARPERS FERRY. WE RETURNED TO TAKE UP CAMPS NEAR THE CHARLESTOWN ROAD WITHIN TWO MILES OF THE TOWN AND TEN MILES OF HARPERS FERRY. (JOSEPH COKER DIED AUG. 18TH)

AUG. 23RD ALL REMAINED QUIET.

AUG. 24TH INSPECTION AT 10 O'CLOCK A. M.

AUG. 25TH LEFT THE ABOVE CAMPS AT DAYLIGHT, MARCHED THROUGH CHARLESTOWN AND FORMED LINE OF BATTLE ONE MILE EAST OF TOWN AND CAMPED 7 MILES OF HARPERS FERRY IN FULL VIEW OF THE MARYLAND HEIGHTS AND HEIGHT OF LONDON COUNTY.

AUG. 26TH ALL QUIET UNTIL 4 O'CLOCK. THE ENEMY ATTACKED OUR PICKET LINE WITH INFANTRY AND CAVALRY. BROKE OUR RIGHT AND LEFT. 28 OF THE 15TH REGT. WAS CAPTURED.

AUG. 27TH ORDERED IN LINE OF BATTLE AND REMAINED IN LINE UNTIL 6 O'CLOCK A. M. WAS ORDERED TO MOVE. PASSED THROUGH CHARLESTOWN MARCHED THE SMITHFIELD PIKE TO SMITHFIELD FROM THENCE TO TRUCETOWN HAVING MARCHED 17 MILES. NOW WITHIN 7 MILES OF WINCHESTER. SMITHFIELD IS DISTANCE FROM CHARLESTOWN 6 MILES. TRUCETOWN IS DISTANCE FROM SMITHFIELD 8 MILES. ALL QUIET AT NIGHT. CHICAGO CONVENTION MET ON THE 28TH AND 29TH OF AUG. ALL WAS QUIET.

AUG. 30TH ALL QUIET.

AUG. 31ST REGT. RETURNED FROM PICKET INSPECTION. ORDERED AT 2 P. M. AT FOUR O'CLOCK MOVED OFF IN THE DIRECTION OF WINCHESTER. ARRIVED AT WINCHESTER AT 1/2 PAST 7 O'CLOCK P. M. ALL QUIET.

SEPT. 1ST 1864 ALL QUIET. ORDERED TO PREPARE FOR INSPECTION AT TEN O'CLOCK A. M.

SEPT. 2ND ALL QUIET.

SEPT. 3RD LEFT CAMPS NEAR WINCHESTER AT 12 O'CLOCK. MARCHED THE BERRYVILLE PIKE TO WITHIN 3 1/2 MILES OF THE TOWN. ENGAGED THE ENEMY'S SKIRMISHERS DROVE THEM TO WITHIN 1 1/2 MILES OF BERRYVILLE WHERE WE WERE THROWN IN LINE OF BATTLE, CHARGED A BATTERY (IN CHARGE THEM J. C. SHAW WAS WOUNDED IN THE RIGHT EAR. W. L. PEARMAN WAS WOUNDED IN THE FOREHEAD, EACH SLIGHTLY WOUNDED) WE REMAINED IN THE ENEMY'S ENTRENCHMENTS ALL NIGHT.

SEPT. 4TH REMAINED IN POSITION AT BERRYVILLE.

SEPT. 5TH RETURNED TO WINCHESTER.

SEPT. 6TH ALL QUIET IN FRONT.

SEPT. 7TH THE ENEMY REPORTED TO BE ADVANCING. KERSHAW'S BRIGADE ORDERED TO MEET THEM. MARCHED OUT FROM CAMPS AT FOUR O'CLOCK P. M. PROCEEDED SOME MILES, THE ENEMY REPORTED TO HAVE FALLEN BACK. THE BRIGADE WAS THEN ORDERED BACK TO CAMPS. THE LEFT WING OF OUR REGT. ORDERED ON PICKET TWO MILES FROM CAMPS. ALL QUIET DURING OUR TOUR DUTY.

SEPT. 8TH RETURNED TO CAMP FROM PICKET DUTY AT 9 O'CLOCK A. M. AT 2 O'CLOCK P. M.

