John D. Moss served in the War of 1812. Volunteered and went to Norfork under the command of Capt. J. I. Moore. Remained in the service for several months. Was taken ill, "hired" a substitute in his place. This record I found in a letter from great uncle J. Speed Moss (bachelor) who lived, died and is buried in Medklenburg Co., Va. Date of letter Fab. 5, 1873.

J. D. M. moved from Cherokey Corner to Aglethory Co., Ga.

Died about 1887 J. Speed Moss -Unmarried. Charlie D. Moss and Willie Walker, nephews had legacies from his will. Lived with him until "good sized boys". His home still stands in Mecklenburg Co, in good repair but porches have been taken down. (*)

(*) J. Speed Moss home- not a large house- about 2 miles s.e. of Bakerville in the Alexander Fenny Road. Now owned (1932) by W. L. Simmons of Union Level. He is buried about 1 mile from the old home place. He owned a good many negroes. Aunt Jule told me he was a wealthy man.

Wm. Strong owned land in Gorchlarnd Co., Va. Moved to Aglethorp Co., Ga.

John Strong's wife (whom we believe to be Miss Turnbull) was an English woman, one of 3 children, brought to this country, with her sister, by her brother. He, returning to \$mg., was shipwrecked and never heard from again. Miss Turnbull settled in Wirginia and married a Strong.

Born in Hanower Co., Va. Chas. Strong. A Revolutionary Soldier, was present at the siege of Yorktown, present when Cornwallis surrendered. The remains and markers of Chas Strong and his wife Sarah Thompson were moved from the old family burial ground in aglethrop, Co., (near the sight of the Strong home) to Orange Cometary, Athens, Ga.

STRONG Sarah Thompson Strong moved to the home of her youngest daughter. Martha4 (Mrs. John Dortch Moss) at Cheroker Corner after the death of her husband, Oct. 1848. She died there May 27, 1849. Richard Lane form in England. Come with his rife Alice and their three children to America in 1635. The following record ampears in Virginia records.

"License to go beyond the seas April 16, 1635, these parties hereinafter expressed are to be transported to the Island Providence, embarked in ye "Expectation" ship: Cornelius Bellinger, Master; having taken the oath of Allegiance and Supremacie as likewise being conformable to the Church of England, where of they brought their testimonic from the Minister and the Justice of the Peace of their abode; namely Alice Iane, age 30, Joe Lane, age 4, Samuel Lane, age 7, Aziel Lane, age 3, and Fichard Lane, age 38

Jesse Lane⁵ (Joseph⁴, Joseph³, Joseph², Richard¹)
b. July 3, 1733 in Halifax Co., N. C.; d. in Kv. while visiting his children. M. in same Co., Halifax, Dec. 16, 1755, Winifred Aycock (daughter of William Aycock, Revolutionery Soldier).

Jesse Lane was a Rev. Soldier. An officer in 3rd N. C. Continentals. He was in the Pattle of King's Mountain. He moved with

his family to Ga. in 1784 to Wilkes Co. now Closet Co., then Aglethorp, now a part of Clarke, near Athens. Together with his don, Jonathan and his son-in-law. David Lowry he built one of the first Methodist Churches in Ga. in1787. It was dedicated by Rev. Humphres and Rev. Major. He moved his family to Wilkes Co. where the Indians were their neighbors. Often the family had to flee to the forts and block houses for protection and to escape the raids of the Indians. David Lowry m Caroline Lane (Ancestors of Mrs. Crawford R. Long) was killed by the Indians.

m Rebecca (Pace) Pradford father of Wini-William Aycock fred (Mrs. Jesse Lane) came to America from Wales. Settled in Northumberland Co., N. C. He had a grant of land Aug. 26, 1746. In August 1779 he was one of the grand jurors in the first court held in Wilkes Co., Ga. William Aycock was a Pev. Soldier of N. C. Own land 1787 in Wilkes Co. Ga. as a Soldier. He and his wife were members of the Church of England

Winifred Aycock Lane died Dec. 16, 1794 of pneumonia contracted from exposure when driven from her home by the Indians. She is buried in the Old Cemetery, Athens, Ga. She was a member of the Church of England but under the preaching of the Rev. Humphrie and Rev. Major joined the church of her husband. Methodist.

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Biographical Sketch of Rufus LaFayette Moss, Sr.

Porn January 13th, 1825, Rufus L. Moss was the eldest son of John Dortch and Martha Strong Moss. His youth was spent at the home of his father at Charakes Corner, Calathorpe County, Scorgia, near the trac which was the meeting place of the Greeks, the Charakes, and the Thites.

We had three prothers and four sisters.

Mr. woss received his education in Athens, was and at sixteen, left his hope to begin business in Athens, where he formed a partnership with Maj. Blanton Hill and after five years bound to the interest of his partner. For two years he was manager of the Athens Foundry and Machine works; let r was in business with ". H. H. White, becoming owner of this business he conducted it until the beginning of the "ar between the States.

