TERRIBLE SHIPWRECK, AND PROTRACTED SUFFERINGS OF THE VICTIMS.

**Interesting News from Ireland—Snow
Storm in England—A Shadow of War—
Moonlighters—Judge Thurman Recover-
ing from His Paralytic Stroke.**

HALIFAX, N. S., January 8—The steamer *Minnie*, from Georgetown for St. Johns, N. F., with produce, ran ashore in Bras D'Or Lake December 28th, and was sunk. Capt. Carew and the crew escaped in their boat in a half frozen condition. They found themselves on an island on which there were only two houses. While endeavoring to walk to the house, one of the crew, John Gathrall, was frozen to death. The others concluded that they were less likely to lose their lives in the water than out it, and walked two miles along the shore in the water up to their armpits. They managed to crawl to the house, but were nearly dead from exhaustion. The next day they found and buried the body of their comrade, and witnessed the plundering of the wreck by the people from the mainland. The captain owned the vessel. It is a total loss, and was not insured. The captain and crew are penniless.