SEPT. 9TH ALL QUIET.

SEPT. 10TH GEN. EARLEY'S FORCES ENGAGED THE ENEMY AT BUNKER'S HILL HE CAPTURED NINETY PRISONERS.

SEPT. 11TH ALL QUIET. GEN. CONNER TAKEN COMMAND OF KERSHAW'S OLD BRIGADE.

SEPT. 12TH ALL QUIET.

SEPT. 13TH ORDERED TO MARCH TO THE FRONT. THE ENEMY REPORTED TO ADVANCING. WE MARCHED OUT AND FORMED LINE OF BATTLE. THE ENEMY ATTACKED AND CAPTURED OUR CAVALRY PICKETS AND THE EIGHT REGT. EXCEPT TWO COMPANIES. THE ENEMY THEN FELL BACK. WE WERE THEN IN ONE MILE AND A HALF OF WINCHESTER.

SEPT. 14TH UP TO TEN O'CLOCK ALL QUIET. RECEIVED ORDERS TO GO ON PICKET THE FOLLOWING MORNING. AT 9 O'CLOCK P. M. RECEIVED ORDERS TO MOVE AT SUNRISE ON THE FOLLOWING MORNING.

SEPT. 15TH AT 10 O'CLOCK A. M. MOVED OFF IN THE DIRECTION OF WINCH TO KERNSTOWN AND THROUGH MIDDLETOWN. LEFT THE PIKE ROAD LEADING FROM WINCHESTER TO STAUNTON. MARCHED OUT 3 1/2 MILES AND CAMPED FOR THE NIGHT. MARCHED 18 MILES.

SEPT. 16TH ACCORDING TO ORDERS LEFT CAMPS AT 6 O'CLOCK A. M. MARCHED TO THE NORTH SHENANDOAH RIVER WADED IT AND MARCHED THROUGH LENSAY V. TO MCKEYFORDS ON THE SOUTH SHENANDOAH RIVER, FORDED IT. ALSO MARCHED SOUTH DIRECTION AND CAMPED. DISTANCE MARCHED 13 MILES.

SEPT. 17TH LEFT CAMPS AND MARCHED UP TO 4 O'CLOCK P. M. AND CAMPED THE NIGHT. DISTANCE MARCHED 15 MILES.

SEPT. 18TH LEFT CAMPS AT SUNRISE AND MARCHED THROUGH PERRYVILLE AND WOODVILLE. TAKEN UP CAMPS AT 4 O'CLOCK P. M. MARCHED 16 MILES.

SEPT. 19TH LEFT CAMPS AT 8 O'CLOCK ARRIVED AT CULPEPER C. H. AT 3 O'CLOCK P. M. LEFT WING OF 20TH REGT. ON PICKET. MARCHED 13 1/2 MILES.

SEPT. 20TH LEFT CULPEPER C. H. AND MARCHED DOWN THE ALEXANDER AND GORDONSVILLE R. R. TO RAPIDAN STATION, FOUND THE BRIDGE DESTROYED. WENT INTO CAMPS. MARCHED 12 MILES.

SEPT. 21ST AND 22ND ALL QUIET. REMAINED IN CAMPS.

SEPT. 23RD LEFT CAMP AT 9 O'CLOCK CONTINUED THE MARCH DOWN THE R.

SEPT. 24TH LEFT CAMPS AT GORDONSVILLE MARCHED THROUGH BARBERSVILLE 6 MILES FROM GORDONSVILLE AND PASSED RUCKERSVILLE 11 MILES FROM GORDONSVILLE. FROM THENCE TO STANDERSVILLE NEAR WHICH PLACE WE CAMPED FOR THE NIGHT AT 4 O'CLOCK P. M. MARCHED 19 MILES.

SEPT. 25TH ORDERED TO MARCH AT DAYLIGHT. MARCHED UP TO 4 O'CLOCK. CAMPED NEAR THE SOUTH PRONG OF THE SHENANDOAH RIVER NEAR PORT REPUBLIC DISTANCE MARCHED 17 MILES.

