MARY LOUISA BEATRICE OLCOTT, of Casagmo, Ridgefield, Fairfield County, Connecticut, Fellow of the Royal Horticultural Society of London, Member of the Horticultural Society of New York, b. in Brooklyn, N.Y., 24 June, 1854.

Lineage.—THOMAS OLCOTT, b. ca. 1609, whose place of origin is unknown, but whose family is believed to have sprung from Nottinghamshire, may have sailed for New England in either the *Assurance* or the *Griffin*; he is supposed to have gone from Boston thence to Hartford, Connecticut, where he settled. He m. Abigail Porter (b. ca. 1612; d. 26 May, 1690), and d. 1654, leaving issue, and d. 5 April, 1719, leaving issue,

THOMAS OLCOTT, of Hartford, Connecticut, b. 1637; m. Mary, Timothy OLCOTT, of Bolton, Connecticut, b. 1677, at Hartford; m. three times and had issue by his first wife; he d. 5 April, 1754. His son,

TIMOTHY OLCOTT, of Bolton, Connecticut, b. 1703; m. 1 Nov. 1732, Eunice White (b. 13 Feb. 1713; d. 13 Mar. 1757), a descendant of John White, who sailed on the *Lyon* which reached New England in Sept. 1632, and who was made a Freeman of Massachusetts Bay Colony, 4 Mar. 1633, and member of the First Board of Selectmen of Cambridge. TIMOTHY OLCOTT, of Chester, Vermont, received letters patent from King George III, nominating him one of the Coroners of the County of Cumberland, in the Province of New York, 7 April, 1768, dau. of Judge Thomas Chandler, of Woodstock, Vermont, Representative to the Grand Assembly, Commissary of 1st Regiment, and Elizabeth, dau. of Expedition to Cape Breton 1745, by his wife, Eliot (b. 1604; d. 1690), the "Apostle to the Indians," and d. 24 June, 1832, leaving issue,