He was five feet, eleven frehes in heidit, of fair, thin skin, blue eyes and dark suburn heir, with clear, regular features. He was excellent in health, never suffering from any disease except from joundice following service in the "ar between the States.

His wind was been, farsighted, fair and importial; his memory for names was poor, for faces good; he was fearless in pursuing a course which he deemed right, being sucryed not at all by fear of criticism. He was accurate in thought; clear in reasoning; importial in juggment.

His mother once said of him, "I have never known Rufus to tell me an unbrothe".

The Sinteen years of egglic become a member of the Methodist Church. His father was a vestrymen in the Episcopal Church, but since there was no mpiscopal Church in athems at that time; Mr. Moss united with the Methodists. Later his mother and two sisters also joined the Methodist Church. At the age of eighteen, he became a steward in that church, which office he held to the end of his life.

Mr. Moss was keenly interested in all public affairs; he was philanthropic and charitable. One of his daughters eaked his bookkeeper at out time concerning her father's contributions to charitable work and was told that Mr. Moss gave for more than a tithe to these causes.

One thing that greatly interested him was helping young people to get an education. Many the had not the means were taken into his heme as members of his family, in order that they might attend the various institutions of learning in Athens. We also helped many whose feet had sturbled in life's way to recover their balance.

Often when others omed him money, if the payment worked a hardship on women and children the debt was cancelled or not pressed.

In 1862, while in the Commissary Dept. of the Confederate Army at Atlanta, when the supply of food ran short, and the order came to supply provisions free to the soldiers only, Ir. Moss said, "I'll buy provisions for the women" and used all his available money for this purpose.

Always interested in the betterment of his town, he superintended the heilding of the Northeast Railroad, now a branch of the Southern. The first engine used on this read was named "The R. L. moss".

AscityCouncil man, by personally endersing the notes of the town of athems, he reised its credit from fifty cents to par value. For tan years he was a director of the State Bank of Athems, for twenty years, a director of the First National Bank. (1997) (1998) (1998)

Mr. Moss was married in 1848 to Miss mary Anthony, who died on their wedding journey, a month later, at Rome, N. Y. In 1854 he was married to miss Elizabeth Luckie, daughter of William Dickinson and Eliza Buchmer Luckie of Govington, Ge. by Rev. Alexander means, a lifelong friend of the family.

Of this marriage there were eight children, Mary Anthony, Rufus LaFayette Jr., Eliza Buckner (called Lilby), Elizabeth Luckie (who died in infancy), John Pertch II; Martha Strong (Birdie), Sarah munter, and william Lorenzo. The married life of this couple was so beautiful that all who knew them were blest by it. "Betsy" was all that was fair and his devotion to her was such that every child and grandshild emulated him in respect and love. They lived to calchrete their golden wedding - a very notable affair in Athens, and Tor's hugher to present afformard.

During the latter years of his life he and his son John D. Moss were partners in the cotton business.

Mr. moss died in his 88th year. There was no illnes; but like Enoch. "He was not, for God took him." In the words of his beloved wife, "He closed his eyes in peaceful sleep the night of October 24, 1912 and opened them face to face with his Savior a few moments later. He had realized the promise. "With long life will I satisfy him and show him my salvation".

After his death a member of his family, coming down into the room where his body lay, found a group of negroes who had come to see him for the last time. More than one spoke of how "r. Moss had saved his home for him or had taken time to advise him how to conduct his farm business so that he might eventually own his bome. On October 21, 1912, the funeral was conducted by Rev. James U. Morriss, at the First Methodist Church where he had held the office of steward for the longest period of any one also who had ever been a ember of that Church. John Dartch Ross, Sr. the first of the known paternal ancestors of Rufus inFayette moss was a native of Mechlenburga Co., virginia. There is a legend in the family that he and his brothers came from England, but the likelihood is that these were the father and uncle of John Dortch Ross. "e do know that the Moss brothers, John D., David and Speed, came from England and settled in virginia. John and David moved to Georgia. Speed remained in virginia.

John D. Moss volunteered for service in the "ar of 1812; went to morfolk, Va. under the command of Capt. John I. Noore, became ill and after some months hired a substitute to take his place when he had to return home. On march 18, 1824, he was married to Martha Strong, (daughter of Charles Strong and Sarah Thompson) at the Strong home in Oglethorpe County, Georgia. Their home was at Charoke worner, Oglethorpe County, to.

Biographical Sketch of Elizabeth Inchie moss.

Elizabeth Freeney Luckie, eldest daughter (1 mm. Dickinson and Eliza Buckner Luckie was bern at Covington, Co., Auc. 27, 1801.

Let his life be long and blessed, comfortable and hely, and let me also become a great blessing and comfort with him".
