- 1. Under the direction of the Rt. Hon the Minister of Finance and pursuant to Section 10 of the Public Records Act (Northern Ireland) 1923, I respectfully beg to submit my report of the work of the Public Record Office during the years 1954–1959.
- 2. The delay in the production of this report and the differences in presentation from its predecessors, need comment. The delay is due to the fact that archives cannot be adequately reported upon until they have been catalogued and the cataloguing capacity of the Office has been overtaken by accessions of new records. This was due to a deliberate policy whereby those resources of the Office which were not inevitably concerned with day to day routine were concentrated on the search for and collection of records. In a rapidly changing community such as Northern Ireland development frequently leads to destruction of the old and this is very true of old papers. Conservation and collection therefore have deliberately been given priority over cataloguing. Once valuable record material is destroyed it cannot be replaced; its destruction is irrevocable. Cataloguing can be delayed and has been.
- 3. Concentration upon conservation produced results which themselves created problems. Something of their scale can be indicated by noting that one official archive, the Poor Law, alone exceeded fifty tons and one private deposit from the Hillsborough Estate, ten tons. In the six years covered by this report about 1,000 collections have been deposited by private donors; by contrast only twice this number were deposited during the whole of the previous thirty years. This report therefore deals with one-third of the total number of private deposits in the Office at the end of 1959. In addition to these there were accessions of official records of such unprecedented bulk that storage accommodation had to be increased fourfold.
- 4. A major part of previous reports consisted of a detailed personal names index compiled from the individual documents. There is no doubt that this index assisted genealogists living at a distance and was therefore widely welcomed. It did not however materially aid the academic researcher requiring information on a particular place or subject as distinct from seeking biographical material. Moreover the present quantity of accessions makes it impossible to prepare such indexes to individual documents. This report has therefore been provided with personal, place and subject indexes to the list of accessions printed in the appendixes.

### ACCESSIONS

5. The Office is greatly indebted to all those who have deposited private archives and appreciates the facilities offered by others who have allowed their papers to be photocopied. Without such co-operation the work of the Office could not develop. All the accessions in the period are described in detail in the

appendixes (pp. 15-103); only general comment can be made here. The archives of estate offices formed the major part of private accessions. These are of considerable value for the study of local history because the great landed estate dominated the local scene in pre-twentieth century Ireland. The records of the administration of these estates give not only a limited census of the population by way of rent rolls and rent ledgers but more important, agents' correspondence and accounts are source material for the agricultural and economic history of large areas. Three outstanding archives have been deposited by the Marquis of Downshire, the late Dowager Marchioness of Londonderry and the Shaftesbury Estates Company. These are all good examples of estate archives and together cover a great deal of the city of Belfast and almost the whole of mid and north Co. Down. The Londonderry papers in particular show how, as a result of family interests and ramifications an estate office can contain early eighteenth century material relating to the East India Company and to Belfast's trade with the Baltic. They are a good example of how an apparently local archive can contain material which has international significance. Two further estate archives are those deposited by Major-General Sir Allan Adair and the Marquis of Anglesey. They deserve special mention, not only for their quality but because they are examples of records which have been returned to Ireland from Great Britain. The Adair papers were formerly in the estate office at Ballymena, Co. Antrim, and were taken to East Anglia for safety during the 'Irish Troubles'. They were discovered among a collection of papers deposited by General Adair in the East Suffolk and Ipswich Record Office, whose archivist, Mr. Charman, with the agreement of the owner, transferred the Irish section of the archive to Belfast. The Anglesey estate papers are part of a large archive which the Marquis of Anglesey deposited from the muniment room at Plas Newydd, North Wales. Estate archives such as the Downshire, Londonderry, Brookeborough and Manchester papers (the last named deposited by Mr. T. G. F. Paterson) add substantially to the holding of eighteenth century estate maps in the Office. These maps and surveys which often form a part of estate archives are invaluable to historical geographers and economic historians and it is hoped to publish a catalogue of such maps.

- 6. The papers of Primate Beresford, deposited in the Office by Mr. A. Pack-Beresford, are important for the light they throw on the family's political patronage in the nineteenth century and for the Primate's ecclesiastical administration. Many years ago other Beresford papers were unfortunately distributed among various Church of Ireland sees and are now not easily available. This is to be regretted because so many papers relating to diocesan administration were destroyed in Dublin in 1922. It is therefore pleasing to note the deposit in the Office of a late nineteenth century group of Clogher diocesan records.
- 7. An exceptionally important family archive was deposited by the Marchioness of Dufferin and Ava. This includes all the papers of the first Marquis of Dufferin and Ava who was an outstanding figure in nineteenth century political and public life. From 1860 to 1896 he held a series of important diplomatic appointments and was also Governor-General of Canada from 1872 to 1879 and Viceroy of India from 1884 to 1888. He was however not the only remarkable member of the family and there survive papers relating to Richard Brinsley Sheridan, Helen, Lady Dufferin and Caroline Norton. The collection also includes papers of the family's estate in Co. Down.

- 8. An important find in a Belfast solicitors' office, Messrs. Crawford & Lockhart, was the papers of William Sharman-Crawford, M.P., the great champion of 'Tenan-Right'; and there have also been deposits of more modern political papers relating to such late nineteenth century M.P.s as John Pinkerton, William Johnston and J. N. Richardson. Other political papers received were those of Colonel Fred Crawford, the Irish Unionist Alliance and the Ulster Unionist Council, as well as the papers of Sir Ernest Clark and Sir Wilfrid Spender, the first two heads of the Northern Ireland Civil Service. Such papers will be of interest for any study of the emergence of Northern Ireland as a separate state. Some of the more modern papers mentioned are at present subject to certain restrictions on access. Private donors are of course at liberty to impose such restrictions on access as they wish but in general the policy of the Office is to encourage access to be given 50 years after the date of creation of any papers, This is in line with policy in the rest of the United Kingdom.
- 9. Several hundred letters written by emigrants from Ulster have been deposited as a result of special appeals in the press and on the radio. Most of them relate to North America and Australasia. Such letters are of special value. They not only describe conditions in the new homeland but by implication comment on those in the old; they are written by people to whom letter writing is something novel and are often therefore sharply self-revealing, and they are, most important, written by very ordinary people who frequently leave no other personal record of their actions, intentions and fears. Official records for the causes; process and results of emigration are rare and therefore it is especially important that letters from emigrants be carefully preserved.
- 10. A survey of business archives described in paragraph 16 resulted in the deposit of documents ranging from saw mill accounts to chemists' prescription books. Linen manufacture and trade predominate and reference to the sale books of the Broadway Damask Company illustrates the world wide significance of this local industry at the end of the nineteenth century. Light is thrown on the activities of linen manufacturers and merchants in the eighteenth century by two exceptionally good collections of correspondence, the Faulkner and Greer papers. There have also been deposits of papers of the Black family who were concerned with the Irish wine trade of Cadiz and Bordeaux in the eighteenth century and of the Cunningham family as general merchants in the West Indies later in the same century.
- 11. A certain amount of material for the study of military history was deposited; such as a diary of the Canadian campaign during the Seven Years' War and the papers of an officer serving in the campaign against Tippoo Sahib. More recent military history is illustrated by letters in both the Perceval and Savage-Armstrong papers written by those taking part in the Boer War. So few war letters survive that it would appear that they are being destroyed on a large scale. Hundreds must have been written to Ulster from South Africa in 1899–1901 and from Flanders in 1914–18; they should be preserved.
- 12. The photocopying of material relating to Ulster in other record offices has been considerably accelerated by the extensive use of microfilming. This has made available in Belfast: Co. Londonderry estate archives of the Irish Society and of several London companies; early surviving census returns from the Public Record Office, Dublin; indexes to the Registry of Deeds, Dublin;

13. Among documents deposited by Government departments are two collections of particular historical value. These are the canal records received from the Ministry of Commerce and the Poor Law Guardians' records from the then Ministry of Health and Local Government. The latter accession covers the twenty-seven Unions of Northern Ireland and forms a remarkably intact and comprehensive archive. These Guardians' records however presented a very considerable storage problem and as a result their accession to the Office was delayed for ten years, being deposited finally in 1958.

