Wayne County
State of Kentucky

on the 24 day of September 1832
personally appeared before the Wayne County
Court James M Henry & resident here in Wayne
County and State of Kentucky aged 46 years
one year as he declares the last of December
next who being duly sworn according to
Law doath on his oath make the following
declaration in order to obtain the benefit
of the provisions made by the act of Congress
passed June the 15th 1832 that he enlisted in
the Army of the United States in the year
of 1816 as he declares in the 15 year of his age with
John Salter Capt for the term of 18 months
who commanded a horse Company and who was
marched on to guard the frontiers of Georgia and who
was commanded a part of the time by Col
Baker he enlisted in Anson County in
the State of South Carolina marched from
there to the head of Ogecha river and then built
a fort called Fort Harrison as he declares marched
from there to near the head of Little river
and built a fort called Phillips fort marched
from there to midway between Sun's house
and haltemehaw and was there joined by
Col Baker who marched us on to the mouth
of Saint Marys river in Florida and had it
called in that place with the Indians
British and Tories who was commanded in part

by General M'girt who was at that time he states
that they got defeated and retreated back together
old towns and there treated with the Creek Indians
and then marched back to Phillips forte then
marched back to Savannah and there was dis-
charged at the expiration of the 18 months by his
Capt John Salter. he then returned home to
his mother in the State of South Carolina
in Burton County and continued there till
the year of 1780 as he relates when he volunteered
under Capt John M'Intosh marched on and joined
General Gates near Camden and there got defeated
by the British who was commanded by General
was there taken a prisoner and detained for
months before he got home after he returned
home he volunteered under James O'Neale
Capt for three months who continued to fight
the British against the Tories after the expira-
tion of that three months he again volunteered
for three months more under the same
Capt James O'Neale and was then marched
on after General O'Neale who commanded
the Tories to Bates bridge on the swollen Creek
and was there defeated Col Waid Col Philips and
Col Williams were all in the defeat tho they
had but few men ~~at the eighteen months~~
~~he insisted he would exchange the balance of the Capt.~~
~~the 18 months~~
~~he was taken a prisoner and put in prison~~

goal and continued there until he died with the ~~box~~ and never gave him ~~undischarge~~ the ~~load~~ of his discharges he got burnt up in his house which got burnt in ~~the~~ ~~Carolina~~ and there is no person living that he was of in this part of the country that he ~~born~~ ~~from~~ all his ~~services~~?

I was bound in North Carolina on a book called by Batentrey the County not recollected in the year of 1761 as well as I recollect

2 have you any record of your age and if so what is it

2 I have no record of my age nor never had I am no scoller and cannot weight my mother told me that I was bound betwixt new and old Christmas as she believed in the year of 1761 and I dont now wheather it was in the first of the year or the last

3 when were you living when came in to service when have you lived since the revolutionary war and where do you now live

3 from the commencement of the war until ^{and stopped many year after the war} the same I lived in Anson County in the State of North Carolina I moved from there to South Carolina in Charleston County on tiger river and continued the 6 years. Moved from

drafted did you volunteer or were you a Substitute
in I enlisted the first eighteen months the other three
months I volunteered

5 State the names of some of the regular officers
who were with the troops where you served

5 Capt John Satter was a regular officer he com-
mended us how Kentucky and went on to guard the
frontiers of Georgia I don't now whether Col Baker
was a regular officer or not. we were not attached
to now main body of troops the whole time
of my enlistment the first campaign that
I volunteered general Gates was our head Comma-
nder the second campaign that I volunteered I was
not attached to no regular troops we were sent
marched to fight in Carolina against the troops
the third time that I volunteered under Col Baker
we were marched against Blounts Col. Ward Col
Chiles and Col Williams I was all in the defeat
but I believe that they were all Military officers

6 did you ever receive a discharge from the Service
and if so by whom was it given and what has
become of it

6 I received a discharge from Capt John Satter
for eighteen months in the regular Service
that got burnt when my home in South Carolina
the balance of the Campaigns I received no dis-
charge one Capt John McHenry having died in
action in the other Capt. names Col Baker

I do further state that I served as a private
in all the campaigns that I was in that I never
felt any commission in the Army I served
Eighteen months in the 1st Regt. of the 1st
as a regular soldier in the years 1776 and
1777 as well as I can recollect I then volun-
teered when served under John Moinvalle
for an uncertain length of time
in the year of 1780 as well as I can recollect
I was killed and joined General Gates near
Camden and then we got defeated by the
British within six or seven days of the
surrender I was taken prisoner by the Brit-
ish and detained ~~four~~ four months
as well as recollect before I got home
I then volunteered under James Stotter
for three months and served the time out
I then volunteered again for three months and was
killed on against Gen. Greene who defeated
us I then returned home and was still in
service more than three weeks

I do not ~~remember~~ believe that I can
state the names of the officers whom
I served under more distinctly than I
have in my first Declaration

And the said Court hereby declare their opinion
after the investigation of the matter and after
reading the interrogatories propounded by the Court
Department that the above named applicants
were a Revolutionary Soldier and served as testifies
and the Court further certifying that it appears to them
that James Lacer who has signed the preceding
Certificate is a Clergyman residing in the County
of Wayne and is a credible person and that
James White is a Resident of the same who has also
signed the same is a credible person and that their
