Russellvi'le Baptist Church

A BRIEF HISTORY

On October 26, 1849, sixteen residents of the Russellville community, feeling the need of a place where they could worship the Lord according to their own faith, met and organized the Russellville Baptist Church. The original church was located about one-eighth of a mile west of the little community center after which it was named. The sixteen original members were: James Hardin, Davis Smith, Sr., Davis Smith, Jr., Joseph Williamson, Elizabeth Hogan, Elizabeth D. Smith, Harriett Williamson, Martha Wilson, Nancy Ware, Miranda Holland, Elizabeth Smith, Mary Hardin, Mary Wilson, Mary Spier, Elizabeth Cook and Elizabeth Nonley. The first sermon was delivered by Rev. W. I. Stephens.

The early life of the church was a struggle for existence and at one time there was a movement to disband but God put into the hearts of two of the women members a determination and faith that would not be denied, and through their efforts the church survived. By 1878, a period of twenty-nine years, the membership had grown from sixteen to thirty-four.

In 1880 the present building was purchased from the Methodists for the sum of \$300. It was built by the Methodists in 1845. The old Baptist Church was sold to the colored Methodists for \$150.00. The new location was favorable to the growth of the church, and the simplicity and beauty of the building and grounds make it today one of the most beautiful of country churches. In the last twenty-five or thirty years many improvements have been made in keeping with the progress of the church. A new organ was purchased in 1914 and a new floor and seats installed in 1917. In 1922 a piano was purchased, and a few years back a new metal roof was put on. The church has been painted regularly as needed, inside and out, and today we have a building that is the pride and joy of the membership.

A cemetery was begun in 1904 as many of the members wished to be laid to rest near the House of God that was so dear to their hearts. It was stipulated that no lot was to be closer than thirty feet of the church. Since its beginning many of the members have been laid to rest near the house where they worshipped and served their Lord. In 1945 Brother H. M. Wilson, Sr., deeded to the church as a free gift over an acre of land adjoining the church grounds for the enlargement of the cemetery. This has been graded and sown with grass seed to prevent erosion.

The church has in the past five or ten years made rapid progress in its program of work in behalf of the Lord's cause. It has changed from quarter to a half-time church, having services on 1st and 3rd Sundays of each month. The church is participating through its budget in all phases of the Southern Baptist Missionary Program and contributes to practically all of the special programs that our convention sponsors. A total of over \$2000.00 was contributed during the last church year.

A Sunday School was first organized in 1884, with C. B. Wooten as Superintendent. W. F. Hardin, Assistant Superintendent, T. H. Wooten, Secretary, and Sallie Bryan, Mary Wooten, Addie Barns and P. C. Wilson as teachers. On February 5, 1887, Homer Hardin was elected as Assistant Superintendent and W. R. Hardin, Secretary! The record from the old minutes shows that there were three teachers and nineteen pupils. A later entry gives a summary of the work of the school for several weeks, which was as follows: average attendance 17, average absence 6, average collection \$0.27. In December 1887 E. P. Hardin was elected Superintendent and J. J. Holloway, Assistant Superintendent, with J. F. Wooten as Secretary. In March 1588 W. R. Hardin was elected as Secretary and in July 1888 W. F. Hardin Secretary. In June 1889, C. B. Wooten was elected as Superintendent. There is no jurther record of Sunday School work until October, 1923, although it is known that a school operated spasmodically between those dates, In October, 1923, Mrs. Rosa Allen was elected Superintendent and served until 1925 when B. J. Jackson was elected and served through 1934. Upon the resignation of Guy Oxford, B. J. Jackson was again elected and has served as Superintendent to the present time. Since 1923 the Sunday School has been a regular and important part of the church activity and much good has been accomplished through its efforts.

As early as 1888 the ladies of the church formed an Aid Society and today there is an active Woman's Missionary Society taking part in the regularly scheduled activities of our association, and the organization is a great-joy and benefit to the women members of the church. Mrs. H. M. Wilson, Sr., is president of the W.M.S.

The present membership of the church as revealed by the last church letter is one hundred and thirteen resident members and about seventytwo non-resident members.

Russellville Church has stood as a monument of Christian fellowship and service for the past century, and is facing the future of the next hundred years with a faith and belief in God's promises that can never be shaken. Matthew, 16th chapter, 18th verse: "And I say unto thee that thou art Peter and upon this rock I will build my church and the gates of Hell shall not prevail against it.'