14. As noted briefly in the 1951-53 report a pilot survey of archives in the Coleraine area of Co. Londonderry was started in November 1953 and continued into 1954. This area was chosen as being sufficiently far from Belfast to have retained its own identity and as having at its centre a flourishing and long established town. After consultation with representative local people, 183 questionnaires were dispatched to clergy, schools, solicitors, political parties, sports clubs, business firms, local gentry and social clubs. 56% of those approached replied, 39% reported archives of some sort, 17% had nothing to report. Great interest was aroused locally in the scheme but it was only achieved by establishing personal contact through talks to school children and to Rotary, farmers' and women's clubs and by publicity through exhibitions of documents. An obstacle to its success however was a widely held belief that to be of interest documents must be 'museum pieces'. Letters of well known people were universally recognised to be of interest but the value of a large run of letters by quite ordinary people was not appreciated. The survey was successful in that seventy-five collections of papers were listed, many of which have since been deposited in the Office. Among items noted in the survey were: Famine Relief Society accounts, 1847; emigrant letters from the U.S.A., 1806; Savings Bank records from 1835; hand loom weaving accounts and ledgers from 1852; family papers from 1624.

15. After 1956 the improved staffing of the Office enabled an archivist to devote all his time to such field work. This took the form of locating and listing papers surviving in private ownership. This procedure is similar to that adopted by the National Register of Archives in Great Britain and lists of such collections are available to students in the Public Search Room. In many instances owners have agreed to deposit records so listed in the Office. In 1958 Co. Down was surveyed, particular attention being paid to those areas furthest from Belfast. Associated exhibitions were held in Downpatrick, Newcastle, Kilkeel, Newry, Rathfryland, Banbridge, Ballynahinch, Newtownards and Lisburn. The experience gained in Co. Down suggested that canvassing specific groups over a wider area might give better results than a detailed survey in a limited area. In 1959 therefore old-established firms of solicitors and auctioneers in Cos. Londonderry, Tyrone and Fermanagh were visited whilst at the same time Co. Tyrone was surveyed in depth. Exhibitions in support of this work were held at Strabane, Omagh, Clogher, Dungannon, Co. Tyrone, and at Enniskillen, Co. Fermanagh.

16. In addition to this general field work a survey of business records was carried out in 1956 and 1957. Professor Carter and Dr. Connell of the Economics Department of Queen's University, Belfast! were concerned at the difficulties confronting students who wished to use business archives in the Province, and the Office was approached to co-operate in a joint scheme. Mrs. C. Espie, M.A., was appointed as a research assistant to carry out the survey. A list was compiled of 877 old-established firms in the Province and in 1956 those Belfast firms which appeared to be the most promising were visited. It was felt that as businessmen were suspicious of approaches about their records, only a personal visit was likely to produce results. Progress was therefore slow but firm in the first year. Reluctantly, circular letters were used in the second year to accelerate the survey and they were accompanied by explanatory publicity in local newspapers. In addition a travelling exhibition of business archives toured the Province in 1956, visiting Ballymena and Ballymoney in Co. Antrim, Coleraine, Portstewart and Londonderry in Co. Londonderry, Omagh, Co. Tyrone, Enniskillen, Co. Fermanagh, Portadown, Co. Armagh, and Newtownards, Co. Down. As a result of the survey the Office now possesses a register of the archives of almost 1,000 firms located all over the Province. Since the survey many firms have deposited their records in the Office which has in consequence a considerable collection of business records.

### ACCOMMODATION

The postponement of transfers during the Second World War provided a temporary solution. By 1954 however, urgent action was necessary if the Office was to fulfil its statutory functions. In 1955 an ex-Ministry of Food strong room in a government building in Belfast was equipped with movable racking giving 2,600 feet of shelving on a floor area of only 450 square feet. This store was immediately filled with records from the Clerks of the Crown and Peace. The old kitchen of the Co. Antrim Grand Jury and adjoining rooms were converted for the storage of Supreme Court records and an existing strong room was taken over from the Clerk of the Crown and Peace for Belfast and Co. In many instances owners have agreed to deposit records so listed in the Office, In 1958 Co. Down was surveyed, particular attention being paid to those areas furthest from Belfast. Associated exhibitions were held in Downpatrick, Newcastle, Kilkeel, Newry, Rathfryland, Banbridge, Ballynahinch, Newtownards and Lisburn. The experience gained in Co. Down suggested that canvassing specific groups over a wider area might give better results than a detailed survey in a limited area. In 1959 therefore old-established firms of solicitors and auctioneers in Cos. Londonderry, Tyrone and Fermanagh were visited whilst at the same time Go. Tyrone was surveyed in depth. Exhibitions in support of this work were held at Strabane, Omagh, Clogher, Dungannon, Co. Tyrone, and at Enniskilleh, Co. Fermanagh.

16. In addition to this general field work a survey of business records was carried out in 1956 and 1957. Professor Carter and Dr. Connell of the Economics Department of Queen's University, Belfast, were concerned at the difficulties confronting students who wished to use business archives in the Province, and the Office was approached to co-operate in a joint scheme. Mrs. C. Espie, M.A., was appointed as a research assistant to carry out the survey. A list was compiled of 877 old-established firms in the Province and in 1956 those Belfast firms which appeared to be the most promising were visited. It was felt that as businessmen were suspicious of approaches about their records, only a personal visit was likely to produce results. Progress was therefore slow but firm in the first year. Reluctantly, circular letters were used in the second year to accelerate the survey and they were accompanied by explanatory publicity in local newspapers. Inaddition a travelling exhibition of business archives toured the Province in 1956, visiting Ballymena and Ballymoney in Co. Antrim, Coleraine, Portstewart and Londonderry in Co. Londonderry, Omagh, Co. Tyrone, Enniskillen, Co. Fermanagh, Portadown, Co. Armagh, and Newtownards, Co. Down. As a result of the survey the Office now possesses a register of the archives of almost 1,000 firms located all over the Province. Since the survey many firms have deposited their records in the Office which has in consequence a considerable collection of business records.

### ACCOMMODATION

17. Lack of storage space has been referred to in previous reports. Had all outstanding accessions of departmental records been transferred by 1939 the storage accommodation of the Office would have been filled. The postponement of transfers during the Second World War provided a temporary solution. By 1954 however, urgent action was necessary if the Office was to fulfil its statutory functions. In 1955 an ex-Ministry of Food strong room in a government building in Belfast was equipped with movable racking giving 2,600 feet of shelving on a floor area of only 450 square feet. This store was immediately filled with records from the Clerks of the Crown and Peace. In 1957 therefore I asked that the Organisation and Methods Branch of the Ministry of Finance should survey the Office and provide an expert report on its functions and working which would provide a starting point for discussions on the future aceds of the Office particularly as they affected accommodation.

18. In 1958 as a result of this report a considerable amount of extra storage space in four government buildings was made available to the Office. 1,500 square feet of the basement of the County Court House in Belfast were converted to a record store and a new repair department. Previously repairs had been carried out in a section of the storage from in the Law Courts Building. Although the transfer to the County Court House meant that the repair department was two miles away from the main office, the improvement in facilities justified the inconvenience of separation. The old kitchen of the Co. Antrim Grand Jury and adjoining rooms were converted for the storage of Supreme Court records and an existing strong room was taken over from the Clerk of the Crown and Peace for Belfast and Co. Antrim. There is a danger of atmospheric pollution in these stores and air filters and fans have been fitted to windows in an attempt to cope with this problem. A further 1,500 square feet were obtained in an air-raid shelter,

after being fitted with electric heating, provided adequate storage for modern departmental records but the latter store provided only poor record storage.

