Odober 20, 1786.

Ordered, That the Board of Treasury, without delay, devise ways and means for the pay and support of the troops of the United States, upon the present establishment, and report the same to Congress.

On the report of the Board of Treasury, pursuant to the orders of yesterday, to devise ways and means for the pay and support of the troops of the United States on the present establishment.

Refolved unanimously, That the several states in the Consederacy be, and they are hereby required to pay into the Federal Treasury, on or before the first day of June 1787, their respective quotas of the sum of sive hundred and thirty thousand dollars in specie, which quotas are:
