Wayne County  
State of Kentucky

on the 24 day of September 1832  
personally appeared before the Wayne County  
Court James W. Henry & resident here in Wayne  
County and State of Kentucky aged 77 three  
one years as he believes the last of December  
next who being duly sworn according to  
law doth on his oath make the following  
declaration in order to obtain the benefit  
of the provisions made by the act of Congress  
passed June the 1st 1832 that he enlisted in  
the Army of the United States in the year  
of 1776 as he believes in the 15 years of his age with  
John Salter Capt for the term of 18 months  
who commanded a horse company and who was  
marched on to garrison the frontiers of George and who  
was commanded in part of the time by Col  
Daker he enlisted in Anson County in  
the State of North Carolina marched from  
there to the head of Neche river and there left  
Col Daker for Marion as he believes march  
from there to near the head of Little river  
and left a fort called Philipes fort marched  
from there to midway between Sun's Lick  
and Salters Lick and was there joined by  
Col Daker who marched us on to the mouth  
of Saint Mary's river in Florida and had a  
battle near that place with the Indians  
British Americans who were commanded in part

by General M<sup>c</sup>Coy who was of tory he states  
 that they got defeated and retreated back togather  
 to town and their treated with the French indians  
 and then marched back to Phillips fort then  
 marched back to Savannah and their was dis-  
 charged at the expiration of the 18 months by his  
 Capt John Salter he then returned home to  
 his mother in the State of South Carolina  
 in Union County and continued their till  
 the year of 1780 as he believes when he volunteered  
 under Capt John M<sup>c</sup>Coy he marched on and joined  
 general Gates near Fathen and their got defeated  
 by the British who was commanded by General  
 W<sup>r</sup>o<sup>r</sup>s their taken of prisoners and detained before  
 months before he got home after he return  
 home he volunteered under James G<sup>e</sup>orge  
 Capt for three months who continued to ring  
 the frontier against the tories after the combat  
 on of that three months he again volunteered  
 for three months more under the same  
 Capt James G<sup>e</sup>orge and were then marched  
 on after General Glennen who commanded  
 the tories to Bates bridge on the river French  
 and were their defeated Col Ward Col. Philes and  
 Col Williams was all in the defeat tho they  
 had but few men <sup>the eighteen months</sup> which ~~of course~~  
 he insisted he was in charge the command of the British  
~~and with the exception of the French~~  
~~he got no pay~~  
~~he served under Capt John M<sup>c</sup>Coy~~  
 he was taken prisoner and put in prison

I volunteered general gates was our head Command-  
er the Second Campaign that I volunteered I was  
not attached to no regular troopers we were first  
marched of bout in Carolina against the Tories  
the third time that I volunteered under Beecher  
we were marched against Blainen Col Ward Col  
Child and Col Williams were all in the defeat  
but I believe that they were all Melite officers

6 did you ever receive a discharge from the Service  
and if so by whom was it given and what has  
become of it

6 I received a discharge from Capt John Salter  
for eighteen months in the regular Service  
then got burnt when my home in South Carolina  
the balance of the Campaign I received now on  
charge one Capt John McLean having died in  
battle unburied the other Capt James Beecher

I do further state that I served as a private  
in all the campaigns that I was in that I never  
left my Commission in the Army I served  
eighteen months with the Rev. Capt. John Waller  
as a Major of soldiers in the years 1776 and  
1777 as well as I can recollect I then became  
a volunteer under Major McInally  
for a certain length of time  
in the year of 1780 as well as I recollect  
we are now and joined General Gates army  
I am clear and that we got defeated by the  
British within six or seven days after I  
volunteered I was taken prisoner by the Brit  
ish and detained ~~for~~ four months  
as well as recollect before Sgo O'Hara  
I then volunteered under General Gates  
for three months and served the time out  
I then volunteered again for three months and was  
selected again to Gen Gates who defeated  
us I then returned home and was still in  
service for them three weeks

I do not ~~believe~~ believe that I can  
state the names of the Officers whom  
I served under in one distinctly than I  
have in my first Declaration