19. Of major significance was the acquisition in 1958 of Gosford Castle, Co. Armagh, the property of the Ministry of Agriculture. This enabled the Office to make progress in its work which would otherwise have been impossible. It made possible the reception of all the records of the twenty-seven Poor Leven unions of Northern Ireland; records dating back to 1838 which had been waiting to be received into the Office for ten years. It also made possible the reception of very large collections of business archives which would otherwise have been refused for lack of space. The Office is indebted to the Forestry Division of the Ministry of Agriculture for assistance in numerous matters arising from the occupation of Gosford Castle. Although all these extra stores have been useful it is difficult to see how the long term problems of the Office can be solved otherwise than by providing a new Record Office building.

### PUBLIC SEARCH ROOM

- 20. Use of the Public Search Room increased steeply during the period of this report reaching just over 1,500 attendances in 1959. This figure excludes those members of the public coming to the Office merely to order copies of documents. The number of records produced from stores doubled in six years from 5,000 to over 10,000 per annum. This increasing use of the Search Room by the public reflects a growing appreciation of the function and content of the Office. Gratifying though this is it has created serious accommodation difficulties which have not been solved. The congestion in the Search Room is not merely inconvenient for the public but it is a very positive cause of damage to records. These cannot be handled and used safely when there is not adequate space in gangways and on tables to manoeuvre the large volumes and unwieldy documents which make up archives. Minor structural alterations in the Search Room in 1956 increased the number of places, but by 1959 conditions had become intolerable for the public using the Office. Since there was no prospect of a drastic improvement in Record Office accommodation as a whole the wall between the Deputy Keeper's Room and the Public Search Room was removed and accommodation provided for a total of twelve searchers, one microfilm reader and two members of staff. This improvement does not provide the standard of accommodation which the public has a right to expect and which obtains elsewhere in comparable offices and libraries.
- 21. The annual number of legal searches and orders for copies of records increased by almost a third (1954–768, 1959–990) and annual receipts more than doubled (1954–£126, 1959–£327). The increase in receipts is largely accounted for by the increased charges for copies authorised in 1958. (S.R. & O. No. 82 of 1958). 1954 was the first full year in which all copies were issued by photographic means and this has led to a significant alteration in the relative numbers of certified and uncertified copies ordered. In 1954 the number of orders for each type was equal but in 1959 certified copies formed only a third of the total orders. This was due to the growing awareness by the public that an uncertified photographic copy is as useful as a certified copy for most day to day business and that certified copies are normally only required when needed for production in Courts of Law. The hours of opening of the Office were altered as from 23rd December 1957 to bring the Office into line with other

government offices in the matter of Saturday closing. The Public Search Room is now open daily Monday to Friday from 9.30 a.m. to 5.00 p.m. (S.R. & O. No. 249 of 1957).

- 22. On average a little over half (55%) of the readers using the Public Search Room in the period of this report were engaged on genealogical research. Many of these were visitors from abroad, especially from the United States of America and a number of them included Northern Ireland in their holiday schedules solely to search for ancestral links. Almost half (45%) of the readers were engaged on academic research. Of these academic searchers two thirds were working on local studies with either an historical or geographical bias and one third on postgraduate research. The post-graduate workers came from a remarkably wide range of universities not only in the British Isles but from the United States of America. Many of these visits involved a sustained examination of records over a period of weeks.
- 23. Significant developments were studies of historical geography, estate administration and industrial archaeology. The archives of the large landed estates provide obvious quarries for the historical geographer who, with his attention focused on the economic history of a limited area is able to use estate correspondence, maps, rent rolls, ledgers and leases. Post-graduate work of this type has included the historical geography of : Belfast; Barony of Lecale, Co. Down; Barony of Glenarm, Co. Antrim; County Donegal in the nineteenth century; Cusher Valley, Co. Armagh; County Londonderry. The study of estate administration per se has attracted attention and work has been done on the estates of the London Companies in Co. Londonderry and the Downshire Estate in Co. Down in the eighteenth century. Nevertheless Irish estate management has not yet attracted the volume of research one would have expected in view of the importance of land in Irish history. The study of industrial archaeology has involved the singular use of early nineteenth century valuation records, which give the detailed specifications of early mill buildings and machinery.
- 24. The subjects and material worked on by both economic and political historians is infinitely varied with no easily discernable trends. Biography, while not widespread, was represented: Sharman-Crawford M.P.; Mary Anne McCracken; R. B. Sheridan; Joseph Devlin M.P.; Thomas Russell; William Johnston M.P.; Thomas Allen; Arthur Dobbs; 1st Marquis of Anglesey. The history of education in Ireland particularly in the nineteenth century attracted much attention. Political studies included: the United Irishmen; the Irish Whigs in Grattan's Parliament, 1782-1800; the Act of Union, 1800; Huskisson and Wellington correspondence with Foster, early 19th century; parliamentary elections, 1832-1841; Irish parliamentary history in the 18th century; decline of Radicalism in Ulster, 1790-1830. Future trends were indicated by political studies of: Liberals in Ulster, 1900-1916; 19th Century Economic Thought and the Irish Question; history of the Unionist party, 1885-1914. The history of religion attracted serious academie research: Church and State in the early 17th century; Methodism in Ireland in the 18th century; Congregationalism in Ireland in the 19th century; Irish Catholics, 1767-1795. Commerce, trade and social history occupied a number of researchers who dealt with such topics as: Poor Law; emigration; banking; the use of water power in industrial processes. Other

studies ranged from Edmund Burke and Montesquieu to Peader O'Durnain, the Gaelic poet.

25. As many as a third of the public using the Search Room were engaged on local historical or environmental studies too numerous to detail. In addition to local clergy and other mature local historians many were under-graduates and training college students working on dissertations related to their degree and college courses. The number of postal enquiries from research students remained steady throughout the period of the report, averaging 276 per annum. These letters, many of which are from overseas, frequently demand two to three hours of a graduate archivist's time in research if an adequate reply is to be given to serious academic enquiries. Since the foundation of the Ulster-Scot Historical Society in 1956 the work of the clerical staff in the Search Room in dealing with purely genealogical enquiries has decreased.

### ULSTER-SCOT HISTORICAL SOCIETY

26. The foundation of the Ulster-Scot Historical Society closely affected the work of the Office. In recent years there had been a mounting number of genealogical enquiries from the descendants of Ulster emigrants to North America and the Public Record Office became the clearing house for this type of information. In 1956, the then Prime Minister of Northern Ireland, Viscount Brookeborough, visited the United States of America and was impressed by the number of people interested in their Ulster ancestry. As a result he encouraged the formation of the Society which has as its primary object genealogical searching on a non-profit making basis. The Society is housed in the Law Courts Building and is registered as a Friendly Society. I was asked to act as Honoras Director and Miss I. Embleton, formerly a member of the Record Office staff was appointed Secretary: She supervises paid part-time searchers who make extensive use of the genealogical records in the Office and contribute to the increased use of the Public Search Room. The Society deals with some 1,500 letters per year, many of which would formerly have been the responsibility of the Office.

