DECLARATION OF SOLDIER FOR PENSION.

To be executed before Judge or Clerk of Court
State of Missouri } ss.
COUNTY OF Bates }

On this..... 20th day of November, A. D. one thousand eight hundred
and seventy two, personally appeared before me, Edmund E. Borley, Judge Probate Court, Clerk
of the Bates County Probate Court, a Court of Record, within and for the
county and State aforesaid, W. M. Henry, aged eighty
years, a resident of Walnut Creek Township, County of Bates,
State of Missouri, who, being duly sworn according to law, declares that he is married;
that his wife's name was Sarah Glendy, to whom he was married
in Wayne County Kentucky, on the first day of May, 1815; that he served the full period of sixty days in the (1) military
service of the United States in the war of 1812; that he is the identical W. M. Henry,
who (2) enlisted in Captain Miller's
company, Jth regiment, Plykote brigade, division, at Madocville
Kentucky, on the fall day of 1813 or 1814,
1814, and was honorably discharged on November 1814 on the
following enlistment, 1815; that (3) he was in no
general engagement, but was in several skirmishes with
British and Indians on Thames River at Mariontown; that
his discharge was sent to Washington with application for Land Warrant
that he received two Land Warrants, one for 80 acres N. 248 jo.,
& the other he has misplaced & cannot give the number.

that he, at no time during the late rebellion against the authority of the United States, adhered to the cause of the enemies of the Government, giving them aid or comfort, or exercised the functions of any office whatever under any authority, or pretended authority, in hostility to the United States; and that he will support the Constitution of the United States; that he is not in receipt of a pension under any previous act; that he makes this declaration for the purpose of being placed on the pension roll of the United States, under the provision of the act approved February 14, 1871, and he hereby constitutes and appoints, with full power of substitution and revocation,

Edmund E. Wray of Jefferson City Mo. his true
and lawful attorney to prosecute his claim and obtain the pension certificate that may be issued; that his post
office is at Marion, County of Bates, State of Missouri;
that his domicile or place of abode is Walnut Creek Township, Bates Co. Mo.

one thousand Eight hundred and fifty four, appearing
appeared before me a Justice of the Peace within
and for the County and State aforesaid William Mc
Henry aged 64 years a resident of Bates County in
the State of Maine who being duly sworn according to
true oaths that he is the identical person who
was a Private in the company commanded by Captain
John Miller the Regt not erected but commanded
by Michael Hall in the year make about 1812
about 1832 he enlisted ^{as a Private} for the term
three months and continued in actual service in
said corps for three days that he has ^{never} given
made application for bounty land under act of
September 20th 1850 under Court Warrant No 24570
for 40 acres which he has since legally disposed of
and cannot now return - he makes this declaration
for the purpose of obtaining the additional bounty land
to which he may be entitled under the act of March
3rd 1855 he also declares that he has never applied for
nor received under this or any act of Congress any
county land warrant except the one above mentioned
he appoints H. A. Thompson his attorney to prosecute
and receive his claim.

County in the State of Maine upon our oaths above
stated the foregoing declaration was signed and acknowledged
before us by William McHenry the person above
named bearing from the appearance and statement of the
appellant that he is the identical person he represents himself
to be.