SEPT. 26TH LEFT CAMPS MARCHED TO THE GAP (WHERE GEN. JACKSON FOUGHT AND REPULSED SPEERES) THE ENEMY CAVALRY ATTACKED OUR SUPPLY TRAIN. KERSHAW'S DIVISION THROWN IN LINE OF BATTLE. THE ENEMY'S CAVALRY MADE A CHARGE WAS REPULSED. NO CASUALTIES ON OUR SIDE. THE ENEMY SHELLED US FROM THEIR BATTERIES ON THE OTHER SIDE OF THE RIVER. WE REPULSED THEM. MARCHED THROUGH THE GAP AND JOINED GEN. EARLY'S COM. LEFT WING OF 20TH REGT. ON PICKET. MARCHED 17 MILES.

SEPT. 27TH RELIEVED FROM PICKET JOINED THE REGT. AND BRIGADE. MARCH ON THE OPPOSITE SIDE OF THE RIVER FROM PORT REPUBLIC THREW UP FORTIFICATIONS AT SUNSET ORDERED DOWN NEAR THE RIVER. CAMPED FOR THE NIGHT. MARCHED 8 MILES.

SEPT. 28TH LEFT CAMPS MARCHED THROUGH PORT REPUBLIC AND NEW HOPE TO WITHIN ONE MILE OF WAYNESBORO. CAMPED FOR THE NIGHT. MARCHED 20 MILES.

SEPT. 29TH REMAINED IN CAMPS AND ORDERED TO CLEAN UP. ALL QUIET. C. W. C. HALL RETURNED TO CAMPS.

SEPT. 30TH ORDERED ON LAST NIGHT TO LEAVE CAMP THIS MORNING AT 5 O'CLOCK. ORDER WAS COUNTERMANDED, ORDERED TO LEAVE TOMORROW AT SUNRISE.

OCT. 1ST 1864 LEFT CAMPS AT 8 O'CLOCK A. M. MARCHED BACK THE WAYNESBORO ROAD TO THE STAUNTON AND WINCHESTER PIKE. PASSED MT. SIDNEY 16 MILES FROM WAYNESBORO AND WENT INTO CAMPS. MARCHED 17 MILES. CAPT. J. COWAN SENT TO HOSPITAL. RAINED ALL DAY.

OCT. 2ND, 3RD, 4TH AND 5TH ALL QUIET REMAINED IN CAMPS.

OCT. 6TH LEFT CAMPS AT 12 O'CLOCK MARCHED THE STAUNTON AND WINCHESTER PIKE. PASSED MT. CRAWFORD 16 MILES FROM STAUNTON TAKEN UP CAMPS NEAR HARRISONBURG AT OR NEAR SUNSET. MARCHED 10 MILES.

OCT. 7TH LEFT CAMPS AT SUNRISE PASSED HARRISONBURG AND REACHED NEW MARKET NEAR SUNSET. MARCHED 22 MILES.

OCT. 8TH ALL QUIET (SPRINKLE OF SNOW)

OCT. 9TH ALL QUIET UNTIL 4 O'CLOCK P. M. ORDERED TO FALL IN IMMEDIATELY THE ENEMY WAS REPORTED TO BE ADVANCING. JACKSON EMERSON (?) AND JOHN'S CAVALRY ENGAGED THE ENEMY AND WAS REPULSED. WE WERE MARCHED SOME 3 MILES TO THE FRONT TO MEET THE ENEMY. THE ENEMY FELL BACK. WE WERE THEN ORDERED TO RETURN TO OUR OLD CAMPS. MARCHED 6 MILES.

OCT. 10TH ALL QUIET WENT ON PICKET ON THE LENSAY MOUNTAIN. DISTANCE FROM CAMPS 5 MILES.

OCT. 11TH RELIEVED FROM PICKET AT 4 O'CLOCK P. M. AND RETURNED TO CAMPS. ORDERED TO MOVE AT SUNRISE.