### EXHIBITIONS

27. Twenty-three different exhibitions were held in fifty-seven places in Ulster and Great Britain. Travelling exhibitions which were specifically designed to publicise the field work of the Office have already been mentioned in paragraphs 15 and 16. Annual exhibitions were mounted at the Royal Ulster Agricultural Show, which although held in Belfast, attracts people from all over the Province. For three successive years, 1954–56, this exhibition also travelled to local agricultural shows at Ballymena, Co. Antrim, Newry, Co. Down, Omagh, Co. Tyrone and Enniskillen, Co. Fermanagh. The Office is indebted to Messrs. E. T. Green Ltd., Millers, for the facilities provided for these displays through which it was enabled to attract the attention of an entirely new public. The display themes at these agricultural shows included Ulster crafts, commerce and architecture and Ulstermen overseas.

28. Several exhibitions were held on the premises of the Royal Courts of Justice (Ulster) by kind permission of the Lord Chief Justice. Some of these were occasioned by anniversaries such as that in 1954 commemorating the centenary of Lord Carson's birth. Others were purely expositions of local

history, for example in 1954, 'The Plantation of Ulster'. Others were associated with conferences. In 1954 there was a display of historical records from solicitors' offices for the annual conference of the Incorporated Law Society of Northern Ireland. A display in 1956 of the different classes of records in the Office for the annual conference of the Research Section of the Library Association, was repeated in 1957 for the Conference of Irish Historians. A major exhibition 'Two Thousand Years of Handwriting' was arranged for the Standing Conference of National and University Libraries in April 1956. It was on display at Parliament Buildings, Stormont, when the then Minister of Finance, the Rt. Hon. W. B. Maginess, Q.C., M.P., entertained the delegates to lunch; it was later open to the public at the Royal Courts of Justice and Queen's University, Belfast.

29. In 1956 the Office made a considerable contribution to the 'Ulster and Scotland' exhibition in the Royal Scottish Museum in Edinburgh; the documents contributed related to prominent Ulster Plantation families of Scottish stock. Two displays were mounted in the Ulster Office in London. One of these, in 1955, was in conjunction with the annual conference of the British Records Association at which I, as Vice-President representing Northern Ireland, had the honour of being presented to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother. The other in 1959 dealt with genealogical research in Ulster and was aimed at overseas visitors to London. Special displays were mounted in cooperation with the Ulster Museum, Stranmillis Training College, various schools and other organisations. In 1958 there was a comprehensive exhibition of documents and museum objects relating to Elizabethan Ulster. It was held in the Ulster Museum and opened by Captain the Rt. Hon. Terence M. O'Neill, M.P., the then Minister of Finance. In the same year the Office assisted in organising an exhibition commemorating the foundation of Bangor Abbey, Co. Down, in 558.

## LECTURES AND PUBLICATIONS

30. In addition to those lectures given as introductions to exhibitions, numerous talks have been given to various organisations such as Women's Institutes, Young Farmers' Clubs, Rotary Clubs and History Societies, etc., in all parts of the Province. A collection of slides of documents has been made to illustrate such lectures. Talks have also been given on radio and television. In 1958 I took part, with Professor Beckett of Queen's University and Mr. David Kennedy of St. Malachy's College, in a lengthy broadcast discussion on the problem of writing history from documentary sources. Occasional lectures have been contributed to local history courses organised by the Workers' Educational Association and in 1959 the Office was invited by the Extra-Mural Department of Queen's University to give a session of ten lectures on local history at Limayady. Co. Londonderry. The aim of the series was original in that it sought to present the documentary sources for the study of local history to a local audience. One result of this was the formation of the Limavady Local History Society. The Society now meets regularly to discuss papers read by members on aspects of local history and it is hoped to publish these papers as part of a volume of select documents illustrating the history of Limavady being prepared by the Office. The scope of the lectures indicates how other local histories might be compiled by similar groups. The most important themes dealt with were: local government administration from the seventeenth century; the work of the Poor Law Guardians; Irish parliamentary representation, 1613–1809; population changes and emigration; the role of the landed estate, together with a general survey of documentary sources available from 1600.

31. The Office contributes details of recent accessions to the Ulster Year Book (H.M.S.O.) and the List of Accessions of the National Register of Archives (H.M.S.O.). A catalogue 'Two Thousand Years of Handwriting' (H.M.S.O.), was prepared jointly by Dr. C. M. T. Crowder, Lecturer in Paleography at Queen's University, Belfast, and myself, to accompany the 1956 Exhibition. In 1957 I contributed an article to Ulster Folk Life, (Vol. 3 Part 1), 'Sources for Townland History', in which I showed what material was available for the history of a unit as small as the Irish townland. I took the townland of Glovet, Co. Down, as an example.

### STAFF

- 32. In June 1955 Mr. Edward Heatly, B.A., LL.B., the Deputy Keeper, retired after 48 years in the Civil Service. He entered the Public Record Office of Ireland in Dublin in 1907 and worked for some time as the clerk in charge of the Public Search Room. In 1922 he transferred to the Ministry of Finance in Belfast where he was employed on departmental duties for two years until this Office was established in 1924. He then became senior assistant to the then Deputy Keeper, Dr. Chart. From 1941 until his retirement in 1948 Dr. Chart was compiling material for the official war history of Ulster and therefore during this period Mr. Heatly was in charge of the Record Office functions proper. In 1948 Mr. Heatly was appointed Deputy Keeper and until 1950 he combined this post with that of officer in charge of the Ancient Monuments Branch of the Ministry of Finance. In 1955 I was appointed to succeed Mr. Heatly as Deputy Keeper.
- 33. In 1954 when Mr. P. J. Anderson Hughes retired, a graduate archivist post was created to which Miss M. L. Johnston, M.A., was appointed. In August 1956 two further graduate archivist posts were created and filled by Mr. J. B. Morgan, B.A., archivist to Southampton Corporation and Mr. B. I. Trainor, B.A., a lecturer in the Department of History at Queen's University, Belfast. These new appointments enabled the work of the Office to be reorganised. Three functional branches were created to deal with the public use of the Office, storage and repair of records and the field work involved in collecting records, each branch being controlled by an archivist. This improvement in professional staffing was essential for the development of the Office in line with comparable institutions in the rest of the United Kingdom. Miss I. Embleton who had been in the Office since 1940, transferred in 1955 to the Valuation Department of the Ministry of Finance and was promoted. In 1957 her close association with the Office was revived when she was appointed to be the Secretary of the newly formed Ulster-Scot Historical Society.
- 34. The growing volume of accessions made it necessary to create a proper cataloguing section and consequently the number of clerical staff in the Office was increased from three to six. Progressive changes in the staffing of the storage and repair section were also made. In 1956 Mr. Irvine, Repairer and Head Messenger, retired from the Service and was awarded the Imperial Service

Medal. He was the first trained document repairer employed in the Office and had created standards in very difficult conditions; for he combined the work of document repairing and production of records aided by only one messenger. He was succeeded by Mr. Carlisle who for two years worked on the same unsatisfactory basis, assisted by Mr. King. In 1958, however, when new storage accommodation was acquired at the County Court House, Belfast, it was possible to divorce repair work from record production. Mr. King became responsible solely for stores and the production of records, assisted by Mr. Lewis. Mr. Carlisle became a full-time document repairer and from 1959 was assisted Mr. Bailie. The Public Record Office, London, has assisted generously in training our repair staff and thus helped us to create an effective repair section.

# DESTRUCTION SCHEDULES

35. Departmental papers and files which are not considered worthy of permanent preservation in this Office are selected for destruction in co-operation with government departments. No destruction of files and papers may take place until schedules of such records have been laid before Parliament. The following destruction schedules have been laid in the period of this report: Ministry of Finance, Establishment Division, 1957, Ulster Savings Branch, 1958; Ministry of Agriculture, Forestry Division, 1957; Ministry of Labour and National Insurance, Pensions Branch, 1955, Family Allowances, 1955, Safeguarding of Employment Act, 1956; Ministry of Health and Local Government, 1958; All Ministries, payable orders, etc., 1955. A list of records for destruction was agreed with the Northern Ireland General Health Services Board.

