

BRISTOL, VA., August 31.—The tragic fate of Flagman Phelpus, who met death in the Norfolk and Western collision near Chilhowie, Va. on Saturday, was attended by rather peculiar circumstances. It is stated that the flagman, who was new in railroad work was standing on the rear platform of the cab of the work train, which was moving slowly, when a heavy freight train came in sight around a curve. It was plain that a rear end collision could not be avoided.


#### Former Pastor of the Randolph-St. Baptist Church Will Not Return.

## HARSH INJUSTICE TO FOREIGNERS

(By Associated Press.) WILLEMSTAD, ISLAND OF CURA-CAO, August 31.—Harsh injustice is being meted out to foreigners residing in the interior of Venezueia, where the local authorities are hunting down all for-eigners who daré to present claims against Venezuela in accordance with the recent protocol.

Near Coro, a local tribunal refused to accept the testimony of five Italians. On the latter insisting in tendering their depositions, three were arrested and thrown into jail. Two of them attempted to escape and were fired upon, one being killed.

All rushed to the parlor whence the sounds came and beheld one of the most ghastly spectacles human eyes are forced to look upon in times of peace. The daughter, the pride of the home was already dead. The young man, who had for years enjoyed the hospitality of the home as a welcomed guest and friend, highly esteemed by all, was gasping for breath, with the death pallor spread upon his countenance. A neighbor, who had heen sent for immediately, and who was among the first to arrive, desoribes graphically the horrible scene in the cosy parlor. His eyes never looked upon such a sight before, though he is a man in middle life. Both were then dead. They were lying prone upon the floor where they fell.
