LONG - BURNETT FAMILY RECORDS

JAMES LONG SR., of Ulster co., Ireland, a province of England, came to America with his four sons. Reuben, Andrew, Samuel and James. JAMES LONG SR. is father of Samuel Long. Samuel Long is father of James Long Jr. James Long Jr. was born in Carlisle, Pa., and James Long Jr. is father of Dr. Crawford Williamson Long. Dr. Crawford Williamson Long was the father of Mrs. Eugenia Long Harper, who died July 5, 1940, at age 86.

JAMES LONG JR. (father of Dr. Crawford W. Long) came to Georgia with a colony of Scotch Presbyterians in 1792. Dr. Crawford W. Long's mother was ELIZABETH WARE of Amherst County, Virginia. JAMES LONG JR. and ELIZABETH WARE (parents of Dr. Crawford W. Long) were married Jan. 13, 1813.

The Longs of Ulster County, Ireland, were at the defense of Londonderry. Henry Long was mayor after the siege. Three of the Long brothers fought in the Revolutionary War.

SAMUEL LONG, the great grandfather of Dr. Crawford W. Long married Anne Williamson of Cumberland County, Pa.

DR. CRAWFORD WILLIAMSON LONG was born in Danielsville, Madison co., Ga., Nov. 1, 1815. On Aug. 11, 1842 Dr. Long married Mary Caroline Swain. She was the niece of Governor Swain of N. C. His great grandfather was Samuel Long, an Englishman, who came to America in 1762 and settled at Carlisle, Pa. and served in the army of George Washington, who was at the surrender of Yorktown. He was a Captain in the command of the Marquis de LaFayette.

In 1792 JAMES LONG, the oldest son of SAMUEL LONG moved to Madison co., Ga., bringing with him his eleven year old son, James. This eleven year old son was the father of Dr. Crawford W. Long.

In 1837 Dr. Crawford W. Long entered the Medical Department of the University of Pa., where received his M.D. degree in 1839. Dr. Long performed an operation March 30th, 1842, using anesthesia, on James M. Venable removing a tumor from his neck; another tumor was removed June 6, 1842. Dr. Long was living at Jefferson, Jackson Co., Ga. at the time. On Apr. 21, 1912, a marble shaft was unveiled at Jefferson, Ga., to Dr. Crawford W. Long. The monument was a gift of Dr. L. G. Hardman, later Governor of Georgia. A bronze medallion of Dr. Long was unveiled by University of Pa., where he attended medical school. Photostatic copies of the proofs of his discovery are on exhibition at the medical museum in London. Scotland has also honored his memories. Wisconsin and other schools followed in recognizing his discovery. Dr. Long died in Athens, Ga., 1876.

JAMES LONG SR. of Ulster co., Ireland, was the father of GEORGE LONG, born in Liverpool, England, 1795. George Long married Rosa Margaret Reddock in St. Marys, Camden co., Ga. GEORGE LONG and ROSA MARGARET (REDDOCK) LONG had the following children: Eliza Ann Long, born June 16, 1816; George W. Long, born Sept. 30, 1821; Maria Louisa Long, born Jan. 1, 1824; Daniel Julius Long, born Aug. 26, 1830. GEORGE LONG and ROSA MARGARET (REDDOCK) LONG were married on Aug. 12, 1815. The eldest daughter, Eliza Ann Long married Samuel Burnett, after his first wife, Henrietta Broad of Vermont died. Maria Louisa (Long) Burnett was the mother of Louisa McCool and the mother

of William Baxter Burnett. Maria Louisa (Long) Burnett and Daniel Julius Long were brother and sister, making Louisa McCool a niece of D. J. Long. Dr. Crawford W. Long and Daniel J. Long were brothers children.

George Long, born in Liverpool, England, 1795, and wife, Rosa Margaret (Reddock) Long, are great grandparents of Louisa McCool's grand children. Louisa McCool and children not being related to Henrietta Broad Burnett as she was Samuel Burnett's first wife, and the mother of Mary M. Burnett, wife of Daniel J. Long.

DANIEL J. LONG died April 30, 1902 in St. Marys, and is buried in the beautiful Oak Grove Cemetery of St. Marys. In the same cemetery is buried his father, George Long, born in Liverpool England, 1795, and died in St. Marys 1851.

OBITUARY

DANIEL JULIUS LONG

St. Marys, Ga., May 5, 1902.

"All that was mortal of Mr. D. J. Long, of St. Marys, was laid to rest in the beautiful old cemetery of that place Thursday beneath a mound of roses and lilies. Mr. Long was 70 years of age and his death was caused from pneumonia, with which he was attacked two weeks before. He was a man whom it was ever a pleasure to meet. Of a gentle, retiring disposition, with a kindly word and pleasant smile for all, he drew about him a circle of friends limited only by the number of his acquaintances, and was rightly called 'Friend Long'. When a young man he joined the Methodist church and has always lead a most exemplary life, so when the summons came he was prepared to answer it. His consistent christian life has been an inspiration to many. He left besides his wife, eight children, all of whom were present during his last hours to mourn his death. Peace to his ashes."