## PARISH REGISTERS

36. The customary annual reports were received from all the incumbents of the Church of Ireland having custody of parish registers under Retention Orders. The copying of such registers was accelerated by the use of microfilming and almost all are now copied.

### LIBRARY

37. The Office Library, housed in the Public Search Room, is designed basically for reference by staff and public using records. It also contains typescript lists of the archives in the Office. It makes no attempt to provide services which are the responsibility of University and Public Libraries and it does not lend books. The Library tries to cover every aspect of Ulster history in particular and Irish history in general at both a national and local level. New books are purchased where they are themselves record texts or source material, where they are based extensively on documentary sources or where they contribute to the interpretation of archives in the Office. A wide range of the publications of record offices, libraries and local history societies throughout the British Isles are received and the library specialises in the publications of Commonwealth, American and European archives in addition to the literature of Archive Administration. Those sections of the library containing nineteenth century Parliamentary Papers and books on Estate Management, Land Law, Genealogy and Home Rule have been very much strengthened. Nearly a thousand volumes were acquired by gift or purchase during the period. Presentations of books and pamphlets were made by the following: J. W. Beck, Essex; Major J. Boland, Newry, Co. Down; H. ### MINISTRY OF COMMERCE

The Lagan Navigation, the Ulster Canal, the Tyrone Navigation or Coalisland Canal and the Upper Bann Navigation were taken over by the Ministry of Commerce in 1954, together with their records, c.200 volumes and c.1,000 documents.

The proximity of Lough Neagh to the river Lagan suggested their junction by means of a canal as early as 1637. The discovery of coal on the Tyrone shore of the Lough led, in 1753. to a petition to Parliament from the Corporations of Belfast and Hillsborough and other interested bodies for permissive legislation, as a result of which there was passed in the same year 'An Act for making the River Lagan navigable and opening a Passage by Water between Lough Neagh and the Town of Belfast'. This placed certain additional duties on beer and spirits in the excise district of Lisburn to finance the project. These duties were continued and extended by Acts of 1763, 1771-2, 1773-4, 1814 and 1820-21. It was intended to make the river Lagan navigable to a point beyond Lisburn and thence to cut a canal to Lough Neagh. Work on the river was completed by 1765, but it became apparent that its use was impracticable. In 1779 there was established the 'Company of Undertakers of the Lagan Navigation', for which the Marquis of Donegall furnished some £62,000. By 1794 this body had completed a canal from Belfast to Lough Neagh. In 1809 the interests of the Marquis of Donegall were bought out by a group of Belfast merchants, who effected considerable improvements in the canal. The 'Lagan Navigation Company' was incorporated in 1843, its life being limited to 31 years. This was extended in 1873 and in 1888 the Company took over, from the Commissioners of Public Works, the Ulster Canal and the Tyrone Navigation. The Company came to an end in 1954 when its assets were taken over by the Ministry of Commerce. No records of the canal before 1777 survive, but from 1800 they are reasonably full. The earliest minute book. 1793-1811, contains, as well as the minutes, copies of some company correspondence and details of spirits and beer produced in the Lagan district. The earliest letter book, 1809-1826, kept by James McCleery as Secretary to the Lagan Navigation, includes his official correspondence in this capacity and also copies of letters that he wrote as Secretary to the Ulster Canal and to the Belfast Charitable Society. There are also memoranda on such unexpected topics as railways, and the Belfast Academical Institution. The letter books of James McCleery continue to 1852 and their contents often refer to matters not affecting the Lagan Navigation, but relating to the life of the province and to Belfast in particular. Included in the general series of letter books is one kept by William McCleery as an estate agent in Belfast, 1847-1852. The accounts consist of incomplete series of ledgers, journals, cash books, toll books, rentals and miscellaneous accounts. Among the rentals are a Pipe Water Applotters' book for Belfast, 1809-1813, and a rental of the manors of Newtown and Comber, Co. Down, 1804-1811. The title deeds are far from complete, but a large number of 19 cent, and early 20 cent, maps have survived

The construction of the Ulster Canal, from Charlemont to Lough Erne, was authorised in 1825. Work began in 1835 and the canal was opened in 1842. In 1865 it was transferred to the Commissioners of Public Works, from whom it was taken over in 1888 by the Lagan Navigation. The extant minutes commence after the amalgamation with the Lagan Navigation in 1888,

but information concerning the early years of the Ulster Canal, however, is to be found in the earlier letter books of the Lagan Navigation. 350 title deeds of the canal survive, together with some mans.

The Tyrone Navigation or Coalisland Canal, from Coalisland to Lough Neagh, was begun in 1732 and was taken over by the Lagan Navigation in 1888. Its records are limited to a few late title deeds and some maps.

### MINISTRY OF HEALTH AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT

The records of the former Boards of Guardíans, consisting of c.7,000 volumes and c.7,000 documents, were deposited in 1938. These bodies were concerned not only with the relief of poverty and the problem of emigration but also with many aspects of local government, particularly in the period between their establishment in 1838 and the transfer of certain of their powers to local authorities at the old of the 19 cent. There were 27 such bodies in Northern Ireland, but the extent to which their early records have survived varies from place to place. Probably the most extensive and well-preserved are those of the Enniskillen Union. But there are complete sets of minute books, 1839–1948, for almost all the Unions, and even those Unions with imperfect sets lack only an occasional volume. Several Unions have admission and discharge registers from 1839; these volumes give details of denomination and occupation, and together with the routine minutes and the minutes of special relief committees, they show the local impact of the Famine and the measures to alleviate distress.

In 1745 he bought the Duddingston estate near Edinburgh where Sir William Chambers in 1763 built a mansion for him. At Paisley he laid out a new town in the 1770's, and he employed John Soane to create at Baronscourt a fine country house and park. Chambers was also employed by him on the family's London house in Grosvenor Square. The 9th Esal created 1st Marquis in 1790, was the first considerable political figure in the family. His grandson, created the 1st Duke in 1868, was Lord Lieutenant of Ireland twice, 1866-68 and 1875-78.

From 1790 the correspondence with the individual agents managing the different estates is filed separately from the political and patronage correspondence with Irish land-owners and neighbours. The correspondents, up to 1820, include Knox, Stewart, Pery, Conynham, Moore, Brownlow, Pomeroy, Crawford, Ross, Auchinleck, Pemberton, Lennox, Rankin, Olphert, Hill, sundry Bishops of the Established Church, etc. There are papers relating to the militia and to various military matters from George Vallancey, Colonel Moore and General Cunningham, 1793-1804. Between 1705 and 1817 there is a fine run of copy outward letters from various Earls of Abercorn. As with the inward letters, pre-1790 letters to the estate agents in Great Britain and Ireland are mixed with letters to political and social acquaintances. From 1790 onwards the letters are largely those of the 1st Marquis of Abercorn. Diary of the British campaign in Canada, during the Seven Years' War, July to September, 1760. The writer of the diary was probably an officer on the staff of Brigadier General Murray, and, as he appears to have had an intimate knowledge of all that occurred, he may have been a secretary. The supposition is strengthened by the presence in the diary of copies of correspondence, July-August 1759, which passed between Generals Wolfe and Murray; these include the copy of Wolfe's order to Generals Murray, Monckton and Townshend, giving alternative plans for the capture of Quebec and asking for their comments, and the minutes of the Council of War between the Generals in compliance with the order. The copies of the correspondence, etc., are in the same hand as the diary and appear to be contemporary. The diary itself deals with the campaign in Canada covering the months leading to the capture of Montreal and the capitulation of the French on 8th September, 1760. Murray's forces were engaged in clearing the country bordering the St. Lawrence between Quebec and Montreal, administering the oath of allegiance to the inhabitants, and receiving their surrendered arms. They were stationed on board ships of the fleet on the river, and in addition to their 'mopping up' operations they were responsible for blocking supplies to the French garrison at Montreal. The British success at Quebec and Montreal had depended largely on their ability to control the St. Lawrence, which the French had regarded as unnavigable for larger warships, and thus cut supplies to the French garrisons by way of the river. This day to day account of the campaign gives a vivid picture of personalities and events in the last two

months of the fighting which resulted in the securing of Canada for Britain, and the permanent expulsion of French influence from that region of North America. Certain pages of this volume have been used for an 18 cent. manuscript history of the Irving family of Dumfriesshire.