OCT. 12TH LEFT NEW MARKET AT 7 O'CLOCK A. M. MARCHED UNTIL 4 O'CLOCK P. M. WENT INTO CAMPS. MARCHED 17 MILES. PASSED MT. JACKSON 7 MILES FROM NEW MARKET. PASSED EDENBURGH 7 MILES FROM MT. JACKSON. PASSED WOODSTOCK NEXT MORNING FIVE MILES FROM EDENBURGH.

OCT. 13TH LEFT CAMPS AT 6 O'CLOCK PASSED STRASBURGH AND TWO MILES BEYOND THE TOWN WE FOUND THE ENEMY IN POSITION ON CEDAR RUN. CONNERS BRIGADE THROWN IN LINE OF BATTLE AT OR NEAR 12 O'CLOCK M. ARTILLERY

CARRIED TO THE FRONT. SHELLED THE ENEMYS CAMPS ON THE NORTH SIDE OF CEDAR RUN. ENEMY ADVANCED TO A STONE FENCE IN FRONT OF OUR ARTILLERY. WE THEN WERE ORDERED TO CHARGE THEM FROM THEIR POSITION. WE CHARGED AND DROVE THEM FROM THEIR POSITION. IN THIS ENGAGEMENT W. J. TUCKER WAS WOUNDED IN RIGHT THIGH, SEVERE. C. C. CRUBE IN LEFT HAND, SEVERE. P. E. HOLIDY IN FINGER, P. O. SIMPSON IN FOOT, W. G. W. JOHNSTON IN FOOT, SERGT. N. A. SHIRLEY IN BOWELS, CORP. J. M. HANKS IN RIGHT SIDE, P. N. BROWN IN THIGH, S. P. MURDOCK IN ELBOW, ALL SLIGHT EXCEPT TWO. CAPT. KINARD OF CO. F. AND LIEUT. CIDDLE OF CO. A. WERE KILLED. GEN. CONNER WOUNDED IN LEFT LEG. SINCE AMPUTATED. LOSS IN REGT. 11 KILLED 57 WOUNDED. AFTER ENGAGEMENT FELL BACK TO FISHERS HILL. MARCHED 21 MILES.

OCT. 14TH ALL QUIET. IN THE EVENING WE MOVED OUT TWO MILES TO CAMP FOR THE NIGHT.

OCT. 15TH MOVED OUT ON THE LINES AND HAD INSPECTION OF ARMS. RETURNED BACK TO CAMPS.

OCT. 16TH REMAINED IN CAMPS. RECEIVED ORDERS TO MOVE AT DAYLIGHT ON THE FOLLOWING MORNING.

OCT. 17TH LEFT CAMPS AT DAYLIGHT. MARCHED 3 MILES TO THE FRONT AND FORMED LINE OF BATT E. STACKED ARMS WITH ORDERS TO REMAIN IN REAR OF ARMS. AT 12 O'CLOCK M. ORDERED BACK TO OLD CAMPS. MARCHED 6 MILES.

OCT. 18TH REMAINED IN CAMPS ALL QUIET. ORDERED THAT NIGHT TO BE READY TO MOVE AT A MOMENTS NOTICE.

OCT. 19TH LEFT CAMPS AT 12 O'CLOCK THAT MORNING ADVANCED ON THE ENEMY WADED CEDAR RUN AND ATTACKED THE ENEMY AT THE BREAK OF DAY, ROUTED THEM IN CONFUSION, SOME SCARCELY HAVING TIME TO PUT ON THEIR CLOTHING. DROVE THEM FROM THREE STRONG LINES OF FORTIFICATIONS. DROVE THEM SOME 5 MILES CAPTURED TWENTY EIGHT PIECES OF ARTILLERY, SEVENTEEN HUNDRED PRISONERS. THE GROUND WAS STREWED WITH DEAD. NEAR FOUR O'CLOCK P. M. OUR LEFT FLANK WAS TURNED AND FELL BACK IN CONFUSION. LOSING ALL THE ARTILLERY THAT WE HAD CAPTURED AND TWELVE PIECES BESIDES. LOSS IN CO "E" KILLED: P. M. C. BRELL, J. J. KEATON, WOUNDED: J. A. TRIBLE AND J. J. WILSON. MISSING: W. G. W. JOHNSTON, J. BANITER, J. L. BROOK, S. H. MANN, G. M. PROBINSON, E. S. GANTT, B. F. DRIVER AND ROBERT KAY THAT WAS WOUNDED AND PAROLLED. FELL BACK TO FISHERS HILL.