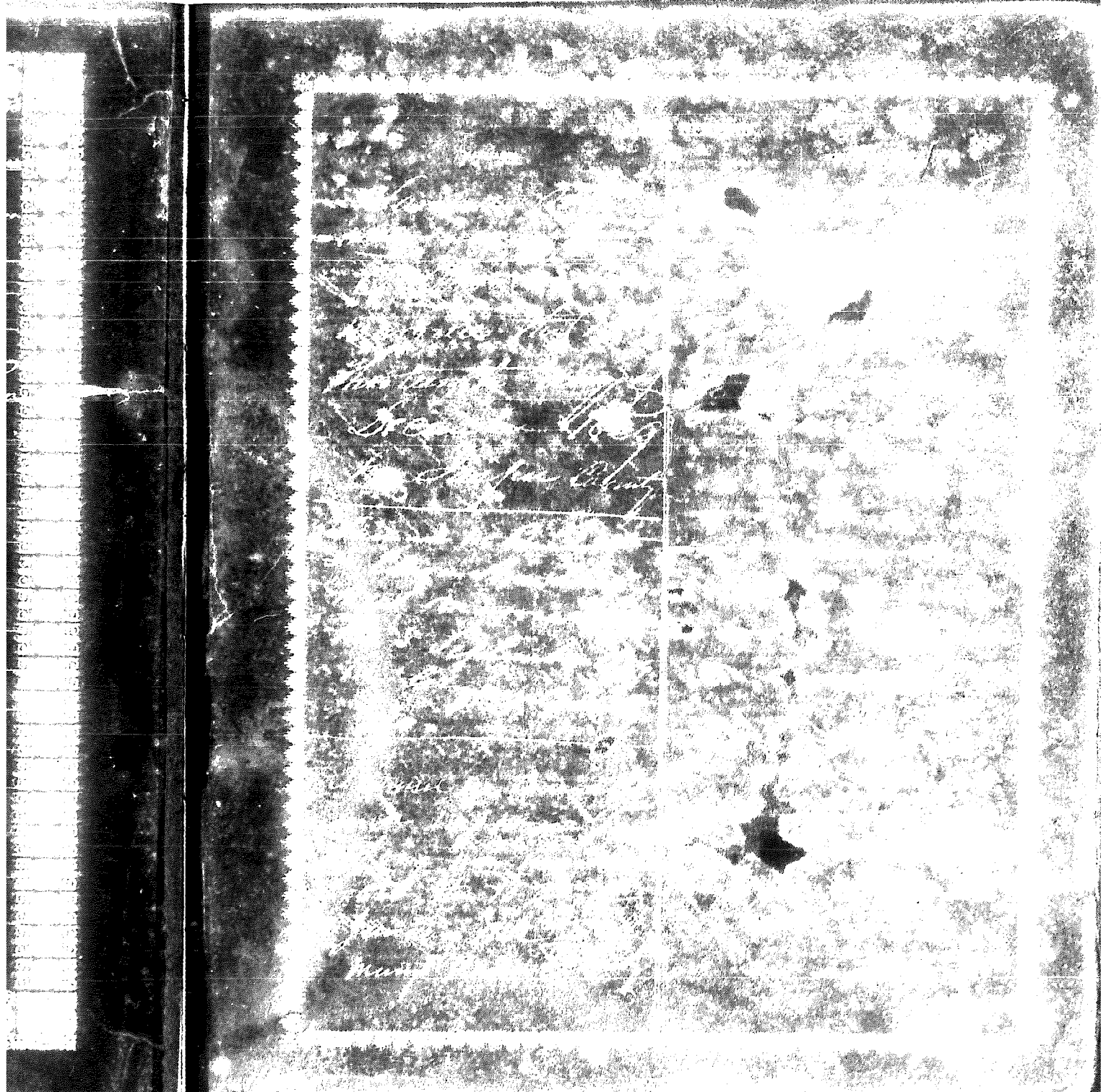

MISS MOLLIE LONG DIED EARLY MONDAY MORNING

After an illness of about two weeks Miss Mollie Long departed this life Monday morning at one thirty o'clock.

The funeral services were conducted from the home Wednesday at ten thirty o'clock, by her pastor Rev. L. W. Walker of the Methodist Episcopal church. Interment was in the family plot in Oak Grove cemetery.

The pallbearers were Messrs. J. S. N. Davis, L. J. Cowart, J. F. Hughes, W. D. Harrison, Joe Rudolph and Alex McDonald.

July 3, 1922, at the birth of a new day, the beautiful life of Miss Mollie Long, like a full bloom rose, shed its petals and passed to a higher and better sphere. Like the glorious queen of flowers tended by her with such loving care, she left a memory whose fragrance will long be treasured in the hearts of those that knew and loved her.

She was amiable, charitable, kind and gentle, with always a word of sympathy and encouragement for those in trouble. She possessed all the characteristics of nobility which a pure Christian woman endowed and her life has been in open book which all may read in profit.

As a mark of the high esteem in which she was held during her entire illness, which demanded close and watchful care, no service was rendered by servile hands; every attention was "Love's Offering from friend, to friend."

Every white family in the community, and many colored people, paid tributes of respect and love.

H. Lee Long, 71, died Friday, November 4, at 2:00 P. M., following a long illness.

He is survived by two sisters and one brother. He made his home with Miss Martin Long, New City, Long and Dr. H. M. Long were with him through the three years of his illness.

Funeral services were held from the residence Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Rev. Herbert L. Burdette of St. Marys Methodist Church and Rev. F. H. Chapman, pastor of Presbyterian Church, officiating. Mr. Long was of the "Golden Rule Faith" and lived a consistent Christian life.

Burial was in Oak Grove Cemetery by side of his parents, D. J. Long and Mary Margaret Long. Also in the same cemetery is buried his grandfather, Long, born in Liverpool, England, died in St. Marys one hundred and seven years ago.