### MARQUIS OF DOWNSHIRE, EASTHAMPSTEAD, BERKSHIRE, PER ROBIN HILL

From the early 17 cent, successive members of the Hill (later Downshire) family were in a position to acquire extensive tracts of land from the break-up of the estates of the O'Neille Castlereagh and the Magenises of Kilwarlin, together with an estate at Hilltown and relatively small interests in Carrickfergus and, later, Newry. A fortunate marriage brought, late in the 17 cent., property in Blessington, Co. Wicklow, and a part of what was to become the Banbridge estate, completed by purchase in 1748. A further marriage, late in the 18 cent., brought estates at Dundrum, Co. Down, at Edenderry, King's County, and at Easthampstead, Berkshire. The records of all the Irish estates, managed from Hillsborough, are deposited in the Public Record Office of Northern Ireland; they consist of c.40,000 documents and volumes. The English estate records are in the Berkshire County Record Office.

The Edenderry estate includes the following properties: Edenderry, 1597-1894; Ballynowlan and Kilcumber, 1666-1842; Carbury tithes, 1735-1834. The Hilltown estate includes the following properties: Hilltown, 1622-1846; Clonduff, 1767-1879; Ballynagappoge, 1610-1792. The Kilwarlin estate includes the following properties: Kilwarlin, 1610-1747, with over a hundred 17 cent. deeds; Ballyhomra and Magheradartin, 1699-1790; Ravernet, 1692-1875; Backnamullagh, 1664-1745; Cluntagh and Tullynore, 1683-1786; Listullycurran, 1681-1824; Magherahinch, 1666-1839; Hillsborough town, 1701-1953. The Newry estate includes various properties, early 17 cent.-1856. There are also a large quantity of family settlements, testamentary papers, etc., with some title deeds to properties in Co. Kilkenny, 1703-1872, in Clonderalaw, Co. Clare, 1720-late 19 cent., and in Carlow town, c.1763-1833.

c.5,000 leases, early 18 cent.—mid 19 cent. These exist for all the estates, although the bulk are post-1750, and there are relatively few, c.700, for the early 18 cent.

c.700 maps, early 18 cent. -early 20 cent. The collection of maps is dominated by two surveys of the then estates, both providing detailed townland maps, by Brownrigg & Coy, in 1803 and by Robert Manning in 1856-7. The Banbridge estate maps begin in 1720 with surveys of what was then the White of Loughbrickland property. The Castlereagh estate maps include as many as 12 maps of a single townland, Bresagh, surveyed within a relatively short period, 1723-1834; included also is a map of the proposed Carnamuck to Braniel road in 1804. The Edenderry estate maps contain a group showing the line of the Grand Canal relative to the Bog of Allen, 1788-1795. Maps of roads or proposed roads are frequent among the Hilltown estate maps, and include details of roads into Rosstrevor in 1767 and 1785, the Hilltown to Newry road in 1790, Hillsborough to Bryansford in 1804, and Newry to Castlewellan in 1807. The Kilwarlin estate maps are the largest estate series, but apart from the normal surveys of townlands and individual holdings, they contain a man of the manor of Hillsborough in 1771. together with such road maps as Hillsborough to Lisburn in 1790, Hillsborough to Comber in 1805, and Ballynahinch to Moira in 1806. There is relatively little material for the 2 smaller estates, Carrickfergus and Newry, but worthy of note are a group of early 19 cent. maps of the Straid area near Carrickfergus and 2 maps of the Newry Navigation at Newry by Bernard Scale, 1763. There are also sketches of the British siege operations before Charleston, South Carolina, 1780.

c.100 plans, late 18 cent.—late 19 cent. These consist mainly of plans and elevations of courthouses, markets, inns, private houses, etc., for most of the estates. In particular the include: a series of 19 cent. harbour improvement plans for Dundrum; mark t and session house plans for Edenderry town, 1791—c.1833; plans and elevations of Hilltown Lodge, late

18 cent.; a series of plans and elevations for Hillsborough courthouse, c.1800-1819; plans of a proposed market at Newry, c.1800, and at Banbridge, early 19 cent.; a group of Lagan Navigation plans, 1842; plans and sections for the proposed Downbatrick, Dundrum and Newcastle Railway, 1865-1866, and of the Banbridge Extension Railway, 1872; plans of the Woodburn reservoir, Co. Antrim, 1860's; plans of Hillsborough House, c.1788.

c.1,000 volumes of accounts, etc., 18 cent.—20 cent. These begin with the usual series of ledgers, specie books and cash books, for the Dundrum and Edenderry estates in 1707, as Blundell property, for the Kilwarlin, Newry, Hilltown, and Castlereagh estates in 1726, for the Carrickfergus estate in 1742, and for the Banbridge estate, c.1750. The lease books begin in 1794 but record the state of leases from the early 18 cent, and there are a complete series of rentals for all the estates from c.1800. In 1813 the 3rd Marquis of Downshire emerged from his minority, interested himself in the management of his estates, and created a new set of account books. His book-keeping reforms are explained in the first volume of each class of account; for example, minute books are introduced for each estate which summarise estate management topics and against these summaries the Marquis himself lays down a course of action for his agents. His reforming zeal seems to diminish in the 1820's, but for a period the minute books are an excellent statement of estate management policy. The remaining accounts cover the demesne and household at Hillsborough from the late 18 cent, and cover against, sollcitors, tithes, rent charges, judicial rents, etc., in the 19 cent.

These consist in the main of estate management correspondence passing between the Marquis and his chief agent in Hillsborough, and between the chief agent and the agents of the individual estates. The correspondence is particularly detailed for the period, 1813-1845, during the majority of the 3rd Marquis. Apart from the basic estate management topics, the correspondence reflects the interest and patronage of the Downshire family relative to road, canal and railway developments, to the building of schools, churches and markets, and to the involvement of the 3rd Marquis in agricultural improvements, the linen trade and local politics.

### MARCHIONESS OF DUFFERIN AND AVA, CLANDEBOYE, COUNTY DOWN

c.53,000 documents and 750 volumes. The earliest documents include title deeds, maps and correspondence relating to the management of the estates of the Blackwood (later Dufferin) family at Clandeboye and Killyleagh, Co. Down, from the late 17 cent. In the late 18 cent. and early 19 cent. however the family moved in a wider world and this is reflected in the range of correspondents.

In 1825, Price, Lord Dufferin, married Helen Sheridan, a grand-daughter of the playwright, R. B. Sheridan, who brought to the family a collection of her grandfather's papers. Helen herself wrote both, verse and music. Much of this survives together with her correspondence, which includes letters from Lord Melbourne, J. S. Le Fanu, the Duke of Wellington, Robert Browning, John Delane and Lady Emily Peel, and a great many ribald and entertaining notes from Frederick Pigou. Her sister, Caroline Norton, spent a great deal of her time at Clandeboye and many of her verses and songs survive, together with her letters from E. J. Trelawny, A. Hayward, Benjamin Disraeli, Lady Hermione Graham and Sir Alexander Duff-Gordon.

