Francis Phesant Juhan was elected clerk of the Superior Court of Gwinnett County in 1856 and served two terms. He was again elected in 1877 and served one term. He was born in South Carolina and died in Gwinnett County March 6, 1879.

Francis Ferdinand Juhan was born in Jones County, Georgia, March 14, 1832 and grew to manhood in Rockbridge district near Centerville and was apprenticed in law at Stone Mountain. He came to Lawrenceville in 1856 when his father became clerk of the Superior Court. He had just begun his career as a lawyer when the Civil War broke out. Like other young men at the time he answered the call for the defense of his native state. He joined Company D, Cobb's legion. Throughout the remainder of his life he loved to recall his thrilling experiences in the historic battle of Gettysburg in Virginia. He was a successful lawyer, served as mayor of Lawrenceville, judge of the City Court of Buford and was one of the most useful and influential citizens of the county.

George Kennerly came from South Carolina and settled in Newton County. His only son, T. E. Kennerly, married Mary Smith and lived near Chestnut Grove Church in this county. Their children were: A. Rom E. Kennerly was a Baptist minister. His father, John E. Kennerly, and his grandfather, T. E. Kennerly, were widely known Baptist preachers.

Dr. T. T. Key

Dr. Thomas Terrell Key graduated from Jefferson Medical College, Philadelphia, in the year 1856. As a young physician he lived for a short time in Gwinnett County near where the town of Suwanee is located. He moved to Plaquemine Parish in the State of Louisiana. There he entered the Confederate army as first lieutenant. He lived in Atlanta after the war, and in 1894 moved from Atlanta to Norcross and became a permanent resident of Gwinnett County.

On a visit to his classmate, Dr. Moses Richardson, in Gwinnett County, he met Rhoda Carroll and married her. Their children were:

King Family

Richard King, son of Drury King, enlisted in 1775 as a substitute for his father as a private in Captain Williams' South Carolina company in the Revolutionary War and served three months. Later he served in Captain Davis' company. He then moved to Wayne County, North Carolina, and served three months in Col. Farmer's North Carolina regiment and was in the battle of Eutaw Springs.

He also was in guard duty at Hillsboro, North Carolina. He moved to Wilkes County, Georgia, before 1790 and lived in Taliaferro County until his death in 1853 at the age of 96 years.

Richard King m Rachel Dearman b 1777 d 1863. Their son, John King, b 1822 d 1896 m Nancy Sanford b 1829 d 1896. She was the great granddaughter of John Chapman, a Revolutionary soldier, and also of Daniel Hart of Orange County, N. C., who served as a captain in the war of the American Revolution.