OCT. 20TH LEFT FISHERS HILL AT 2. O'CLOCK A. M. MARCHED TO OLD CAMPS AT NEW MARKET. MARCHED 30 MILES.

OCT. 21ST ALL QUIET.

OCT. 22ND ALL QUIET.

OCT. 23RD MOVED OUT TO NEW CAMP ONE AND A HALF MILES.

OCT. 24TH LIEUT. W. C. PRUITT SENT TO HOSPITAL.

OCT. 25TH ALL QUIET UP TO THE 31ST OF OCT.

NOV. 1ST 1864 REMAINED IN CAMPS UNTIL THE 9TH OF NOV. WHEN WE RECEIVED ORDERS TO MOVE NEXT MORNING AT SUNRISE.

NOV. 10TH LEFT CAMPS ACCORDING TO ORDERS, MOVED IN THE DIRECTION OF WINCHESTER. WENT INTO CAMPS NEAR 4 O'CLOCK P. M. MARCHED 18 MILES.

NOV. 11TH LEFT CAMPS AT SUNRISE MARCHED TO WITHIN TWO MILES OF NEWTOWN. PASSED STRASBURGH THE BATTLE FIELDS OF THE 13TH AND 19TH OF OCT. PASSED MIDDLETOWN WENT INTO CAMPS. MARCHED 22 MILES AND THREW UP BREASTWORKS.

NOV. 12TH REMAINED IN LINE OF BATTLE ALL DAY. CAVALRY SKIRMISHING IN FRONT AT DARK. WERE ORDERED TO FALL BACK TO FISHERS HILL. MARCHED

10 MILES.

NOV. 13TH LEFT CAMPS AT SUNRISE AND MARCHED THE PIKE TOWARDS STAUNTON
WENT INTO CAMPS AT 4 O'CLOCK. MARCHED 17 MILES.

NOV. 14TH LEFT CAMPS AT SUNRISE AND MARCHED TO OUR OLD CAMPS AT NEW
MARKET BY 3 O'CLOCK P. M. MARCHED 14 MILES.

NOV. 15TH LEFT CAMPS AND MOVED IN THE DIRECTION OF STAUNTON. MARCHED
8 MILES AND WENT INTO CAMPS.

NOV. 16TH LEFT CAMPS AND CONTINUED THE MARCH UNTIL 4 O'CLOCK P. M.
AND WENT INTO CAMPS NEAR MT. CRAWFORD. MARCHED 18 MILES.

NOV. 17TH LEFT CAMPS AT SUNRISE AND MARCHED TO WAYNESBORO AND WENT
INTO CAMPS AT DARK. MARCHED 27 MILES.

NOV. 18TH LEFT CAMPS AT 2 O'CLOCK A. M. AND WENT TO WAYNESBORO DEPOT
AND REMAINED THERE UNTIL SUNRISE AND TAKEN THE TRAIN FOR RICHMOND.
ARRIVED RICHMOND AT 10 O'CLOCK P. M.

NOV. 19TH LEFT RICHMOND AT 2 O'CLOCK P. M. AND WENT OUT 4 MILES AND
CAMPED.

NOV. 20TH REMAINED IN CAMPS.

NOV. 21ST ORDERED OUT TO THE LINES ON THE NINE MILE ROAD. MARCHED
2 MILES OUT AND WENT INTO CAMPS.

NOV. 22ND REMAINED IN CAMPS UNTIL THE 7TH DEC. 1864. DURING THIS
TIME WE WERE PUTTING UP WINTER HUTS.

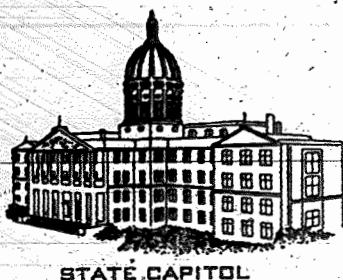