The majority of the papers, however, were created by Frederick, 1st Marquess of Dufferin and Ava, 1826-1902. His first political task was a mission to Syria in 1860-1861, following the massacre of Christias there. Copies survive of his letters to Lord John Russell from Syria and the original letters that he received there, together with depositions concerning the massacres, notes on the subsequent trials and petitions from various communities in the Lebanon. Lord Dufferin collected also many statistical and historical notes concerning the country. For some years afterwards he corresponded with friends in Syria and advised the British Government on Syrian affairs.

During the next decade Lord Dufferin was interested primarily in Irish affairs, although this topic occupied his attention throughout his life, and it is proposed to deal separately with the records on this subject that he produced. In this period, too, he was appointed Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster and had his first experience of Indian affairs as Under Secretary of State for India.

The next period in his life to be reflected in the records is his appointment as Governor-General of Canada, a post that he held from 1872 until 1879. There survives his extensive correspondence, original letters received from England and from Canada and copies of his replies. Correspondence with Lord Carnarvon, Lord Kimberley and Mr. McKenzie is bound in a separate series. There are also numerous papers concerning the British Columbia question and the Pacific Railway scandal.

On his return from Canada Lord Dufferin was appointed Ambassador to St. Petersburg, and in 1881 to Constantinople. Papers relating to his residence in Russia concern in the main his social life there. Those accumulated in Turkey, however, are more extensive. They concern, among other things, his Egyptian mission in 1883 and the Soudan Railway. They include copies of Lord Dufferin's despatches to the Foreign Office, and letters from Lord Salisbury and Lord Granville.

In 1884 Lord Dufferin was appointed Viceroy of India and the bulk of his official records relate to the four years he spent there. They include comprehensive series of letters and telegrams to and from the Secretary of State and the Afghan Boundary Commission, and multifarious reports on Burma, Nepal, North-West Frontier and Siam Other matters touched on are police recruitment in Burma and representative councils in India. There are series of news letters' from Herat, Kandahar and Meshed, of reports on Indian newspapers for the provinces of Bombay, Madras and Bengal, and abstracts of intelligence from the Special Branch of the Thuggee and Dacoity Department. There are also reports of a conference between the Viceroy and the Amir of Afghanistan in 1885.

In December 1888 Lord Dufferin left India to take up the post of Ambassador at Rome. For this appointment and for his period as Ambassador to Paris, 1892-1896, there are few records among the Clandeboye collection.

Throughout his life Lord Dufferin took an interest in Irish affairs in general and the collection abounds in pamphlets concerning the political and economic life of the country. Correspondence and draft memoranda concern education, land tenure, the Established Church in Ireland and the Maynooth grant. In addition there are many papers concerning affairs in Co. Down and Belfast in which Lord Dufferin took an unofficial interest, and correspondence concerning the Down militia. D.1071.

The records which remain in the London home of the Marchioness consist of bound volumes of correspondence of the 1st Marquess relating mainly to his administration in India. 78 volumes have been copied on 53 reels of microfilm under a joint scheme between the Public Record Office of Northern Ireland and the India Office Library, each of which holds a copy of the microfilm. ### THE MARCHIONESS DOWAGER OF LONDONDERRY, NEWTOWNARDS, COUNTY DOWN

c.12,000 documents, 17 cent.—20 cent. These records represent the contents of the London-derry estate office, Newtownards, Co. Down.

The Stewart family settled in Co. Donegal in the early 17 cent, and Letters Patent of denisation were granted to John Stewart in 1629, together with a proportion of Ballyveagh which was created for him into the manor of Stewart's Court. The history of the family for the remainder of the century is obscure, but they do not appear to have obtained any additional lands outside Donegal.

Their fortunes were improved by a well-chosen marriage. Alexander Stewart who wasborn in 1699, appears to have inherited the Donegal estate from his brother Thomas abou1730. In 1737 he married his cousin, Mary Cowan, daughter of Alderman Cowan of Londonderry, and heiress to her brother, Sir Robert Cowan, Governor of Bombay. Sir Robert entered
the service of the East India Company before 1720. He retired in 1735 and died shortly afterwards. There was a protracted law suit concerning his will, which ended favourably in 1743.

In the following year Alexander Stewart employed a portion of his legacy to purchase the
manors of Newtown and Comber in Co.Down from Robert Colville. On the death of Alderman
Cowan he inherited also a small estate in Co. Londonderry and some property in Londonderry
City. Apart from his good sense in choosing a wife, Alexander Stewart appears to have had
some business ability. Before his marriage he was a partner in a Belfast commercial concern
trading in flax with the Baltic and with Russia. He appears to have maintained his business
contacts for many years after his purchase of Newtown and Comber.

His son, Robert, 1st Marquis et Londonderry, exerted a marked influence on the administration of his estates, By purchasing outlying townlands he rounded off their boundaries and in 1817 he acquired the manor of Florida in Co. Down from John Byrne. He was meticulous in the keeping of accounts, and initiated some of the principal series of records of estate administration, in particular the 'Journals of Accompts' and Ledgers. He has left records, too, of his activities at several Parliamentary elections. Mount Stewart was rebuilt in 1805 on his instructions and he drew up plans for the reconstruction of the centre of Newtownards, of which a portion only was completed. His scheme for the reclamation of much of Strangford Lough is of considerable interest but little of it was effected. His successors left no particular mark on estate administration nor do their personal papers survive in the present collection.

For the period from 1750 to 1795 there are c.600 leases for the Newtown estate, c.200 for the Comber estate and c.60 for the Florida estate. For the period from 1800 to 1830 there are c.800 leases for the Newtown estate, c.500 for the Comber estate and c.200 for the Florida estate. For the post–1850 period there are only c.70 leases and there are for the Newtown estate. Throughout there are only a handful of leases for the Co. Londonderry and Co. Donegal estates.

c.800 maps, 1721-mid 19 cent. These includes urveys of the manors of Newtown and Comber done in the 1720's by John Sloane, but the majority of the maps are surveys of individual towilands on the Newtown, Comber and Florida estates and most of these are done by David Geddes in the late [8 cent. and early 19 cent.; these maps are a vital source for any study of the growth of Newtownards and Comber. In addition there are late 18 cent. plans and elevations for buildings in the Square and elsewhere in Newtownards, late. 8 cent. plans of Mount Stewart demessie, maps of road systems in Ards Lower generally and the Comber-Newtownards area in particular from the mid 18 cent., and a group of early 19 cent. plans showing reclamation schemes in Strangford Lough.

e.5,000 documents, mid 18 cent.-e.1940. Account books, rent ledgers, rentals, vouchers, correspondence, etc., relating chiefly to the management of the estates. Although the main series of rentals begins in the mid 18 cent. there is a single rental of the Comber property in 1684. The accounts include references to the building work at Mount Stewart in 1805, and to reclamation projects in Strangford-Lough in the early 19 cent. A small group of papers relating to mining interests on the Newtown estate, include a journal of the Bangor and Newtown lead mine, 1780–1782, and an account book, with vouchers, of the Craiganu slate quarry, 1807–1818. Among the more miscellaneous items are several inventories of furniture and books at Mount Stewart from c.1800, and a cotton spinner's account book, Newtownards, 1807–1811.

Among the non-estate papers created by the family are a group of commissions of the peace, etc., for Co. Down, 1791–1880, and a remarkable series of returns of live and dead stock for more than 40 maritime parishes in Co. Down; these returns were made in 1803 in anticipation of a French invasion of Ireland and represent a valuable agricultural survey. Included in this section are two important collections of business records relating to the activities of Sir Robe. Cowan and Alexander Stewart. Cowan's papers were probably produced during the protracted law suit that followed his death, and were later preserved with some care. They include a long series of eccounts of his private trade at. Goa and Bombay, a fine run of outward letter books and many bundles of original inward-letters. Together they provide a detailed picture of his commercial activities in the period 1720 to 1735. Cowan also appears to have cleared up the private affairs of his predecessors as Governors of Bombay, Charles Boone and William Phipps, and in addition his papers include those of Arnaldus Paauw of the Dutch East India Company. Alexander Stewart was in partnership in Belfast with Isaac Macartney, James McClure, John Gordon and John Wallace. The firm dealt largely in flax and c.200 letters, 1725–1732, have survived which demonstrate the firm's contact with agents in Narva, St. Petersburg, Stockholm, Hamburg, Rotterdam, La Rochelle and Cadiz. As a member of the powerful Beresford family the Primate was an interested party in the manipulation of several Parliamentary seats controlled by the family, and this control is well illustrated in the Primate's papers, especially with regard to the Derry election in 1830. The Primate's involvement in such questions as Catholic Emancipation, the National Education scheme and the Maynooth grant are documented in detail, and his correspondents include Wellington, Peel and Goulburn.

Dr. Kane Perceval, Dublin, 1743-1768; these letters are corcerned principally with family and financial affairs, but include a contemporary description of Culloden, 1746, and a request for advice about settling in East Florida, with references to the purchase of stock, negroes, implements, etc., 1768.

Correspondence of William Perceval, barrister, Dublin, 1734-1784; these letters are concerned principally with family and financial affairs, but include: a group of letters which report on the activities of Alexander and Joshua Catheart, both serving in Canada, 1759-1760; c.20 letters from his son, Robert Perceval, 1780-1784; in which the young man comments in some detail on his medical studies in Deyden, Paris and Dijon, and gives his impressions of the French peasantry, the Alps, Paris society, geological and mineralogical discoveries, and the work of 'Doctor' Mesmer, etc.

Correspondence, etc., of Dr. Robert Percesal, M.D., 1768-c.1830. Apart from some early school books, the bulk of these papers are concentrated around the period of Robert Perceval's training on the Continent when he was receiving letters from members of the family, and cover also his return to Dublin when he was in correspondence with French, Swiss and Swedish colleagues on matters of medical and scientific research, 1781-1789; the correspondence continues until e.1830, but it is concerned principally with family and financial affairs; there are a few brief glimpses of his concern for the poor and handicapped and some references to the administration of Sir Patrick Dun's Hospital, but little light is thrown on his tenure of the Chair of Chemistry at Trinity College, Dublin or his post as Physician General to H.M. Forces in Ireland.

Correspondence, etc., of Richard Douglas Perceval, c.1885-c.1890; these letters include detailed comment on his work as a civil engineer in Quetta and Multan, etc., and in Kashmir and Baluchistan generally, and in particular he refers to the Sind-Pishin Railway; his skill as a photographer seems to have been of value, and there is a volume of photographs, probably taken by him, c.1890, which includes several of Indian railways and bridges; there is also a volume of engineering and architectural drawings, c.1885, done by him, quite possibly as student exercises.

## J. L. PINKERTON, BALLYMONEY, COUNTY ANTRIM

In 1885 he stood as an Independent candidate for North West Antrim; despite defeat he so impressed the Parmellites that he, a Protestant tenant farmer, was adopted as the party candidate for Galway in 1886. During his career as an M.P. he appears to have been an exceptionally active 'political missionary', and was frequently called upon to speak in favour of Land Reform and Home Rule at Liberal demonstrations throughout Scotland and England.

Included in this collection are 13 letters of John Mitchel, Irish Nationalist. In his first letter, 1834, he writes to his father of his dissatisfaction with his post as a bank clerk in Londonderry. The remaining letters, 1848–1874, are all written to his sister, Matilda Dixon, in Dromore, Co. Down, from Mitchel's exile in Bermuda, Tennessee, Washington D.C. and Paris; the American letters are of particular interest in that they reflect Mitchel's sympathy with the South and with Southern institutions during the pre-Civil War period. c.100 documents. These consist principally of the letters received by Rev. Dr. Thomas Brooke Clarke as absentee rector of Inishmacsaint parish, Co. Fermanagh, 1797-1824; the living was in the gift of the Marquis of Ely and a part of the correspondence is taken up with the process whereby Clarke became rector and with his eventual decision to resign the living; whilst he was rector he received reports on the affairs of the parish, the collecting of tithes and the management of the glebe lands. Clarke's correspondence also includes a letter from Dublin which describes the excitable mood of the people of Dublin, 1798, and a group of letters from Francis Hodgkinson, Senior Fellow of Trinity College, Dublin, in which University affairs are discussed, 1802-1834: D.1108B.

Thorold Rogers, Oxford to [Dublin?] in which he comments on the tactics of the National League, the Coercion Bill and the high rents in Ireland. and praises the stand taken by O'Brien and others who 'are resisting tyranny on behalf of the English as well as the Irish people', c.1887; small group of letters received by A. E. Skeen, London, 1890-1903, which include a number from Lord Selborne, 1890-1893, in which he

gives his reasons for not joining Gladstone over Home Rule, and one from Lord Goschen in 1903 in which he remarks, 'no one can be certain that Home Rule is dead though personally I think the Radicals will reflect many times before they attempt to resuscitate it'. D.1108C.

12 documents. Group of late 16 cent. and 17 cent. printed maps of Ulster, etc. T.1250.

Typescript edition of the diary kept by Anna Walker, 1802-1807, wife of the Colonel Commanding the 50th Regiment of Foot. Although the diary actually opens whilst the writer is still in London and Portsmouth, the scene quickly shifts to Belfast where Colonel Walker was stationed from June 1802 until November 1803; his wife's world is bounded by the social round of theatres and parties and her diary contains, for instance, only a relatively brief reference to the scare occasioned in Belfast by Robert Emmet's insurrection in July 1803. But at its own level the diary is most informative, particularly where Anna comments on visits to the theatre and to houses such as Mount Stewart. A sudden contrast is introduced into her manner of living when the Regiment is marched to Ballyshannon in Co. Donegal in the winter of 1803; en route she visits Coulson's mill at Lisburn, and comments on Moira, Portadown and Armagh, particularly the last where she is impressed by the Primatial Palace. She finds the country beyond Armagh 'very dreary . . . and the Poor Peasantry inhabiting the Most Miserable Cabbins'. 'Miserable' would appear to be her favourite epithet and it is applied to Aughnacloy. Maguire sbridge, Augher and Fivemiletown, and only Clogher is 'tolerably neat'. From Enniskillen the Regiment moves on to Belleek, and so to Ballyshannon, 'the vilest dirtyest Town I think I ever saw'. Nevertheless the social round is resumed after a fashion and she visits Castle Coole and Castle Caldwell, whilst riding and walking in the neighbourhood of Ballyshannon form a basic pursuit. In July the Regiment is posted to Omagh and Mrs. Walker endures the next year there although not particularly impressed by the Omagh 'society'; visits to Lord Mountjoy's 'place' and the Richardsons of Augher are more to her taste. In June 1805 the Regiment moves briefly to Enniskillen and here the surrounding scenery, if not the town itself. delights Mrs. Walker. She has time to report on the court martial of a Captain Stowe and to visit Florencecourt before the Regiment is ordered to Longford and then to Cork. Fleeting impressions are given of Swanlinbar, Killashandra, Granard, Edgeworthstown, Longford, Fermoy, Clonmel, Middleton, Mallow and Cork; even when she is arrived in Cork her mind is preoccupied with the likelihood of the Regiment being sent overseas on active service, and her diary abounds with reports of campaigns rather than social gossip. Colonel and Mrs. Walker return to England in February 1807 for what is virtually embarkation leave, and in the summer of 1807 the Regiment embarks for Copenhagen. T.1565.
